Wanderer Mead

MODERN MEAD – ANCIENT INSPIRATION

Hiding down one of those mysterious driveways off John Lees Drive in Dilston is a most unusual small business – Wanderer Mead.

Mead maker Stephen Wilkins is struggling to keep up to the demand for his quirkily labelled range of honey meads.

Mead, essential honey and water fermented with various fruits and spices, is the world's oldest known alcoholic beverage.

It was the "drink of the Gods" in Viking times, so all of Stephen's products feature a Viking character, from Olaf the Viking Blond, to Thora the Viking Sour.

Stephen's interest (some may say obsession) with mead comes from his time as a classics and ancient history teacher in Queensland.

To inject some life into a Mediaeval history course, he set his students

the task of brewing a mead for their annual Mediaeval Banquet (to be consumed by the parents of course, not the kids).

Moving to Dilston 10 years ago, he began to transform a home brewing hobby into a small industry. He built a Meadery and has now been in production for three years, brewing 600 litre batches of mead, all from locally sourced honey. Over that time, through exhaustive experimentation, Stephen has fine tuned a basic range of six variously flavoured meads.

"My aim is to make a dry to semi-dry mead, with complex flavours and about the same alcoholic strength as beer or cider – what we call a "session mead".

"Wherever we sell it we're getting re-orders, so we must be getting the recipes right."

The range includes Viking Blonde, made with honey and Tasmanian hops, Viking Dark, in the style of dark lager, Viking Druid, a flavour explosion of herbs and spices, Ginger Bezerker, a honey ginger beer, Viking Sour, tart and refreshing, and Sweet Viking, a liquid Turkish Delight. Some of the Launceston outlets stocking Wanderer Mead are Crown Cellars and Mood Food or you can taste some of the meads on tap at Tandy's Alehouse in Elizabeth Street. A mead trailer is also under construction which will take Wanderer Mead out to many Tasmanian markets and special events.

But the best way to buy Wanderer Mead, and to meet Stephen Wilkins, is to visit his stall at Harvest Market

every Saturday morning. Another clever and creative character from our East Tamar community.

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

BIRDS OF THE TAMAR By Jon Hosford

A Garden for Birds

You have read for some years about the birds of the Tamar and the birds in the garden at Winderdoon. I want to share this month the realities of the battle of the birds in your garden. Jenny and George Chandler have a dense foliage garden surrounding their home in Windermere Rd and delight in many species of birds that call their garden home. One of the realities of the natural world is competition for space and success in breeding. A pair of Golden whistlers is one of Australia's prettiest songbirds. For some years a pair of these birds has chosen the Chandler's property as home. This year they have observed

the male in fierce competition with his image in the window of their north facing room and even more aggressive with a Grey fantail that had chosen the shade under the window to build a fine nest lined with cobwebs and lay 3 eggs. The Golden whistler menaced the Grey fantail female to such a degree that she abandoned her eggs and nested somewhere else if at all.

The Striated pardalotes that have nested for many years in a nesting box mounted outside the bathroom have returned late this year, most likely awaiting the favourable winds to carry them home after their winter

mainland migration (a choice many of us baby boomers make with increasing frequency). These little birds are a delight, and assist in keeping our eucalypt canopy in balance from the invasion of sap sucking insects. They are so quick in feeding chicks that after 5 attempts with my mobile phone, I failed to get a bird in flight from the bush under the nest to the nesting entrance.

Birds are a wonderful source of joy on your property. If you choose your plants well and create an appropriate habitat, you will discover a whole new world around you that gives such a new dimension to living out of town.

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WHY BEES LOVE MY GARDEN



A WOMAN AFTER MY OWN HEART

I was telling a friend of mine who lives in Sydney about our little community efforts to promote the wellbeing of bees. "So," she said, "Have you heard about what Kelley Whitaker does? She lives not far from me, and she's running this amazing Host A Hive programme." "What? In Castlecrag?" I was amazed. Let me tell you, Castlecrag is a very upmarket suburb on Sydney's North Shore. Not at all the kind of place you'd expect people to have beehives in their back garden. So you can understand my scepticism. But it's a great win-win inspirational story!

Here's the story as reported in The Telegraph:

CASTLECRAG'S Dr Kelley Whitaker is a marine biologist by day and an urban beekeeper by afternoon. With a background in evolution and conservation, her dream is to see our native bushland thrive with high levels of biodiversity and pollinators.

To further this aim, she has launched a Host A Hive program giving north shore residents the chance to "host" beehives on their property and in return receive raw honey from their own environment.

"For a nominal fee you get a queen and the bees and three boxes," she said. "If you don't want to go anywhere near the hive, that's fine. I will do all the managing."

"The main requirements are a sunny aspect, good access and out of the way of human traffic."

For those interested in hosting a hive, she will first visit their property to perform a site inspection.

"I do all the maintenance establishing the colony, feeding them until they've collected enough for themselves and throughout the year, site visits." "I also do all the registration and statutory obligations of the hive and check for bee health and disease." Dr Whitaker said organic raw honey could help those suffering from hay-fever and pollen allergies.

SUMMARY

- Host A Hive gives local residents the chance to harvest their own honey
- There is no need to learn the art and science of bee keeping — Dr Whitaker will do it all for you
- In return for a small monthly fee,

she will visit your backyard to maintain the hives and feed the bees IS THIS AN IDEA THAT YOU WOULD LIKE TO SEE IN OUR COMMUNITY? Perhaps our local beekeepers would consider offering a service like this. I would love it. I have so many bees in my garden. They're having a wonderful time pollinating the lavender, pigface, escallonia, hakea, grevillea, bottlebrush, salvia, gazania, and earlier, the eucalypts and ti-tree. Bee heaven!

I would just like to give another opinion about the Point, in Hillwood. Until the rocks were placed, we had rock climbers camping there and tying their ropes up in the trees, blocking the paths. We had farm workers camping there and hanging their laundry up in the trees. They could be there for all of the summer and with them came their tents which in turn blocked the green open area that is supposed to be for people to enjoy. It was not enjoyable plus they would break branches off the trees and burn them. The amount of litter that was left was huge. We still get some litter but not half as much as before.

We did have some who thought it was a race track and would drift and tear the place up. That isn't happening now. Some people didn't feel safe walking there as you never knew how many or who was camping there. Camping is not allowed but from what the rock climbers told us, they were encouraged to camp there.

It is much safer and open for people who actually live here to enjoy and pay rates and taxes to support the government bodies who take very good care of the area, considering how many areas they need to maintain.

I can't recall any emergency that required people here to get their boats out to save lives since 1991. I could have missed that as I can only see a small section of river.

I appreciate people wanting the Point to be as it was when they were young but for me, I love it as it is and we go there every day. We pick up litter and enjoy the beauty there even when the tide is so low you can almost walk to Egg Island. It is a treasure.

Letter from Hillwood Progress Association

In the October issue, the Hillwood Progress Association (HPA) provided an article dealing with Parks & Wildlife (PWS) policies and actions on Egg Island.

The article was submitted, with our permission, to Parks & Wildlife for comment. The reply from PWS, printed, came with the comment to the Editor that "it would assist him to decide", what or if to print of the HPA article. It was almost as if PWS was trying to convince the Editor that the HPA article was not correct. I can assure readers that the comments and content in this and previous articles are correct. One can assume that PWS are embarrassed by the truth.

The first paragraph of the PWS reply came as a complete surprise to our members. The Crown River Reserve on Craigburn Road, including Egg Island Point, was from c.1840 listed on the Titles of the Planned Township of "Dorchester" as, "reserved for the recreational us of the residents and never to be sold".

From settlement in the late 1880's until placed in control of PWS in about 1988, the Reserve was used and maintained by the public. PWS rebuilt and restores 3 BBQs and picnic table sets and provided a composting toilet. All public facilities were removed about 15 years ago in 2012, when HPA restored the small bench PWS advised that "Crown Land Services are the primary authority for maintaining the area for its "intended purpose as a natural values area with riparian communities." "The area is no longer considered an area maintained for the general public." At the time of writing the October article HPA had no indication that PWS had changed this policy to "Tasmanian Parks and Wildlife Service is responsible for maintaining

Egg Island Point as a public reserve and for protecting the natural, cultural and recreational values of the Reserve."

"The Reserve is a maintained and attractive natural setting on the Tamar River."

This statement is a 180 degree reversal of the previous policy. HPA has twice requested confirmation that this is, in fact, a new policy. No reply yet.

In para 2, PWS claim that the boat ramp at Egg Point is all weather. It is not. It is fully exposed to SE gales. The alternate over shore access to launch trailers and boats was blocked in Feb 2018 for no logical or commonsense reason and remains closed. It is not necessary, as suggested by PWS, to apply to MAST for full funding for a new access. The access used safely for over 80 years still exists. It is just blocked. If a rescue fails because of this situation, the blame will rest with PWS. Perhaps they will just blame the Minister.

To claim that the fire risk from large fuel build up in areas of river reserves is low, denies fact. The river does not surround these areas on three sides. There are no fire breaks as such. Grass areas are mowed usually once a year and bush covered areas have not had any fuel reduction for over 25 years. Some boundaries are just a farm fence and when did roads stop fires in the wrong conditions. The failure to reduce fuel loads does place property at risk of fire.

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
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First Home Owner Grant

The \$20 000 grant for eligible first home owners who are building or buying a brand new home, has now been extended to 30 June 2020

(The extension is subject to the passage of legislation through the Parliament.) The grant is open to eligible first home owners for the purchase or building of a new home.

Also offering a 50% concession on property transfer duty for first home buyers of established homes if your property value is \$400 000 or lower.

Duty concession for pensioners downsizing to another home is extended to 30 June 2020

(The extension is subject to the gazetting of a Ministerial Order.) This offers a 50% property transfer duty concession to eligible pensioners who sell their existing home & downsize to a new home valued at \$400 000 (or lower) within the buying period of 10th February 2018 to 30th June 2020.

With the recent bank rate cut, mortgages are at the cheapest rate in the last 100 years. This aims to ignite an interest in the housing market that seems to have fallen into a slump on the mainland with another rates cut to come.

In Tasmania there is still strong buyer interest & demand for properties. Within the CBD areas, record high prices are still being achieved. Rural areas are starting to see the market as a bit slower. Overall, Tasmania's economy is now growing strongly due to mainland buyers purchasing here at a cheaper price than elsewhere in the country coupled with a lovely cooler climate, & a strong tourism sector. Rental yields are still higher than many other states of Australia with the income being in excess of 5% in many cases.
