OUR ENVIRONMENT MATTERS

A Cause for Change

The theme of this edition is clearly environment.

We choose to live here because we think it is special. When we come, we make changes. These changes often have a subtle, vet lasting impact on the natural environment that attracted us to where we have chosen to live. As a community we need to heed the advice of those who observe these impacts, and adjust our habits so that those changes do not ultimately come back to change this place into a place we no longer wish to live.

Hillwood Progress Association met with Minister Sarah Courtney on the 28th of March at Egg Island Point over the concerns we have over the change of status and some management policies for the area. One of our major concerns is that Parks have recently changed the use of this public area from the C 1840 as "Reserved for the recreational use by the community"- " Never to be sold" to "CLS is the primary authority for maintain the area for its 'intended' purpose as a natural values area with riparian communities." CLS then states that the area (Egg Island Point) is no longer an area maintained for use by the Public."

The changes were made without any community consultation or notification. We were able also to express our concerns that on two occasions CLS/ Parks has provided Parliamentarians with false and misleading information to questions asked on our behalf re management issues. For example: in reply to questions asked by Ivan Dean MLC, CLS/Parks stated that in part "Hillwood Progress Association has shown no interest in maintaining the Egg Island Point Reserve."

This despite the fact that HPA has been in continuing contact and negotiation

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with CLS/Parks since 2010. We have spent \$1,000 of our money to restore the beach, and community members clean up rubbish, remove noxious weeds and have offered to provide two picnic table sets to the value of \$1,000 for installation on the Point. This project has not proceeded because CLS/Parks will charge us \$647.80 for the privilege.

Minister Courtney has agreed to a further meeting to discuss other concerns.

Egg Island Point is the largest Public Access area between George Town and Launceston on the East Tamar, providing the Public direct access with the River for recreation.

The primary use should be for Public Community use.

WHY BEES LOVE MY GARDEN

Tasmania In January 2019: Record Warm and Record Dry

This is the headline from BOM, the Bureau of Meteorology's report, and, as we are all too well aware, the warm weather has continued for months without any significant rain. Isn't it frustrating when there's a bit of a sprinkle, and then it turns out to be a tease, and then it dries up and nothing happens!

Our gardens are stressed, but just think how bad it is for the birds, bees and butterflies.

You might already have a birdbath in your garden, but it's not much help for bees, because they can't easily access the water. But, if you put a small rock or some pebbles or marbles in the water, to create little islands that the bees can land on close to the water, they'll be very happy. Better still would be to have a dedicated water-bowl just for bees, because, apparently, they use their sense of smell to initially locate the water. Adding a very small amount of dissolved sugar does the trick. Once they know where their water source is,

you should just give them fresh plain water, changing it every couple of days.

The bees will be starting their winter hibernation soon, so perhaps this is a good time to think about the flowers and flowering shrubs you already have in your garden and check them against the list below to see if you have enough that are especially bee friendly. Then you can plan your Spring planting.

Flowers such as Alyssum, Calendula, Catmint, Cornflower, Poppy, Marigold, Lavender, Forget-Me-Nots, Nasturtium, Cosmos, Salvias, and Zinnia should see your garden become a hive of activity.

Herbs such as Sage, Rosemary, Basil, Thyme, Borage and Mint are also favourites.

Bees are drawn to bright colours, particularly blue, white and purple, so planting bee friendly flowers in your garden will attract bees to your garden and provide them with the pollen and nectar they need to survive.

Doing Our Bit to Save the World's Bees

Did you know that close to the port area of Bell Bay, Devonport and Hobart there are forty-five specially monitored beehives? These are sentinel beehives that have been set up by Biosecurity Tasmania, and have an essential role in the part that Tasmania plays in Australia's early warning system.

What they're guarding against is Varroa destructor, or varroa mite, which originated in Asia in Asian honey beehives. Since the 1960s it has spread across the globe, with Australia the only major honey-producing country still free of the pest.

The National Bee Pest Surveillance Program places working honey beehives close to ports, which beekeepers then regularly test to see if any pests or exotic bees have hitched their way in on a ship.

"The hives are tested every six weeks for all the exotic pests that we want to keep out of Australia. It's a barrier, an early warning system," says Karla Williams, coordinator of the National Bee Pest Surveillance Program in Tasmania.

The program also sees catch boxes placed around ports — empty hives designed to attract bee swarms that might have stowed away on a visiting ship.

Because our state is free of the Varroa mite and other bee pests, such as the small hive beetle, Tasmania's bees are a sought-after commodity, and do their bit to help boost countries with declining bee populations.

Each year Tasmania exports bees to Canada and the United States where thousands are lost over the cold winter months and to varroa and other pests.

This makes the job of the sentinel bees not just important for the state but for the world.

If you are interested in keeping bees and would like to be part of the program, check out the Biosecurity Tasmania website. Even simply having a thriving bee community in your garden means you're doing your bit to keep our bee population in tip-top condition.

What Our Native Bees Love

Native bees, many of which are stingless, prefer native flowers so Swan River Daisies are a must, as are Abelia, Buddleja (Butterfly Bush) Callistemon (Bottlebrush) Eucalyptus and Angophora (Gum Trees) Grevillea (Spider Flower) and Leptospermum (Tea Tree). They also love daisies and lavender.

I've just given myself a nice little tick of approval as I've got all of the species that native bees love growing in my garden, but I can plan to lift my game by growing native wildflowers under my apple trees. For a few years now I've been letting the grass grow long under these apple trees, and I no longer have coddling moth problems. My apple trees used to be plagued with them, and I tried every commercial remedy. Then one day I noticed that in old paintings of orchards, where they also used to have sheep grazing, I observed that the grass grew long under the apple trees, and this was centuries before insecticides. I thought, I'll try that. And voila, no more coddling moth. Apparently the long grass makes it difficult for the larvae to get back up the tree to infest the fruit. So, amongst the grass, I want to plant native wildflowers that flower early to entice the bees to pollinate the nearby apricot trees. Over the last couple of years these apricots have been blossoming very early, before the bees in my garden have properly finished hibernating, and there's not much around to entice them out of their winter accommodation. The result is that they've borne very little fruit, whereas further along in the garden I have late season apricots that are producing lots of fruit. Problem solved? Hope so!

Not Only Bees!



It was a conversation with a friend who works for the Tasmanian Land Conservancy that prompted a decision to officially register the green and gold frogs that have called our garden home this summer, with the Natural Values Atlas (NVA).

The NVA is a Tasmanian government initiative, little known outside local council planning departments and conservation circles, that: "provides authoritative and comprehensive information on Tasmania's natural values." It uses a database to assist conservation and environmental scientists searching for information on the more than 20,000 Tasmanian flora and fauna species, and includes maps that show their location and range. The NVA is also the 'go to' site for town planners, who have to assess the environmental impacts of all development

application projects before they can receive council approval. This includes an awareness of threatened and vulnerable species of plants, insects and animals that could potentially be at risk.

With so much housing development happening or planned for this area it's important for both developers and planners to know where vulnerable and endangered flora and fauna are found, so the necessary steps can be taken to ensure their habitat is respected and protected. The NVA therefore is always seeking to know more about where populations of Tasmania's unique plants, insects and animals are located.

Long-term residents who are familiar with greens and golds may remember their presence in the Windermere and Swan Bay area was first highlighted during the pulp mill campaign. Once common throughout much of Tasmania, the amphibian is now a state and federally listed species, and was generally considered extinct in our area, so not unnaturally conservationists were excited to discover these frogs were actually alive and thriving along the East Tamar.

Frogs worldwide face a number of threats including habitat loss from deforestation, land clearance, and the chytrid fungus disease that has wiped out many species globally. I know we aren't alone in having these comparatively rare green and golds happily hopping about

the garden, basking in the sunshine from late spring through to early autumn. And I also know the NVA is keen to record other sightings in our area of this ecologically important Tasmanian frog. So if you've also spotted these delightful bright green amphibians in your garden, maybe sitting in the strawberry patch, among the vegies, or close by a dam or pond, please consider registering them with the NVA. https://www.naturalval-uesatlas.tas.gov.au/#HomePage

Admittedly the process is a little tricky but the support people are extremely helpful and will be more than happy to guide you through the procedure.

Reporting on Past Events



Smoke Alarms

Only working smoke alarms save lives!

- You should install a photoelectric smoke alarm in each sleeping area (bedroom), hallway and living area. Smoke alarms should be supported by a home fire escape plan.
- Test alarms monthly.
- Vacuum dust from alarms every six months.
- Replace batteries once a year. Some alarms have 10 year lithium batteries that do not need replacing every year.
- Mains powered smoke alarms also have back-up batteries - check with the manufacturer if your model has batteries that need to be replaced regularly, or whether it has a re-chargeable battery.
- Young children are likely to sleep through the sound of a smoke alarm, so you must alert them to a fire and help them escape to safety
- Installation of a smoke alarm is quick and easy. Follow the manufacturer's instructions. Generally, because smoke rises, mounting in the middle of the ceiling is recommended.
- Maximum protection can be gained from interconnecting smoke alarms - when one smoke alarm operates, all connected alarms will operate.
- All alarms have a use by date of 10 years, after this time, the entire alarm must be replaced.

Fire extinguishers & fire blankets







REMEMBER - Saving lives through a quick escape is far more important than saving property.

You should be trained in the use of an extinguisher or fire blanket to use them safely and effectively

An emergency is not the time to read instructions.

If you do not know how to use a fire extinguisher or fire blanket:

- [Get down, get low, get out smoke is poisonous, get underneath it on your hands and knees, and crawl to the nearest safe exit.
- 2. Shut the doors behind you to stop the spread of fire.
- Shout Fire! Fire! Fire! to warn others.
- 4. Ensure everyone is out of the building.
- 5. Get out and stay out never go back inside.

- Call triple zero '000' from a mobile or a neighbour's phone
