### Dilston By Pass Update

Your committee thought it useful to update the community about the 'state of play' regarding the By Pass, noting that 'Dilston' includes Windermere and Swan Bay.

Our traffic counts show that the majority of local weekday traffic goes southbound to Launceston. This was especially noted in the hours between 7 and 9 am, when in one 30 minute period 200 light vehicles travelled over Barnards Creek bridge southwards.

The D.I.E.R. maintain that a modified Tee junction ('seagull') would be adequate for the next 20 years to blend local traffic with the By Pass traffic. (Please remember that By Pass truck traffic will continue to grow as Bell Bay expands to be the major Tasmanian port, let alone any possible Pulp Mill construction and operation.)

Your committee's opinion is that; after scrutiny of available traffic data it concludes that such a junction is inherently unsafe even before low altitude morning sunlight and winter fog and ice conditions are factored. Our view is strongly shared by our current school bus provider Rex

Sainty and also Kevin
Poole himself a seasoned
local school bus driver. The
thought of exposing your
children to this junction is not
something for which they
want to take responsibility.
Tee junctions, and other junctions where multiple lanes of
fast moving traffic have to be
crossed at the same
grade, feature in many of
Tasmania's fatal road accidents.

Having considered options, including roundabouts, your committee thinks that a plan proposed by Dilston's Ron Goodes, a retired road engineer, is appropriate.
Roundabouts are not welcomed by D.I.E.R., the Heavy Vehicle Drivers Association or the R.A.C.T.

In the 'Goodes Scheme', instead of demolishing the present Barnards Creek bridge as planned by D.I.E.R., retain it and build a new link road from the present bridge to the western end of the Rocherlea overpass. The By Pass itself would travel over a new bridge slightly to the east of and alongside the present one and blend with the Northern Outlet short of the Northern Suburbs turn off. The proposed new link road has been welcomed by the Archer family, owners of the Landfall property, provided that it reduces to a minimum the intrusion within their land and that access roads to their property and the houses nearby are maintained. Local traffic could cross the Rocherlea overpass, going via 'factory road' to the northern suburbs or use the present slip road (below Aurora) to join the By Pass/ Northern Outlet traffic.

The Northern junction, carrying far less traffic, although on a 6.4% downward slope, will have a Tee junction, although an overpass would be a better (but too costly) solution. It is possible that right turns from the local joiner road across the By Pass traffic flow to travel south would for safety reasons be banned. D.I.E.R. have suggested electronic signs warning of entering traffic, ice etc.

The Launceston City Council is to hold a public meeting on February 16th where concerned residents will be allowed 2 minutes each to state their case. Thereafter the Council will decide whether to accept D.I.E.R.'s 'seagull' tee junction or an alternative.



# FIRE BRIGADE NEWS by Rob Montague



### When Do I Need a Fire Permit?

You need a fire permit for the burning of vegetation at all times during a declared Fire Permit Period regardless of the weather conditions. If the area you are burning exceeds 2 hectares you will be required to complete a Burning Plan and have that plan approved by a Permit Officer after which it will become a primary condition of a Fire Permit. To assist in completing a Burning Plan, refer to the Guidelines for

Burning Vegetation document. You do not need a permit for barbecues, campfires or incinerators provided you comply with the conditions associated with their use including <a href="Environmental Regulations">Environmental Regulations</a> and/or <a href="Local Government">Local Government</a> By-laws. To get a permit you simply have to contact your local Fire Permit Officer (Rob Monatque). Permits are free.

### Nature Notes by Jon Hosford Beware of unwelcome visitors

January and February is Ragwort flowering time. Ragwort is a toxic herb from the daisy family that produces distinctive, ragged leaves. It commonly grows to 60 cm but may



reach 1.8 m high. Easily seen at this time of the year with its yellow daisy like flowers it can be pulled out by the roots and trashed. Help to eliminate this noxious invader by pulling it.

The Eastern Long-necked Turtle (*Chelodina longicollis*) is found in eastern Australia from just south of Rockhampton in Queensland to Victoria. It is not native to Tasmania. It is a carnivorous species that in the wild mostly eats aquatic insect larvae, small invertebrates, tadpoles, frogs and occasionally fish.

Recent local reports indicate that a few specimens have been sighted locally. These are most probably illegal pet escapees or released by residents whose children have outgrown the desire to have a turtle. **DIPW** is keen to stop the spread of this species. It is illegal to keep turtles in Tasmania and if you do see one crossing a road or when you are out walking, you should report it to **DIPW**
