#### **CHANGE OF GUARD - CAN YOU HELP?**

The Editor of Smoke Signals for the past 10 years, Jon Hosford, has announced his intention to retire from the role after the April edition in 2019.

The newsletter has grown from a 4 page black and white document to one of regularly 12 pages colour in recent years, with a circulation of 900 copies throughout the East Tamar communities. It is supported by a team of volunteers who contribute articles, do layout and distribution. Printing costs are currently supported by Michael Ferguson MLA. Advertising charges in the newsletter are used for community projects.

The publication is well recognised by residents of the East Tamar, and despite a desire and efforts for transition to an online and more interactive publication through subscription, this has not eventuated.120 email subscribers to the newsletter have joined since it was first offered in 2008, but it is apparent to the

Guiding Committee that the delivered paper edition is still what residents prefer.

A recent meeting of the Committee and some local supporters came up with many suggestions as to how we could make this publication more effective, however to date no-one has offered to accept the role of Editor.

#### RODENTICIDES AND THE HIGH RISK TO WILDLIFE

At particular times of the year, we wage war on rodents across the State in rural, urban and natural areas, often through the use of poisons. The impact these poisons are having on our wildlife is now becoming apparent. The threat is very real and some poisons are much worse than others.

Birds of prey, such as the endangered Masked Owl (ref to photo), are particularly vulnerable to rodenticides as potentially are other predators and scavengers like quolls and devils which eat dead and dying rodents and so are poisoned themselves. But there are ways to minimise our impact.


Controlling introduced rats and mice is a necessity for many of us, whether on farms, in the bush or in town. However there are several things you can do to limit the impact on our wildlife. For most people using a combination of the methods described below will give the best results.

#### **USE MANUAL TRAPS**

The old style mice and rat traps, live cage traps and the newer types like electric traps, still have a role to play in controlling rodent populations. Such mechanical or electric traps are safe for scavengers or predators because there are no poisons to pass on when dead and dying rodents are eaten.

#### **USE LOWER IMPACT POISONS**

Most rodenticides (poisons designed to kill rats and mice) are based on anticoagulants chemicals that kill by promoting internal bleeding. Older types of anticoagulants, called First Generation Anticoagulant Rodenticides (FGARs), require rodents to take multiple doses and therefore kill more slowly but have less effect on animals that eat poisoned rodents.

More recently developed Second Generation Anticoagulant Rodenticides (SGARs) are used much more widely, mainly because of the convenience of their "single dose" effect. They kill rats and mice more quickly but more residual poison is ingested by raptors or other scavengers/predators and so can significantly affect local populations.

When using rodenticides a choice to use FGARs may well make the difference for your local wildlife.

"But how do I know which is which?"

Fortunately, most SGARs are clearly labelled "single dose action" and you can check the label for the active ingredients.

FGARs - Warfarin, Coumateralyl\* ✓ SGARs - Brodifacoum, Bromadiolone ×

\*Remember: No poison is completely safe, so use poison as a last resort and only use what is necessary.

#### **BETTER PREPARE YOUR FACILITIES**

How you physically prepare your property can make a difference to whether rats and mice will come in looking for food. Properly sealing houses and buildings so as to restrict entry is particularly effective, though can be difficult to achieve.

Restricting the availability of food is also important, for example using rat and mice-proof compost heaps and using chicken feeders designed to release food in quantities needed only to feed your chickens.

#### **EDUCATION**

Remember others may not even know the impact, from your friends and neighbours right through to people managing shopping centres, factories and public buildings. If you are trying to protect habitat you need to get others on board, so don't forget to ask and look at the alternatives.



#### NO PROGRESS ON BOAT ACCESS AT EGG ISLAND POINT



In Feb. this year Crown Land Services blocked access, used for over 80 yrs, to launch small boats over the foreshore on the Western side of Egg Is. Point. As a result there is now nowhere in our area, if a rescue is needed, to launch a boat using a trailer, if the boat ramp is not able to be used due to strong S/E winds or tide situation.

Photo's taken on Fr. 23rd Nov. 5 min apart, with a medium strength S/E wind blowing, show the situation on the ramp, compared with the calm water at the blocked shore access.

Where would you want to launch safely?

Hillwood Progress assn. have repeatedly requested that the access be reopened but with no success.

CLS (Crown Land Services ) advise that access to launch a boat there is, "deemed inappropriate."

Does this mean that CLS believe that it is inappropriate to attempt a river rescue if one is needed when the ramp is not able to be used?

A second problem created by the blocked access is that CLS/Parks have reneged on the agreement to allow Hillwood Progress Assoc. to maintain the restored beach using a small tractor.

We are expected to carry out this work using hand tools only. And we thought that the Convict days were over. Because of this we have not been able to clear the large quantity of Rice Grass, debris and weed clogging the beach.

CLS advised that some community members support their actions to block access.

Perhaps they can volunteer to clear the beach using hand tools.

HILLWOOD PROGRESS ASSOCIATION INC report re EGG ISLAND POINT RESERVE: In the last issue, HPA reported that a Crown Services Contractor had collected the forest debris that resulted from felling most of the dead trees in the

treed area on Egg Island Point Reserve and dumped five loads on private property off Craigburn Road. We assume under directions from Crown Land Services.

We can now confirm that this was done without the owner's permission and more taxpayers' money was wasted to re-load and take it we know not where.

STOP PRESS: Following a question by Ivan Dean M.H.A. to the Minister, Parks and Wildlife have advised that they have spent \$15,000 on Egg Island Point Reserve recently. The majority has been used to place rather expensive boulders to further reduce public access. The pleasant lightly timbered mowed grass areas on the end of the Point that have existed for over 100 years, have now been blocked off. The C.L.S. Operations Manager decided that these areas were formed by a "tractor slasher illegally cutting native vegetation" - not true and would now be allowed to "naturalise". And you thought grass was natural! Also approximately 50 more trees have been planted to further restrict the beautiful views locals and visitors have enjoyed for so many years.

A merry Christmas to all and a happy New Year with the hope that someone is prepared to take on Jon Hosford's role which he has carried out so well over many years. Thank you, Jon for your dedication.
