# YES WE CAN! - COMMUNITY WANTS ITS CHURCH.

This community moves to a new level with the news recently that the Tasmanian Diocesan Council of the Anglican Church has accepted the principle that listed churches in its sale plan can exclude their church from sale by contributing 25% of the expected net proceeds of the sale to the Sexual Redress Fund.

In this community, the fund as at publication stands at \$36,000+.

Aligned to the Parish's Redress Fund and acknowleged by the Parish, a community group has established a registered charity to top up the Redress account if it is needed, and further to fund the ongoing conservation and maintenance needs of St Matthias'.

This fund is particularly designed for those who wish to support the presence of the Church in the district and its heritage preservation as a graveyard and worship centre.

# Time to plant **Onions for Summer**

Salad onions such as the mild flavoured Red Odourless Onion are great for summer salads.

I usually buy seedlings after the month of July and transplant them into a bed that has been finely worked and fertilised with 500 gms of Dynamic Lifter per square metre.

By digging shallow trenches you can lay the onion seedlings in the trench and backfill easily with your fingers.

Water the seedlings in well and regularly fertilise with Seasol during the vegetative growth stage.

Onions rely on a strong vegetative growth stage and then store the nutrition of this in their bulbs before throwing up a seed head in the next season.

When you notice the onions are starting to bulb, stop the water to the plants if you can and allow the tops to die down and fall over.

You can them pull the onions and lay them on top of the bed until they have completely dried on top.

This way they should store well until the winter if you haven't used them.

## Repond Geelong is the Bellarine



# LETTER TO THE EDITOR: Egg Island Point Hillwood Reserved For Public Use Since C1840

#### June 2018

Crown Land Services have further restricted Public Access on the Point by placing 145 limestone boulders to supposedly "address the significant increase of late of illegal wood hooking, (cutting down of a significant number of dead trees) which is occurring at present". The dead trees were, in fact, felled in February 2018 by a CLS contractor!!!. The area has not been tidied up and looks like a war zone.

"Boulder barriers will also reduce the ongoing unauthorised clearing of native vegetation by tractor and slasher. The last grass cutting and slashing was carried out by Justice Dept Corrective Services people at the end of May 2018 using whipper snippers and hand-pushed lawn mowers. They did slightly extend the mowed areas by cutting native grasses and tussocks. Prior to that, the CLS contractor cut all of the grassed areas on the point in December 2017. No significant areas of open grassland of the point have been created by slashing native vegetation. CLS also claim that the boulders were also necessary to prevent the cutting of native vegetation by the Contractor. Surely it is not necessary to use expensive boulders to mark the area to be cut.

Open and lightly wooded areas on the end of Egg Island Point have existed for over 100 years. A significant amount of taxpayers money has been wasted placing the 145 limestone boulders to prevent activities that are either not happening or that they will not prevent.

Two recent statements by CLS should concern all users of the Point. "CLS are the authority for maintenance of the area (Egg Island Point) for its intended

riparian communities". !!! CLS also state that "Egg Island is no longer considered as an area maintained for use by the general public". CLS provide no facilities on the Point. Why are they trying to restrict people from using and enjoying this wonderful area?



Community members are welcome to participate in an introduction to Nordic Walking to be conducted at The SHED, 308 John Lees Drive, on Wednesday October 24th at 9:am. The session will be run by Harriet Jory of the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

Using Nordic Walking poles combined with the correct technique engages all muscles from head to toe, which makes for a very effective aerobic activity, easier than regular walking and a perfect way to enjoy the great outdoors.

You will need your own walking poles to participate. Entry is by a donation to the RFDS. Poles can be purchased at Outdoor shops or on EBay for as little as \$15 per pair.

ETMS is grateful to TOTAL AIR SUPPLIES Propietor Arthur Stow, who has donated materials to the value of \$650 to fit out our compressed air supply plant. This integrated system allows air tools to be used from many points within the SHED. It will be completed within the next week or so.

Several other pieces of equipment, purchased with Grant money successfully sought from The Australian Mens' Shed Association have been installed, and will allow tool sharpening, sand blasting, grinding, and safe entry and exit for materials to the table saw. A sheet metal folding machine has been fitted and trialled. AMSA grants are accessible by all Men's Sheds around Australia and are funded by the Federal Government.

An extra room adjoining the SHED has been fitted with our dust extraction system and compressor. This is now functional and will limit the wood dust within the SHED.

An untimely delay in the installation of 3 phase power has stalled the use of a metal lathe and a mechanical hacksaw.

# Wood Heaters | Chimneys and Flues

In a similar trend to 2017, Tasmania Fire Service brigades around the state have been responding to wood heater related fire incidents, in many cases involving the chimney or flue as it exits through the ceiling and roof cavities. Dilston Fire Brigade have been requested to attend a number of properties to give advice on condition and installation of flues, and have noted some installations that are in need of maintenance.

Our advice to all residents is first and foremost to ensure that their heater and flu installation has been done by an accredited installer; or if you have concerns over the condition of an existing installation to seek advice from some accredited people. Yellow Pages will point you in the direction of a number of businesses in Launceston that can provide this service.

We also advise that you ensure your flue is cleaned

prior to being used in the colder months. The build up of soot and creosote is the major cause of chimney and flue fires, and can in worst case lead to surrounding roofing materials catching fire.



The moisture content of the fire wood you are burning will have a major effect on the rate of build up of soot and creosote in the flue. It is found that many people try to burn wood that is too wet. The ideal moisture content range for fire wood is between 13 and 18%. Anything over 20% will increase the build up in your chimney flue, and can be seen as a tar like substance.

How do you tell we hear you asking?!

Try to ensure your firewood has been allowed to dry for

an extended period of time; i.e. don't use wood that has been freshly cut up! If buying in ask the supplier how long the wood has been drying for.

Furthermore we recommend you obtain a moisture meter in order to be sure. They can be purchased online for under \$20 and are a cheap investment in maintaining the "health" of your wood heater and chimney/flue. As always, we are more than happy to provide advice and point you in the right direction!

# Fire extinguishers & fire blankets







**REMEMBER** – Saving lives through a quick escape is far more important than saving property.

You should be trained in the use of an extinguisher or fire blanket to use them safely and effectively.

## An emergency is not the time to read instructions.

If you do not know how to use a fire extinguisher or fire blanket:

- Get down, get low, get out smoke is poisonous, get underneath it on your hands and knees, and crawl to the nearest safe exit.
- Shut the doors behind you to stop the spread of fire.
- Shout Fire! Fire! Fire! to warn others.
- Ensure everyone is out of the building.
- Get out and stay out never go back inside.
- 6. Go to your safe meeting place such as your letterbox.
- 7. Call triple zero '000' from a mobile or a neighbour's phone.
- Wait for the Fire Service to arrive.

LINDSAY MILLAR had a nice write-up in Sunday Examiner 8th July regarding his involvement with the ROYAL FLYING DOCTOR SERVICE. Lindsay retired after more than 60 years involvement but is still fully involved although no longer on the committee.

Lindsay is also passionate about Hillwood and is at present negotiating, through the HILLWOOD PROGRESS ASSOCIATION INC as the PROJECT MANAGER, for local involvement in the management of EGG ISLAND POINT RESERVE. Lindsay, as you might remember, was the prime mover behind the restoration of the little beach at the Point.

MAST have now removed the well -used Low-tide ramp at Craigburn on the grounds that it was unsafe. Crown Lands and Parks have also closed the access to launch over the shore on the Western side of Egg Island Point with no reason, prior notice or consultation. This access has been in continuous use for over 50 years.

If the Egg Island Point ramp is unusable due to strong South East winds or tide, there is now no available access to launch a boat from a trailer, if needed for a rescue or retrieval, between George Town and Windermere on the East Tamar.

This is not an acceptable situation and places live at risk in a dangerous area of the river.

Lindsay's second report is to advise of a NEW AREA AT HILLWOOD NOW AVAILABLE FOR PUBLIC USE.

The Hillwood Progress Association Inc have been successful in lobbying George Town Council to lease the area of open grassed Crown Land bounded by Craigburn Road, Hillwood Jetty Road and Egg Island Creek.

The area is now open for Public Use e.g. Horse Riding, Dog Walking, Bike Riding or just as a walking track. An area could be easily fenced off to create an off-lead dog-exercise area.

Current access is off Craigburn Road, east of Ridge street. When funds are available, a new entrance will be constructed. No 4WD or Trail Bikes, please.

# **BIRDS OF THE TAMAR**

# Tasmanian Wedge-tailed Eagle (Aquila Audax Fleayi)

The Wedge-tailed Eagle subspecies Aquila audax fleayi occurs only in Tasmania, and is distinguished by its size (being Australia's largest bird of prey) and wedge-shaped tail. It kills and scavenges on animals including reptiles, birds and mammals, across a wide range of habitats, from the coast to highland areas. It defends a large territory, nesting in patches of mature forests with sheltered aspects throughout Tasmania (including large offshore islands). The total adult population has been estimated as less than 1000 birds. Principal threats include loss of nesting habitat, nest disturbance, collisions (with artificial structures, vehicles and aircraft), electrocution and persecution. While individual responses vary, disturbance occurring even many hundreds of metres away can cause breeding birds to temporarily leave eggs or chicks at risk, or even to desert their nest site for years. Disturbances involving visible people or helicopters can be particularly serious. Population numbers may increase if nest protection is more effective and unnatural mortality rates reduced.

The majority of Wedge-tailed Eagle breeding activity typically occurs between August and January, but this varies between eagle pairs and from year to year. The breeding season includes the highly sensitive courting period, when birds are at or near the nest assessing levels of disturbance and nest suitability just prior to laying; this courting period most often occurs in July, but may begin with nest lining in June. In some years chicks will not fledge until as late as March, with disturbance prior to this event potentially causing young birds to attempt to fly before they are fully fledged.

Rob Sharman of Dilston reports a most unusual sighting recently of 4 Wedgetailed eagles together in the mature eucalpt opposite the Windermere Café. I would think that at this time of the year it would be most likely courting behaviour and bonding activity of these birds prior to mating. These birds are often seen in flight over Gaunt Hill, and there is an established nesting site in the Native Point Reserve. Parks and Wildlife

Officer Nick Mooney suggests that this nesting site is known to be used by both Wedge-tailed Eagles and White-bellied sea-eagle in different years. It is known that eagles can use the same nesting site for up to 50 years. These birds have a potential life-span of about 20 years, so it is most likely an established family territory.


A new roadkill app is being trialled in Tasmania, allowing people to report roadkill sightings so that hotspots can be determined.

A donation from a zoo in North America has facilitated the development of a new Tasmanian smartphone app for reporting roadkill sightings.


The Roadkill Tas app, which is free to download, is designed to make it easier for Tasmanians to report roadkill, using GPS to enable people to record the precise location of any sightings.

It was made possible through a \$20,000 donation from the Tasmanian Devil Ambassador Program at Fort Wayne Children's Zoo in Indiana in the United States.

The app was developed by New Zealandbased company Thundermaps and will be trialled for two years. Report roadkill incidents easily with the tap of a button
