A lot of media focus on prepardeness for the upcoming Fire Season via ABC radio and TV advertising from the Tasmania Fire Service should leave no one in doubt as to what can happen if unprepared properties are subjected to rapid fire as was experienced at Dolphin Sands last week: three homes and several outbuildings lost. Land owners, councils and government all have a responsibility to keep hazards to a minimum, there is still time now to clear rather than leaving it until January or February.

WILL YOU SURVIVE?

Summer brings lots of joy, but also many dangers, bites and stings need to be cleaned promptly and a disinfectant applied localised redness needs to be watched, redness and swelling spreading and symptoms like tingling of the lips and shortness of breath need medical attention.

#### Snake bites:

immobilise the limb, apply a tight bandage and call the ambulance as hospital care is required.

Sunburn needs to be avoided, hats, block out, cover your self if out for long periods.

If you get burnt, apply plenty of non perfumed moisturiser and drink lots of water.

Dehydration—the hidden problem.

You need to be drinking enough water to be passing urine at least every two hours.

The urine needs to clear. Your need for water increases with exertion, food, alcohol and coffee.

#### Remember:

Do not drive, play sports or engage in activities in or on the water for at least two hours after drinking alcohol and eating big meals.

## Celery a Spring planting for a winter sensation

Celery can be quite a difficult crop to grow if you try to grow it from seed. It does not germinate well in cool weather. The best idea to grow celery successfully in cool climates is to start with strong seedlings purchased from a nursery and transplant them into prepared ground above a band of fertiliser about mid October once the weather has warmed up. If you do this they should bear well for you over autumn and winter.

Space your seedlings at 30cm x 30cm centres. This way they will help each other to grow strong and tall through competition.

Most celery varieites these days do not need blanching, but if you like your celery stalks white, cover the plants with a milk carton or a 30 cm

length of polypipe sawn in half so that the stalks are excluded from the light. Use rubber bands to hold the 2 sections of pipe together. Sprinkle snail bait around the plants as you do not want slugs to make a home within the covers you have established. Side dress the plants regularly with fertiliser or water with a foliar fertilizer. Celery plants love water and **must** be given liberal and regular amounts to grow well, especially in the heat of summer. It is hard to over water celery.

You can start to use the outer stalks about February in salads. They are fully mature by late Autumn which is when I use them for juices and in soups. You do not need to cut the entire plant as market gardeners do. Celery tolerates continuous light pickings through the Winter months lasting until it bolts to seed in the Spring.

### Nature Notes by Jon Hosford



#### White-breasted Sea-eagle

(Halmeetus leucogaster)

Those of you who have river views would well be aware of this magnificent predator, through its daily flights past your frontage. As one who is interested in birds, I often hear the presence before I see it, not because of any noise the bird makes but the alarm calls of those

that are below it on the food chain. My family of Lapwings is usually the first to let us know that something threatening is in the area. The Magpies are not far behind, along with the Ravens that harass this huge bird to let it know that it is unwelcome in their territory.

This bird goes to a great deal of trouble to survive and yet close observation by dedicated bird watchers would suggest that the chicks are highly competitive in the nest, resulting in the survival of only 1 chick from any successful hatch of usually two eggs. The eggs are incubated over 6-8 weeks mainly by the female with the male supporting directly by sitting occasionally and providing food for the brooding female.

The surviving young take 5 years to reach adult plumage and subsequent breeding maturity.

Human impact on these birds results in large variations in local populations although the species is not under threat as it is wide spread from Asia south to Australia.


Despite being called an eagle, the species is more closely related to the Kite family and feeds on fish and marine creatures within its coastal habitat. I have never witnessed a sea-eagle gather food but I managed this photo on a clear morning. The meal looks very much like an eel in the eagle's talons. The soles of the eagle's feet are actually spiked to aid the gripping of slimy creatures.

Look up when you next hear the birds in your garden making a fuss. There is always a good reason for this. You may be rewarded with the awe inspiring sight of one of these magnificent creatures.

### Valé Dudley Williams 1917-2009

It was with great sadness that we learned of the death of Dudley Williams, aged 92 on November 19th. Dudley passed away peacefully surrounded by his wife, Edie and his family, Helen and Bruce.

Dudley will be well remembered by those who were children in the district in the 1950s when he ran the bus service to schools in Launceston from this area. Dudley has been a church leader at St Matthias Anglican Church

Windermere since the 1960s where he was Secretary and Treasurer. Dudley was instrumental in establishing the Columbarium at Windermere when the church cemetery was officially closed.

There was no official plan for the cemetery and it became apparent that to continue burials there was to almost certainly invade the resting place of those who had been buried before. The plan for the Columbarium allowed extensions as necessary and will continue to be an option for interment in the foreseeable future.

This has remained a legacy that affords the opportunity for spiritual support for those who regard Windermere as their home.

Dudley remained active in the Fire Brigade and the church at Windermere until his failing health in recent years prevented him from regular attendance. Edie is still the Church organist and has continued Dudley's role in managing arrangements for the Columbariam.

A Service in remembrance of Dudley Williams will be held at St Matthias on Sunday December 13th at 2:00pm.

All those who would like to attend are warmly welcomed by Edie and the family along with the congregation of St. Matthias, Windermere.
