The Signal Station Tavern is the “local” for East Tamar residents. It has always been known as a “working man’s pub”, but licensee Andrew Isaac and his partner Diane Leary have plans to change all that.

“Some of the regulars have been drinking here for 50 years,” Andrew said, “but, with the many new people building and moving into the area, we want to make this a much more family-friendly hotel.”

“We want to put more emphasis on good quality, affordable food, both in our Bistro and for takeaways.”

In charge of the kitchen is Gail Saunders, who was previously cooking at the popular Mowbray Hotel.

Andrew Isaac is a local who grew up in Magazine Road, and worked in local orchards, in saw mills and at Bell Bay over the years. John Lees was his uncle.

He had been a customer of “The Sig” for 35 years before taking it over.

He and Diane have already been making changes – the bottleshop has been upgraded, carrying a much bigger range of beer, wine and spirits, including many Tasmanian wines.

The Bistro has been the main focus, open now for lunch and dinner from Thursday to Sunday.

There is an extensive takeaway menu which includes pizzas, burgers and roasts.

Another innovation is the Car Boot Sale in the Tavern carpark on the first Sunday of the month. Pay \$10 for a car space and sell all those unwanted items.

And you can enjoy a coffee from the Bean Station, Andrew and Diane’s mobile coffee trailer.

Some more information on the Burnside Granary

Also known as “Burnside Mill”, or even “Thorpe Mill”, or having been built by Mr Bransgrove as a distillery- who knows what the true purpose of the building was, and who could have built it?

My thoughts are that a William Elliott could have been involved in the building of this large barn.

Not the William Elliott who worked as a Miller for Dr. Gaunt 1838.(whose wife’s name was Margaret) .

This William was married to Jean, from Roxburghshire, Scotland. They arrived with 3 children on “Tranmere” as indentured servants in 1826, for the Van Diemen’s Land Company.

(William born 12 January 1795, Yetholm, Roxburghshire, married Jean Shields on 15 December 1822 in Yetholm, Roxburghshire, Scotland. Died 1853 Launceston (58).Tas. COLONIST 3 Feb. 1853 p.2)

14 men, 4 women and 3 children along with 9 convicts had journeyed from England. 2 more men were engaged in Launceston.

Along with the Elliotts came John Sherwood.

John Sherwood , ploughman, from Yorkshire, was one who seems to be connected to Launceston, as he was granted land on West Tamar as well as East. (Died at Circular Head in 1841- 40 yo – a farm overseer).

An advert in The Advertiser Thurs.7 March 1833 ,p.1 by William Elliott cautioned trespassers on land granted to John Sherwood. (West Tamar)

John Sherwood was owner of 320 acres (East Tamar) before William Elliott, who claimed the land in 1838.

In February 1836 William was recorded as master of convict Michael Conway, who was brought before Dr. Gaunt, JP, for misbehavior.

Maybe William Elliott was working for / with John. Even at some stage, building a large brick barn?

Hobart Town Gazette Thurs. 4 October p.4 William Elliott 320 acres, Dorset (originally John Sherwood).

Within a year, William Elliott was declared insolvent.

The family left the property around January 1840, as a report in Cornwall Chronicle on 11 January that year tells that the family was held up by bushrangers when they were packed to leave.

When the Elliott family lived there, the property was named Mount Elliott.

By March 1840, J A Denham was advertising for harvest workers there, (Cornwall Chronicle 14 March, and 20 August 1840). and the property name was Hamden Vale .

At this time, William Bransgrove had been renting “Thorpe “ from Captain George Coulson and had purchased 100 acres next door. In a few years time, Mr Bransgrove was able to purchase the 320 acres, as James Denham was presumed drowned at sea in 1842.

So William Bransgrove’s name finally became associated with the property, but it is my opinion that he wasn’t responsible for construction of the building we see today. Perhaps he did apply to run a distillery there.

But as for the construction of the “Burnside Granary”, my suggestion is the stone mason/ bricklayer, William Elliott had a large part to play – even becoming insolvent in the process.



BIRDS OF THE TAMAR By Jon Hosford

European Goldfinch *Carduelis carduelis*

These colourful seed eaters from Europe are now well established in our gardens. They are a little bird with a red face bordered by black with a white head. Their black wing has a broad golden bar.

I have never heard a complaint about their dietary invasion. They eat grass seeds and thistle seeds. They prefer to nest in dense introduced species rather than natives and build a fine cup shaped nest of rootlets and grass lined with plant down, in fruit trees or in cypress, pine trees.

They produce 4-6 eggs and raise these chicks regularly. Their tinkling calls can be heard through your garden as they go about their business.

The Goldfinch was introduced to Australia in the 19th century, and their populations quickly increased, and their range expanded greatly.

In Australia, they now occur from Brisbane to the Eyre Peninsula, and are also spread throughout New Zealand.

Dr Matthias Gaunt

Dr Matthias Gaunt was a prominent figure in the early history of the East Tamar. Best known for giving Windermere its name, and for funding the construction of St Matthias Church, he became a prominent figure in the early colony.

Matthias Gaunt studied medicine at Edinburgh University, served as a Naval Surgeon, then practised in London before deciding to emigrate to Van Diemen's Land. He arrived in Tasmania on the Eliza in May, 1831, with his wife Frances and their four children.

Dr Gaunt took up a grant of 2,560 acres, which he named Windermere, on the east bank of the Tamar River. He

never practised medicine in Tasmania, but succeeded in a number of commercial enterprises, including the colony's first steam driven saw mill in 1837, at Windermere, not far south of the St Matthias Church.

The following year he converted this into the Union Flour Mill, which produced high quality flour for 30 years. He established a vineyard at Windermere in 1841, importing cuttings from Sydney, and the vines were bush grown without trellising.


He was a frequent exhibitor in Horticultural Shows and the grapes from his vineyard dominated competition for several years until in 1849 he graciously decided "not to exhibit for prizes in order to promote more competition". As with many vigneron of the era, the vineyard was only a small part of his busy life, and, despite producing wine for 30 years, there is no evidence of his wine ever being offered for sale.

Like many of the early settlers he played a prominent part in civic affairs, as a magistrate, a warden of the Marine Board and a director of the Commercial Bank of Tasmania, the Cornwall Fire & Marine Insurance Co and the Launceston Gas Co.. He was a prominent figure in the Anti-Transportation League, founded by John West.

When leaving England, he had promised his devout wife that, if there was no church where they settled, he would build one. True to his word he financed the construction of the beautiful St Matthias Church at Windermere, where he lies today.

Sadly, his wife Frances, who died in 1880, was buried in Launceston's Cypress Street cemetery, not in the graveyard of the church that was built for her.

NOTE: Dr Gaunt's name was generally spelt Matthias in the newspapers of the time, but his headstone reads Mathuis and it is said that he always signed his name Mathias.

BRIGADES NEWS...

Both brigades are continuing to focus on our winter training programs, with focus on our newer members and ensuring that they are ready for the fire season to come.

As part of our leadership mentoring program, Dilston 3rd Officer Ben, is currently in the acting Brigade Chief role, and is ably supported by the brigade leadership group. Ben has recently completed a leadership development course and he is now given the change to put a



few of those new skills into action.

Property preparedness

Whilst there has been a number of rain events bringing us higher rain totals over the next couple of months, it is envisaged that there will still be substantial fires in the landscape after Christmas. Preparing your property now but removing vegetation from around your buildings may well assist you and the fire service should the worst happen. The wetter than average pre Christmas period cannot be taken for granted, as was evidenced by the Emergency Warning placed on a vegetation fire at St Helens in early October 2020. There will be more on this in the December edition of Smoke Signals!

Home Fire Safety

There has unfortunately been a spike across the state this winter in fires involving residential structures. Of these,

clothing that has been left to dry in front of a heater has been found to be a contributor.

The TFS advised that drying clothing be no closer than 2M to heat source, and preferably greater. If hanging clothing out overnight to dry, then is it best placed well clear of any heating device, and of course, we recommend that smoke alarms be fitted in the house.

HPA PRESIDENTS REPORT 2021 Presented at the AGM 2nd August 2021

What a year it's been in Hillwood, and it's fantastic to see so much interest in the Hillwood Progress Association Incorporated (the "HPA") as it has evolved following the formation of a new committee in 2020 and having a never-before-seen solid strategic foundation on which to operate.

On reflecting about the past year, the proverb, "Actions Speak Louder Than Words" seems fitting as the theme.

Let me start with the Words. There have been a lot of Words written and spoken about the HPA, Committee and Members and that has had a somewhat negative impact on those that are easily distracted by Words. Sadly, it has resulted in several losses from the HPA's activities portfolio that, in the past, have benefitted the entire community of Hillwood. Without much needed volunteers, these activities just couldn't proceed. Some of these that failed to eventuate are the Annual Car Boot Sale, the Christmas in July Trivia Night and the Hillwood History Day. The Hillwood War Memorial Hall is now being managed by George Town Council with an income loss to the HPA of \$2,500 per year plus the additional income from Hall Bookings. The restoration of the Avenue of Honour became too much of a challenge for some and thankfully is now being progressed by others.

Now importantly, it's time to share the Actions that, as President of the HPA, I can say have resulted in tangible progress for the Hillwood community.

1. The HPA membership base has more than doubled and at the time of writing is now 43 a great achievement after years of declining numbers.
2. The HPA event of the year in Hillwood was "Meet the Candidates" held in March with about 50 attendees, money raised through donations and great publicity for Hillwood in The Examiner.
3. HPA has represented the Hillwood community at three key George Town events.
4. After seemingly decades of neglect, the Hillwood War Memorial Hall has had the start of its makeover with the installation of the acoustic panels now complete and making a significant difference. In addition, there has been major improvements with more on the way impacting food handling compliance, cleaning, safety, security, signage and upgrading of the facilities. This has happened after fervent and extensive lobbying.
5. An HPA focus on our local environment has seen seven different clean-ups take place concentrating on the restoration of Egg Island Point Reserve to its natural state, cleaning up around the Pontoon and the removal of rubbish and weeds, including an area that was actually a crime scene!
6. The marketing of the HPA through print, social media and online portals has been well received and generated a lot of interest, healthy discussion and debate.
7. There has been HPA involvement in eleven community consultations including the Hillwood Structure Plan and the George Town Municipality Sport and Recreation Strategy.
8. HPA Members had the opportunity to participate in numerous educational forums throughout the year offered by our partners.
9. Improvements for safety on the water and on our roads has been addressed by the HPA involving a number of the key stakeholders with some major improvements having already been made and more to come.
10. An overhaul of some of the administration of the HPA has been made.

There are many that need to be thanked for their support of the HPA including the Federal Government, Launceston City and George Town Councils, RSL Tasmania, the Premier of Tasmania, the Honourable Peter Gutwein and his State Government including Tasmania Police, the Department of Justice, the Department of State Growth and Parks and Wildlife.

This will be my last contribution to Smoke Signals as President of the HPA as I leave on a high achieving far more than I expected could be achieved, particularly given COVID-19. When I was originally asked to take on the role of President, I hadn't anticipated that through the success of the Actions outlined above (and others!), how many more opportunities could be presented to me that let me be actively involved in the Hillwood community.

Thank you and I wish the HPA and the incoming Committee all the best for the future.
