THE MOUNT DIRECTION SIGNAL STATION



A fascinating relic of Tasmania's early history is here on our doorstep, but visited by few and probably unknown to many. Before the introduction

of the electric telegraph in 1858, the only communication between Launceston and George Town at the mouth of the Tamar River was by semaphore via three masts, one at Mount George, one at Mount Direction and one on Windmill Hill in Launceston.

The masts were 18 metres high with two crossbars 5 metres long which could be raised or lowered by chainsthe position of the crossbars signified a number and a code was used to

send messages of shipping arriving in the Tamar.


The Mount Direction mast was erected in 1834, and in use until the electric telegraph was introduced in 1858. In 2000 the Mount Direction mast was re-erected.

The start of the track is just off the East Tamar Highway on the Dalrymple Road. It is a 2.3km climb to the top, graded easy to moderate. Apart from the splendid views you will see the ruin of the stone building from 1842, the re-erected signal pole and a rock cairn used as a trig point by the early colonial surveyors.

If you listen carefully you may even hear the ghostly voices of the many convicts confined here in the early years of the colony.

Across the country our unique wildlife is facing threats on every front imaginable, not least from bush fires. Some estimates suggest up to a billion mammals, birds, and reptiles have died or been seriously injured as a result of drought, bushfires and the subsequent loss of their habitat, water and food sources. The hot dry weather is taking its toll on Tasmania's wildlife too, and the distressing sight of roadkilled animals has certainly increased in our East Tamar area, not helped by so much development that's reducing their habitat even further. A plea therefore to all drivers to be mindful of wildlife that are venturing closer to the verges as they search for a few blades of grass to eat, and the possibility of moisture. Some normally nocturnal animals are so desperate they've been seen foraging during the day. Our wildlife is precious and we are incredibly lucky to have so many species in relative abundance. Let's keep it that way, and remember to slow down when driving in areas that are also home to wildlife.

BIRDS OF THE TAMAR By Jon Hosford

Swamp Harrier

There is a pair of Swamp Harriers that you see in our district most times you drive into Launceston in the Spring to Autumn months. They live and hunt, with upraised wings, along the marshland and road verge between Landfall and the Mowbray outskirts.

This bird is easily distinguished by its upright wing pattern whilst gliding and the stark white rump stripe that distinguishes it from other birds of prey.

The Swamp harrier is a small headed, long legged brown hawk. It sits tall and slim on fence posts and soars low over swamp land and tall grasslands searching for ground birds and waterbirds, rabbits, other

small mammals, reptiles, frogs, and fish. Common enemies of harriers are Australian magpies and Masked lapwings, which dive bomb. and European starlings which mob individuals. They have been heavily blamed and persecuted for killing chickens, pheasants and ducklings.

This bird nests in Tasmania amongst other south eastern states,, usually in



cumbungi or other low vegetation. It lays 3-5 eggs in a low nest of heaped grass. After rearing chicks, a pair of Swamp Harriers will force their offspring to seek other places to live after an Autumn migration north to warmer pastures on mainland Australia.

These birds are very important in keeping a balance in our wetlands and pasture and are not known to threaten the viability of agricultural enterprises other than their reputation mentioned previously.

If you keep ducks or chickens, it is wise to allow them cover overhead, as generally birds of prey will seek domesticated targets whenever their predominant diet is short in supply.

Here are two emails circulated recently relevant to the wellbeing of our bees. Thanks Greta and Jess.

BEES AND WATER

A friend of mine puts marbles in her outside water bowl for the bees to stand on. Could also use pebbles. She changes and cleans the water and everything regularly.

Last week I bought 2 bags of marbles from the Reject shop and have been very happy to see heaps of bees sitting on them looking like they were drinking the water.

Since bees are small they can easily drown in the water you set up for them, so you should follow some guidelines on how to safely provide water to bees.

- 1. Corks, twigs, or stones in the water will prevent bees drowning.
- 2. Always make sure that the water for the bees is clean and fresh.
- 3. The water container should be wide and shallow. Not deep water because they can easily drown. If one bee starts drowning, other bees will try to help and that can start a chain reaction of drowning bees.

Adult bees also need water for food as they eat honey. Honey that bees store in honeycomb crystalizes after some time and the concentration of concentration glucose increases. Because of a high concentration of glucose, bees need water to dilute the honey.

Every bee colony has worker bees whose main task is collecting water and if necessary other worker bees will also join them. Every bee collecting water usually makes about 50 trips, each time collecting about 25 mg of water. When there is not enough water in the hive, then foraging worker bees will quit forage and help with water collection. In summer high, a colony may need several litres of water per day.

Even though a major source of water is nectar, bees also need other sources of water. Since bees actively search and collect water, they will collect water from any puddle, swimming

pool, river, lake, or water trough which is close to the hive.'

Hi All

Year after year I have had problems with cherry slugs defoliating my cherry, plum, quince and pear trees. Throwing ash around as suggested by Peter Cundall was only minimally effective because of size of the trees and I didn't really like being covered in ash either. Then I thought I had found a great product (Success), but the fine print revealed..highly toxic to bees...another wall of shame chemical.

So back to research. Finally found a post by a lady who suggested using Neem oil with a tiny bit of detergent. It works! I have been using this since the first black slimy little buggers made their appearance, very little damage so far and happy bees. From my reading Neem is fine to use. I now just keep an eye for further signs of slugs and just reapply a light spray as required. The other good thing is that even if it is a bit windy and I get some on myself it is not going to cause me any harm either. Win win all round.

It is also good for other things such as the caterpillars wanting to eat my new birch trees. Neem oil is quite cost effective as you only need a small amount.

Us gardeners generally have good intentions, but I feel when we are faced with really bad insect damage there is the temptation revert to using the bad chemicals 'just this once' so here is a bee friendly solution which works. If anyone has found any other bee friendly solutions I would love to hear about it.
