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THE HIDDEN DANGER



On days like today over cast and raining it seems strange to be writing about heat exhaustion, but this is a real danger during the next few months, especially if you are elderly, playing sport or working outside, not drinking enough water, or perhaps drinking too much alcohol or caffeine laced drinks,

You will feel confused, lethargic. You won't be sweating and your skin feels hot and dry. You will feel giddy especially when changing from sitting to standing. You will become nauseated. If you vomit or collapse it becomes a medical emergency; ring for an ambulance.

Stop; go inside where it is cooler, drink water at room temperature. This is easier to swallow than iced water. Avoid coffee, caffeine drinks and alcohol for at least 12 hours. You will know when the danger is over, when your urine becomes clear in colour.

Remember you need 2-3 litres of fluid a day, most of this as water especially if you are doing things in the out side heat. Unless absolutely necessary avoid doing things outside between 12 noon and 4pm.

As another year draws to a close I wish you all merry Xmas and a safe healthy new year, the surgery will be open during the festive season if needed.

The State Fire Competitions were held earlier this month in Launceston with 25 teams of Senior and Junior Brigades from around the state and including a composite team from NSW competing in 16 events staged over two

The extra eight weeks of training undertaken for thee events enhanced the skills of all members competing. Weather predictions for the upcoming Fire Season indicate a late start with the chance of slightly higher than normal temperatures and drier conditions. Fuel loading, for example, grass on road edges ,paddocks etc. could be high after spring rains, causing potential hazards when they dry out. We still have time to reduce hazards around properties before the fire season is upon us.

Get Connected is set to have an important meeting with Launceston City Council (LCC).

Providing our local broadband speed test results could support the Council's case for 'Fibre To The Home' for East Tamar residents. (See how to send your speed test below)

In January 2012 LCC and NBN Co will announce details of Phase 3 of the NBN rollout, which *Get Connected* has learned will include Mowbray and Invermay, but not Newnham/Rocherlea. *Get Connected* believes this future fibre optic rollout to Newnham/Rocherlea is key to our communities having any hope of getting FTTH.

SO CLOSE, AND YET SO FAR

Ironically the fibre-optic backbone connecting Launceston and Hobart is integrated into the Dil-

ston By-pass Highway, at its closest point less than 350 metres east of Dilston.

Is this an overlooked opportunity for us to get fibre?

Down Memory Lane

An attraction for residents from near and far has been the Christmas Carol service at St Matthias Church. Dr. Mathias Gaunt was responsible for the erection of our historic church in 1842, and he donated 1 acre of his property "Windermere" so that his wife and family would have a place for worship. Dr. Gaunt;s grave is in the north-west corner of the graveyard. There was a son, Mathias, who died at only 13years of age as the church was completed. Perhaps that is why the church was so named.

As you enter through the gates set in the columbarium wall, the path leads straight past the graves of people who have played a role in the history of our district. Notice graves of cherished infants, a minister's wife, farmers, orchardists, retired navy captains, boat builders, children who died of an epidemic— even unmarked graves of convicts are said to be on the eastern side. These were real people who found a resting place together at Windermere.

There is only one grave with a remaining wooden fence. There used to be more, but the way the grass was mown in the distant past is the likely key to their demise. An area would be fenced off and packed with a flock of sheep to mow the grass. We have much more careful ways now— thank you to those who keep the area so neat.

The plan of the graveyard has been lost, but in 1970 the columbarium wall was built as the graveyard was declared full.

To test for used sites, a stake was hammered into the ground. If it suddenly went in quickly, (finding no resistance) it could be presumed a grave lay in that site.

Now on into the church, probably passing a bell ringer working inside the first of the wooden doors.

You have come to a celebration: the birth of Jesus the Saviour over 2000 years ago' Looking directly forward to the eastern wall you may be impacted by the special stained glass windows, the central one being of Jesus after he ascended into heaven after his death on a cross. The window was given by the wife of Andrew Curran, who died in 1948.

The windows either side were bequeathed by Gordon Medwin (died 1973). Gordon, like his father David, lived in the area, working the land and serving as a church warden. Imagine the church without those who served. Playing instruments, rowing others across from Rosevears, teaching Sunday School or pastoring the flock are only a few ways in which help was offered. Can you imagine how the church looked before 1948 with no stained glass windows?

The window to the right of "The Ascension" depicts Judas Iscariot (a disciple of Jesus who handled the money purse). Judas witnessed the miracles of Jesus and heard him speak amazing lessons, and yet agreed to betray Jesus for the price of 30 silver coins. Before Jesus was crucified, Judas realised his error of betraying innocent blood. The chief priests and elders were not concerned, even when Judas threw his coins back to them in the temple, then went away and hanged himself. (Matthew 27:1-10)

A close up of the stained glass windows shows Judas

with the rope, a bag of coins, and even a red devil on his shoulder signifying the presence of evil in his life.

On the left window is St. Matthias, who was chosen by lot to replace Judas as the 12th disciple. Matthias was a wood cutter, hence an axe is shown along with a wooden cross. (Acts 1: 12-26)

On the altar is a cross given in memory of William and Louisa Coulson.

Captain Coulson was an early settler of Dilston, later moving to the property "Rostella", Captain Neilley and his wife had previously established.

Neilley had fought under Wellington at the Battle of Waterloo. A communion plate was donated by him and his wife. Tapestries on the seats at the front were done by Hazel Holyman, a descendant of Dr. Gaunt. She trained the first air hostesses in Australia.

Candlesticks were made by Ern Hill and Dudley Williams to commemorate

The 150th celebration of St Matthias Church. Wood had been saved from a tree that used to grow in the graveyard.

There are many more things to see, reminding us of people who have contributed in the past.

On the back wall are photos: Dr. Gaunt; the manse he built for the first Chaplain, and even one lifting the Church off its foundations to replace them in 1937.

There may not be enough time to see everything this time, so please feel welcome to come again.

I think most of us are fairly familiar with the story of Dr Matthius Gaunt and his wife, Elisa, arriving in Hobart Town on 2 May 1831 and the 'Romantic Story' behind why the church was built.

What most of us are not aware of is why the church's design displays characteristics of both the Regency and Georgian periods and Victorian Gothic Revival styles. This has been revealed by the Conservation Management Plan (CMP) carried out by C D A Architects, Ann and Peter Cripps. We are extremely privileged to have access to this information.

In 1842 the Launceston based architect, Robert De Little, began work on the church at Windermere for Dr Gaunt. He was responsible for preparing the plans and supervising this work. Robert De Little was also responsible for designing and building many remaining and famous structures throughout Northern Tasmania.

Matthius Gaunt was born in Yorkshire c. 1795 and baptised at St John the Evangelist chapel of Denby in April 1796. There is anecdotal evidence that Dr Gaunt wanted the church at Windermere to be similar in design to the chapel in Denby, Yorkshire. Many design elements of the Denby chapel are incorporated in St Matthias.

The chapel in Denby no longer exists in its original form as Matthius Gaunt would have known it. How fortunate for us that St Matthias Church still exists for our use today. The inhabitants of present Windermere must thank the past Windermere residents for maintaining the building and we, in turn, must preserve it for the future Windermere Community and the whole of Tasmania.
