When Brendon Morrison bought Lees Orchards in 2003, he had a 20 year plan.

Now, with the modernisation of the orchard completed, he says it's time to move on.

"My sons have given me enormous support, and now it's time for me to give them a hand."

This means that we'll still see plenty of Brendon in the district, as his son Daniel owns the property adjoining Lees Orchards, growing apricots, blueberries, cherries and greengages.

When Brendon took over the seven hectare orchard in 2003, he immediately removed half of the trees, all old varieties, and rested the land for two years.

He then began replanting modern market varieties in espalier trelissing, which he says is easier to manage and harvest. "It also increases your yield, from 45 tonnes per hectare to

about 70 tonnes."

The move into cherries filled a gap in the year.

"We like to finish our apples by December and the fresh crop starts in February, so cherries give us an ideal cash flow to fill that gap."

The farm shop, open every Thursday and Friday, has been the main attraction for residents and Brendon would like to say thank you for the loyal support from locals over the years.

"Not only have they been good customers, but our regulars have given us so much support and encouragement."

The shop has been a great outlet for a variety of local produce, from Hillwood jams to Dilston blueberries and raspberries and of course Landfall meats.

The sale is of course dependent on finding the right buyer to keep the business going, but whatever the outcome I'm sure all East Tamar residents wish Brendon well in his "semi retirement".

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Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor

Since the Los Angelos Road/Sanwae Drive intersection opened recently, it has been the focus of many comments on our Swan Bay Community Facebook page. Particularly by regular users of Los Angelos Road who now need to negotiate this junction. At issue is how and why the Council chose to approve a design that is clearly unsafe, and many argue is an accident just waiting to happen. After several residents contacted the Council to express their concerns, a brief meeting was held one afternoon with those few who were able to attend. Concerns include speed limit, poorly re-designed and very sharp corner, and poor visibility. To put some context around the concerns, local resident Berrice said this Los Angelos corner has a history:

Some background history. This corner back in the 1980s was a narrow corner and the cause of many accidents. We raised the issue with the Launceston City Council and in late 1980 we granted to the council 152m of our land for the council to improve this corner. This resulted in an improved sweeping corner along with reducing the accidents. With the engineer design in relation to joining Sanwae Drive onto Los Angelos Road it has reverted this corner back to a narrow tight corner, and we have already witnessed near misses. Most concerning one was in relation to a large truck.

Her comments are backed up by several residents who are HGV drivers, and a school bus driver who was approached for his take on the safety angle. All are scathing, as comments posted by Brooke, and Hayley indicate: Completely unacceptable! Dangerous and not practical. Only a matter of time before serious accident or fatality! Don't even know why the new subdivision needs a through road? They have a perfectly safe exit at the river end! I for one would rather it not be a through road if I lived there for traffic and security for property! This area is still an active farming area totally not a safe corner from either direction for a large fully loaded truck . . .

....They haven't allowed for the visibility issues with hills, tree shadows, sun at different times of the day etc. Only a matter of time before serious accident happens I guess all we can do is flood them with e mails and wait till an accident happens

There are so many blind spots on that intersection it's not funny and unless it's going to remain a 40 zone and people adhere to it then it's only a matter of time before something happens. . . . I assumed this day and age the professionals would have designed something better or on par with what was there before . . .

Residents keen to put further pressure on the Council before there is a serious or fatal accident on this corner, are encouraged to contact the Council on contactus@launceston.gov.tas.au. The more often these concerns are raised, or incidents of near misses and close calls are registered, the more likely something will be done.

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OUR HISTORY

THE BANGOR TRAMWAY



Bangor Slate Quarry

The Bangor tramway was a 16 kilometer horse drawn railway that ran between the Bangor Slate Quarry and the company's jetty at Hillwood, just south of Egg Island Creek.

The Bangor Slate Quarry Company was formed in 1873 to mine a rich deposit of slate from Bangor, north west of Lilydale, producing roofing slates and slabs for items such as fire hearths, mantlepieces, counter tops and billiard tables.

The road system being rough and unreliable, sea transport was the only practical way to get the slate to markets in Melbourne and around Tasmania, so the company invested some four thousand pounds (in excess of \$500,000 in today's money) to build a wooden track railway.

They were able to lease or acquire a 20 metre wide strip of land from the quarry to the jetty, on a path surveyed by one of the company's directors, Marshall Cresswell.

In October 1874, a correspondent from the Tasmanian visited the quarry:

"The jetty presented a very lively appearance. The cutters Lizzie and Venture were alongside loading with slates for Launceston."

Setting off on foot along the tramway "I met the trucks, four in number, drawn by six horses in two teams. One trip per day is made and 3000 slates each trip, about six tons in weight, are carried."

In March the next year the Premier (Hon. Adye Douglas) made a visit. On arriving at the Company's Hillwood jetty "a tramcar was waiting for the gentlemen, and in order to make the truck comfortable, Mr Blair had placed chairs for the visitors to sit on."

120 experienced Welsh and Cornish quarrymen were brought to Tasmania to work the mine and the village of Bangor created, with 50 cottages, a police station, school, boarding house and shops.


The original jetty at Hillwood was 9 metre long and 3.7 metres wide, drawing five metres at high tide, but in 1885 the Company announced plans to extend the jetty to 55 metres to access deeper water for larger steam powered vessels.

Sadly, the introduction of galvanised iron provided a cheaper roofing product and the demand for slate slumped.

There are still vestiges of the old tramway on several private properties and the general route is marked by the Old Bangor Tram Road, which runs between the Pipers River Road and Dalrymple Road near its junction with the East Tamar Highway.

And of course, looking up in Launceston, you will see Bangor slate on many stately homes, churches and public buildings, all shipped from the jetty at Hillwood.

BIRDS OF THE TAMAR By Jon Hosford

GOLDEN WHISTLER Pachycephala pectoralis



This Photo shows a male Golden Whistler telling a would-be intruder image to his territory that he is unwelcome. Like so many birds, Golden whistlers often succumb to human reflection images. They are used to water reflections, but our mirrors and windows often put them out of sync with their habitat.

This bird is common to all States of Australia and spread throughout the Pacific Islands. Male Golden Whistlers are noticeable by their rich, golden plumage, extending from their underparts and in a collar around the neck, contrasting with a jet-black hood and a white throat patch. The females are much duller in colour, grey and indistinct

They have the most important job to do in laying and incubating eggs, so need to keep indiscriminate against predators. Vocally they often join in duet with males in the breeding season. Young Golden Whistlers are rufous. As they mature, the plumage comes to resemble that of the female other than rufous edges to some wing feathers. Always note the shorter tail of immature birds; it is a reliable indication of age.

Golden Whistlers can be found in almost any wooded habitat and are present in mature well planted gardens. They feed on insects, spiders and other small anthropoids. They nest in dense low growth foliage like blackberries with a cup shaped shallow nest of bark and grass bound together with spider webs. Although they often sit quietly and unobtrusively in the canopy in your garden, their presence is usually detectable by their most melodious song sometimes in duet by male and female during the breeding season. Their song carries on the wind for 100s of metres. Get used to listening to your garden as well as appreciating its visual appeal. Birds are often more recognisable by their song than their appearance.

"ERICVALE" and TASMANIAN GOURMET SAUCE CO., Evandale

"Ericvale", as we see it today, is the result of development over the last 31 years. The simple Victorian cottage was built in 1890 and after initially being well cared for, it suffered many years of neglect and indeed, faced demolition. Tim and Julie Barbour saved it from this fate by taking on the formidable task of restoring and adding to the house and creating the garden.

The site is a difficult one with exposure to the harsh, drying north-westerly winds and biting southerlies and the garden falls steeply to the South Esk River. However, the view over the South Esk is a breathtaking feature! The Barbours have developed an evergreen shelter belt to take the full blast of the winds and have replaced some of the evergreens with deciduous trees to provide winter light to the topiary nursery.

Birch, New Zealand Beech, Pin Oak, Maples, Oaks and a Tulip tree provide further wind-filtering. Apples, Nashi, Peaches, Quince and Persimmon all contribute to shade and shelter and offer generous pickings of their bounty.

The "gorgeous" crabapple glade (malus gorgeous) was displaying its full autumn glory when we visited in April – covered with rich red crabapples – one of the best varieties for making crabapple jelly. The mingling canopies enhanced perfectly the view of the Balinese volcanic ash bowl on a pedestal.

The topiary nursery was full of well-shaped trees for sale and in fact, many had orange tags on them which indicated they had already been sold! I particularly loved the twisted and shaped holly tree!

We all enjoyed tasting a variety of relishes, sauces, mustards, etc., and quite a number of purchases were made. A few of us drove into Evandale afterwards for afternoon tea at "Ingleside Bakery and Café", with its beautiful Pierre de Ronsard rose-lined courtyard. It was a very special way to celebrate autumn and our last garden club activity for a couple of months.

THE BEES IN MY GARDEN

AROUND THE WORLD BEES ARE MAKING A COMEBACK.

The good news is the upside of the Covid 19 Lockdown.

The current COVID-19 lockdown is helping to reverse the sharp decline in bee populations in two significant ways. Fewer fumes and pollution particles from automobiles means that bees can more easily smell floral scents that lead them to plants that need pollinating.

Another reason that the bee population may be recovering is that, as the BBC noted, "Fewer cars on the roads means other benefits for bees too. The number of bee deaths is likely to fall as car journeys decrease during the lockdown, Brown notes. A 2015 study by Canadian researchers estimated that 24 billion bees and wasps are killed by vehicles on roads across North America every year." How many bees are killed this way in Australia, I wonder.

While across the world people may be getting restless hunkered down in their homes, it is a positive reinforcement to know that the natural world is getting a reprieve as people forego their routine activities and contribute to less pollution. The bees are clapping their wings.

As a result, the George Town Council have taken over the total ongoing management of the Hillwood War Memorial Hall. After decades of the HPA being the "Hall Committee", it is disappointing that the Council have taken this course of action. The Hillwood Garden Club, the Hillwood Ladies Group and the HPA now have alternative meeting venues and should be contacted individually for their locations.

The Hillwood Structure Plan


George Town Council have released the latest version of the Hillwood Structure Plan via their website and everyone is urged to take a look and provide feedback directly to the Council. Public comment has been invited from the 22nd May to 4.00 p.m. 22nd June 2021 by way of written submissions to council@georgetown.tas.gov.au or to the General Manager, PO Box 161, George Town TAS 7253. The Council have also organised a drop-in session at the Hillwood War Memorial Hall on Tuesday 15th June from 4.00 p.m. to 7.00 p.m.

This Plan will affect everyone with the changes to land use dramatically increasing the number of housing lots through the proposed subdivisions and the widening and extension of roads despite the acknowledgement of the existence of threatened flora and fauna species and previous strong resistance by residents to the proposed changes now spanning five years. TasWater have advised that there is no spare capacity within the water supply system and doesn't have any plans to upgrade it. Population projections are based on the whole of the George Town Municipality and not just Hillwood and a priority appears to be the protection of the interests of developers and the major businesses in the area with the Plan stating that it will "protect the existing agricultural area along Hillwood Road" even though Council are also committed to "Taking a 'whole of community' approach to everything", If you love the hamlet of Hillwood the way it is and have some feedback for Council, then please have your say.
