Development Requires Road Upgrade

A recent development application for 12 units as a tourist farm stay in Windermere Road, has brought to the surface the opinions of many residents who feel their safety and lifestyle will be compromised with the increase in traffic flow along the sub-standard road that services the areas of Windermere and Swan Bay.

The narrow and winding road is poorly surfaced in most parts to a depth of 150-200mm of seal. A recent upgrade of 100 metres is one of the few sections of the road that meets the Council's own standards for rural road construction, with a traffic volume of 200 <3000 vehicles per day. It has a seal depth of 300mm. New works are required to meet this standard.

Another recent seal section passing the property of proposed development is breaking up after 4 years and requires regular maintenance. Pedestrians are forced to share the roadway with traffic as there are no footpaths.

Most locals are respectful and expect walkers with dogs, and the occasional horse.

Tourists currently visit Windermere Woodcraft, the boat ramp and St Matthias Church regularly and are generally respectful of local road conditions.

Difficulties arise when new properties are developed and tradesmen, together with service vehicles, are

anxious to get their job done quickly. They often exceed speed limits that support the local conditions and cause walkers some concern for their safety.

Two school buses pick up and drop off local students twice per day. If you have ever followed these buses you know to be patient and let the students board and alight with safety.

Residents have chosen to live in this area for the serenity and the lifestyle it affords. We are charged higher than average rates at an AAV value for this privilege and because the river aspect is a main feature.

It may be argued that the river is not an asset of LCC and is not maintained by them. It should not therefore enter our rating calculations.

Sealed roads in Windermere were first introduced from 1963 with sections being added regularly to 1983. The last upgrades and extensions have occurred in the past 4 years to present day.

There is still a 1.3 km section of gravel road which potentially will be equally used by vehicles accessing the wine region to the north from the proposed development.

It is time for an serious upgrade of roads in this area and an acknowledgement of the duty of care Council owes to its rate payers before further allowing development that will increase traffic over sub standard roads.

Residents have been invited to comment on Council proposals. It is in your interests to do so if you seriously care for this area. Issue 194

A City of Launceston UPDATE creating safe pedestrian friendly access along Windermere Road

The City of Launceston is looking at options to provide safe pedestrian friendly access along Windermere Road from No. 98 to approximately the Jetty (approximately 4kms).

Several options will need considering as Windermere Road is narrow and windy and not all sections will be conducive to the same treatment.

We have submitted a request for funding in next year's budget but, as you would appreciate this is subject to the Council approval.

We are currently in the investigation stages and I have written to residents living along Windermere Road asking for your thoughts on what you believe to be the highest risk areas and on the proposal itself.

The date of reply for this response is December 22nd 2014.

We can consider extending this period of response, however residents are encouraged to contribute their ideas ASAP.

building a shared pedestrian/ cycleway along John Lees Drive, Dilston

Earlier this year, 25 local people attended a meeting in the Dilston Memorial Hall to talk about the proposal for a shared pedestrian/cycleway along 1.6km of John Lees Drive. The community support the proposal and the current status of the project is as follows:

The City of Launceston has confimation of 50% of the funding from the State Government. The City of Launceston has amended the Council budget for 2014/15 to provide our 50% of the funding.

The City of Launceston has supplied a plan of the proposal to the State Government to seek approval to work in a State road reserve. When that is received it will be necessary to enter a Grant Deed with the State government before works can commence.

The City of Launceston hopes to start construction in the current financial year.

It's amazing what a change on the face will do to the people you meet.







Your Health MEN'S HEALTH

Sadly in Australia (which includes Tasmania) men outnumber women in non-sex related deaths (e.g. a man cannot die in childbirth or of ovarian cancer) such as heart disease, lung cancers etc. Prostate cancer related deaths actually outnumber breast cancer related deaths.

Australian men do no live as long as Australian women. On average an Australian man can expect to live until the age of 79 whereas women can expect to live to 84.

Australian men are more likely to get sick from serious health problems than their female counterparts (diabetes, lung disease etc.)

Men are more likely to suffer from depression

In Australia more money is spent on the healthcare needs of women and children than is spent on the healthcare needs of men. As an example waiting rooms in medical practices have women's magazines and toys and there are now more female than male GPs in Australia and understandably men can be more comfortable discuss their health concerns with another male.

So please try and break these saddening statistics and trends and make yourself (or even let your partner make it) an appointment with your GP in the next month for a comprehensive check-up. If you are not comfortable with a female GP ask to see a male doctor.

You could even reward yourself afterwards!

Green & Gold In The Garden

The Green and Gold Frog in your garden is the sign of a healthy ecosystem.

It lives in weedy ponds, dams and streams and is most common in northern Tasmania, with some occurrences in the east and south of the State. We have a number of small populations locally. Green and Gold frogs are active in the warmer months during both day and night. They can sometimes be seen basking out of the water on logs or water vegetation. They have a varied diet of insects, lizards and other small frogs. The number and distribution of these frogs is declining as much of their habitat is disappearing. This may be due to such practices as draining land for other purposes, including

Letter to The Editor:

I've been taken to task over the distribution of Dilston Fire Brigade's Assets.

The small Swan Bay Fire Shed on my property was erected by the local brigade in the 1990s has been scheduled to be moved to Youngtown. It's claimed that Tasmania Fire Service knows what it's doing and that other brigades are in greater need.

With generally agreed opinions that the coming summer is likely to be a major bushfire event, the present use by the Tasmania Fire Service of a multi brigade attack on individual fires no matter where in the northern region is acceptable if only isolated fires are in question.

A major fire front event could overwhelm this approach and the call from the brigade's own region would lead to agonising decisions as to whether to stay and fight the fire or retreat and deal with what's happening at home.

This is where the reduction of our own brigade's resources is unhelpful.

We started with an elderly, and as it proved dysfunctional Willys tanker and a tanker trailer suitable for towing by a V8 or a 4WD.

By dint of intensive and successful fundraising and the construction of our own three vehicles we achieved what was considered a competent though minimal degree of response to severe fire situations.

To see this level of equipment reduced is a backward step.

Frog populations are in decline world wide due largely to loss of habitat.

You can help the survival of this great little animal locally in your garden by providing suitable cover in moist and shaded areas in your garden. Ponds need to have good vegetation cover on the edges and these frogs enjoy matted vegetation on the surface on which they can bask.

Your Summer fruits and vegies....

This summer has been a challenge with warmer than average spring temperatures. Apples have powdery mildew and other fungal diseases. Leaf vegetables are being eaten by caterpillars laid by moths we can't always see as they are active at night.

How do you survive if trying to grow your own food?

It is not easy. There are two words that summarise all.. **preventative persistence**.

This means using the right control at the right time, and unfortunately this takes a lot of learning.

In 45 years of gardening I am only just starting to realise that healthy plants need great soil, control of fungal diseases and a reasonable season in which to flourish.

There are no easy answers.

I have found that keeping a diary of **when** to expect **what**, has helped in the control of pests and fungal problems with food gardening.

I try to keep controls organic as much as possible.

These hints may help:

Builders lime mixed 1:10 with water will control many fungal diseases and also kill pear and cherry slugs. Sprayed every ten days when these pests and diseases are observed minimises leaf damage and helps to put the sugar into your fruit.

The reason: Most fungal diseases won't thrive in an alkaline environment, so spraying with a pH alkaline mixture of organic substances will creative an environment that will not sustain the fungus.

Pyrethrum is an alternative but it is very expensive and will only kill what it touches.

Ecocarb / Ecorose (Potassium bicarbonate) will control powdery mildew if applied every 10 days. An alternative is milk 1:10 . Yes , milk. It will actually kill powdery mildew if not too advanced and create an environment on the leaf that will not sustain the mildew.

HOWEVER I have found that the discipline needed to sustain these controls is inconvenient, and whilst in most seasons you will get a reasonable harvest you need to compromise to a greater extent each year because the control of these diseases is not being met by all gardeners. Therefore they will survive and multiply.

Open Gardens Australia

'Winderdoon' at 454 Windermere Rd is being featured as one of 2 gardens in Australia open to the public on January 10-11. Many gardens feature flowers and well manicured feature rooms. The Winderdoon garden is very much a country garden with features of Tasmanian endemics, even though not in flower at this time, vegetables and a small vineyard and fruit orchard that sustains the owner's needs with plenty to donate to local support programs.

If you are interested to see how it can be achieved, the garden is open on the weekends of January 10-11.

Admission charges support Gardens Australia and The Christopher Strong Trust for training teachers in Tanzania.
