### Dilston By Pass Update

The By Pass Safety Committee has provided an update to the community about the 'state of play' regarding the By Pass.

DIER had 2 weeks to respond after the Council Meeting resolutions of March 2nd clearly recommended roundbouts for the intersections on the proposed bypass.

This period has lapsed without official objection to the Council's resolutions. There have been several communications between the committee and representation from DIER and Minister Graeme Sturgess.

It appears that the community concerns over the safety issues expressed on the plans for the Bypass have been recognized, and DIER is now designing an amendment to plans to put before Council at its next sitting. The Launceston Examiner is reporting the current progress of these negotiations accurately and residents can be assured that the committee will act until the best outcomes have been achieved.

The community support for this proposal has demonstrated clearly that communities acting in unison can make a difference to proposed government infrastructure.

It is highly desirable that full consultation and co-operation be consistently pursued by government planning agencies in projects that are likely to affect the safety and well being of citizens.

It is a credit to the Safety Committee that its members have pursued this issue rigorously from the outset with a clear expression of community support.

Council has clearly listened and been receptive to the community debate and push to get the best outcomes for our future.

This promises to be a most successful development for the Dilston/ Windermere/Swan Bay community.

We owe a big thank you to those members of our community who have been leaders in this campaign.

When outcomes are clearly defined, we can move forward to a future that will clearly enhance the safety and wellbeing of this community. Editor..

As we near the end of the summer fire season and head into autumn we can recall the warnings last October that the eastern ,south and central north of Tasmania were under threat of serious fire activities in the coming months due to low winter rains and heavy fuel loads. Thankfully this did not occur in our area of responsibility and we would like to think it was partly due to responsible land owners clearing and making safe their properties and the quick "hot day" response initiated by Tasmania Fire Service to vegetation, incidents.

Across Bass Strait, Victoria was not so lucky with the worst fire weather imaginable causing devastating damage and loss of many lives. Forthcoming analysis's of these fires could result in changes to council building regulations, haz-

## Nature Notes by Jon Hosford

#### **BROWN** THORNBILL- Acanthiza pusilla

One of the great challenges for bird watchers in Tasmania is clearly to distinguish the Tasmanian Thombill

(A.ewingii) from its more common relative the Brown Thornbill (A. pusilla). In our district it would be most unusual to see a Tasmanian Thornbill as this species is almost invarably confined to the wet schlerophyl and rain forests of Tasmania.

To confuse matters, the Brown Thornbill can also sometimes be found in these forests also, but in the dry area the Thornbills are invariably Brown Thornbills.

The true test for a species is that they do not interbreed, and ornothologists need adequate evidence to distinguish closely related birds as species rather than a race or sub-species of the same species. Races are usually formed through geographical separation and mutation over time that leads to genetic variation in colour, call or behaviour.

#### SO....

The bird you see around your garden in pairs or intermixed with Yellow-rumped Thornbills are most likely Brown Thornbills.

They feed mainly on insects but may sometimes eat seeds from grasses, nectar or fruit, mostly in the understory of low trees.

The female builds a small oval domed nest with a partially hooded entrance near the top out of grasses bark and other materials, lining it with feathers, fur or soft plant down. The nest is usually low down in prickly bushes grass clumps or ferns. Unfortunately this makes them particularly vulnerable to cats.
