NBN BROADBAND HAS COME TO WINDERMERE AND SWAN BAY ...

BUT ONLY FOR THE LUCKY FEW!

In recent developments the signal from an NBN Wireless Tower can now reach a narrow corridor in the Windermere and Swan Bay area. This means, as far as *Get Connected* can reasonably establish, that perhaps less than a dozen homes can now be connected to NBN Fixed Wireless Broadband, way ahead of the rest of the community. Those connecting to NBN Fixed Wireless will have download speeds of up to 25Mbps and upload speeds of up to 5Mbps.

Jack and Ning MacKeddie, at 320 Windermere Road, are one of the lucky few, yet frustratingly, none of their neighbours are in the Fixed Wireless footprint.

"We got the notification from Telstra", Jack says, " and arranged for the contractors to come out. They simply put a dish on the roof and adjusted its position until they got a good signal, then hooked us up."

It seems only a random selection of addresses are suitably located to avail of the current Fixed Wireless signal. Along Windermere Road, as far as we can ascertain, these include Nos. 320, 671, 689, 693, 701, 707, 709, and 717; and 11 Woodlawn Road, Swan Bay.

Get Connected is having ongoing discussions with Russell Kelly, corporate affairs manager NBN Co Tasmania. He says the Broadband plans for Dilston and Windermere are currently being given a lot of attention. Get Connected suggests this indicates there will need to be a multiplicity of solutions.

"We're very aware of Dilston, Windermere and Swan Bay," he said when first contacted by Trixie Gillard.

Russell Kelly's intention is to provide a detailed report for inclusion in the December issue of Smoke Signals.

Exploring all avenues for information

Get Connected has been in contact with a friendly source at Telstra to see what information they could provide.

"Finally, perhaps you can provide some answers to the rumors that are going around in our community - namely, some say that Dilston/Windermere/Swan Bay is slated to get Fibre to the node (FTTN), others say it will be a mixture of Fixed Wireless and Satellite," Trixie Gillard asked Telstra. "Web searches I've looked at suggest it will be a Multi-Technology Mix, which presumably can mean a mix of all three - my guess being that Dilston and the more accessible locations in terms of proximity to Dilston Exchange will get FTTN, and that Windermere and Swan Bay will mostly get Fixed Wireless, with the odd one getting Satellite."

This is the response:

From the information I have gained from NBN Co, they suggest that your residence (318) will be connected by fibre to the node.

Location not ready. The suggested date is the Quarter 4 of next year.

What you have suggested regarding Dilston etc, that is the same information that I am gaining from NBN Co at the moment.

In the meantime, Get Connected is also in contact with Minister Michael Ferguson's office, and Minister Rene Hidding's office.

So, we continue to be up in the air. (Ed)

Six Months at Maatsuyker Island......

Over the Spring / Summer 2014 / 2015 Windermere Residents, Wendy and David Milne, were Volunteer Caretakers / Weather Observers at Australia's most southern Lighthouse.

David Reports....

Having completed two weeks training we were helicopter-transported onto Maatsuyker Island, complete with all our dry stores and gear for six months. Four days later we waved goodbye to the outgoing caretakers and our Parks manger. We were now on our own.

For the duration of the first month we were apprehensive about our competence to complete some of the tasks, however we settled into a routine dictated by the Weather Observations.

The first task of each day was to complete the 6am weather obs. This involved getting out of bed and dressing in all of your wet weather gear without turning on the lights. [This is necessary to retain your night vision] We then walk up to the Bureau of Met office and observe the swell over 5 to 10 minutes to determine the height and frequency, observe the cloud cover, wind direction, speed, and temperature. Having completed the observation then we can now switch on the office lights and complete the data entries. The weather observations were completed three times per day and all data was entered into the metconsol at fixed times and forwarded to the bureau of Met office in Hobart.

The BOM office is located at 160metres above sea level with an uninterrupted view south and west over the Southern ocean,. From this vantage point we viewed some incredible weather events. During one prolonged blow where the wind speed blew at a constant 60 knots for several days and gusted to above 80 knots we witnessed swells of 9 meters surging over the needle rocks below the lighthouse.

We observed incredible cloud formations at dawn and dusk. We watched the activities of Cray fishing boats, dropping and picking up their pots in swells up to 5 metres in height. Small abalone boats manoeuvred around the needle rocks in calm conditions.

We watched the yachts in the Melbourne to Hobart yacht race sail past on a squally afternoon on their way to the Hobart finish line.

We observed cruising yachts and fishing

vessels passing to the north of Maatsuyker heading for Southwest Cape and beyond to Port Davey or returning Eastward to Research and on to Hobart.

After breakfast each morning, Wendy went off to open up and vent the two other quarters [houses] and attend our veggie garden and plants in the poly tunnel. I headed down to the power house to carry out the generator checks and into the original light house built in 1891, to change the wicks in the lantern room and empty the any water out of the collection buckets.

The next task was to listen to the 8.30am weather forecast and coastal weather OBs for Tasmania from Tasmaritime Radio. The radio operator also takes position reports from fishing vessel yachts in regional areas. Routinely we would provide Tasmaritime with an updated local weather observation and have a short chat.

Having completed the 9am weather OBS we were now free until 3pm to carry out our caretaking tasks.

Often this involved mowing, brush cutting or drain cleaning along the 2km of roadway, around the light station, clearing growth and fallen trees from the walking tracks.

Regularly we walked to the north of the island and down the track adjacent to the old haul way to the Alomes Gulch landing to watch the activities in the seal colony now established here.

The most common seals around Maatsuyker are the New Zealand Fur Seal and we observed day old pups suckling and juveniles playing in the shallows adjacent to the rocky beach. Other species hauling out in the gulch were Australian Fur seals, Antarctic Fur seals and Elephant Seals.

On one occasion we sited eight Elephant seals, apparently a record for Maatsuyker.

Maatsuyker does not have any snakes or

animals with exception of a small native rodent, Swamp antechinus; a shy creature. We had few sightings, and these were during its short breeding cycle.

Bird life is most prolific and the island has an estimated summer population of 400,000 breeding pairs of Short-tailed Shearwater. To witness the birds landing at dusk and taking off at dawn is a site and a noise that you will never forget. A family of Currawongs were nesting in a tree near our Quarters and they kept an eye on us and any other creatures that ventured into their territory. We often witnessed a sea eagle in full flight being pursued by a couple of Currawongs.

The green parrots are common, and during nesting season are constantly attacking the building facia to gain nesting sites in the building roof spaces.

The Keeper's Quarters of Maatsuyker Light Station were built in 1891. Considering the Isolated location and the difficult terrain it was a remarkable achievement.

A Small automatic solar powered light has replaced the original Light.



The Original Light house Remains intact with its original Chance brothers light mechanism and Lenses intact and in an operable condition. The Light house requires restoration; Friends of Maatsuyker are currently working with Parks and Wild Life to Restore the Light House.

Friends of Maatsuyker Conduct Day Trips by boat, to Maatsuyker in March each year Weather permitting. We can recommend this trip to any able bodied person who has an interest in Tasmania's Maritime history in a Remote Scenic Site. Funds generated from these trips, is invested in preservation of this historic site.

Your Health....? by Dr. Heidi Dreiling Ear Wax



Ear wax

(The medical term is cerumen) is a yellow waxy material that is actually made and secreted by glands in the skin cells of the ear canal in humans.

It is made to **protect** the skin lining of the ear canal and helps clean and lubricate the ear canal. It also provides some protection for bacteria, fungi, and water.

Sometimes the wax builds up and causes symptoms such as mild deafness and fullness inside the ear.

Some people are more prone to ear blockage than others – the cause of this may be:

- Narrow ear canals
- Hairy ear canals
- Overzealous cleaning with fingertips and cotton buds which actually push the wax further into the ear canal
- Working in dusty or dirty environments
- Inflammation of the skin of the ear canal

Wax build up is totally harmless – sometimes the wax plug loosens and falls out by itself without any intervention – the wax is pushed out by the actions of the jaw when talking and chewing.

If the wax does not fall out by itself medical treatments my include:

- Drops to soften the ear wax to let it fall out on its own
- Ear syringing with warm water to float the wax plug/s out
- Withdrawing the wax with a suction device
- Removal of wax with forceps or a

special hook



Gardening News


We have had an early burst of unusually high temperature weather in the past week. It may be a temptation for some to plant tomatoes and other heat loving vegetables early.

BEWARE!

A cold change will set them back so there is no advantage gained in planting early. Reliably the last week in October is the earliest I ever put the solanum family in the ground (Tomatoes, Capsicums Peppers). Grow them under glass or plastic cover to allow plenty of light and warmth. When you put them into the ground it is best to use cloches. I make mine from gutter guard with a plastic surround. This ensures they are not set back through sudden variations in the weather.



A family medical encounter has recently reminded me of the importance to ensure your soil has iodine availability. Tasmanian soils are deficient in iodine after millions of years of leeching by high rainfall. The iodine in our soil has enriched the kelp beds that surround our coasts. Our soil is unusually low in iodine as a result. Kelp meal is available as a commercial supplement to your fertiliser and I buy it in bulk to add to my garden fertiliser. This ensures there is available iodine in the soil for the food you grow.

Awareness of iodine-depleted soils has been addressed since 2009 by a regulation demanding iodine is added to the salt in bread. I don't know about you, but I would eat about 4 slices of bread per week and salt additions to my diet that I am aware of are minimal. I would rather add it to the soil than worry about thyroid problems.

Fire Season 2015/2016...

...has most definitely beset us with the recent Day of Total Fire Ban on October 3, resulting in excess of 100 separate fires statewide in 24hrs. The Tasmania Fire Service as a whole instigated a much higher level of readiness for all brigades and it was this, along with concerted efforts of the personnel on the fires that did start, that kept all the incidents contained to minimal boundaries. As it stands at time of writing there are still 6 incidents at "ADVICE" level. Are you aware of what the different alert levels mean? Would you know what to do if you heard/saw the terms ADVICE, WATCH AND ACT or EMERGENCY on the radio, television, or via social media?

The Tasmania Fire Service has all this covered for you via their website www.fire.tas.gov.au, and you can find overleaf a copy of the cover of the publication covering bushfire preparedness. It is a very detailed document full of information on how you can best prepare your property, including the oft forgotten capacity of emergency services being able to reach you. Our Heavy Tanker appliance requires

a fair space to be able to access a property, and to turn around. All this is covered in the publication mentioned. See overleaf for the size of our Heavy Tanker.

More Pre Season Planning...

With the temperature on the increase and the early start to the fire season it is more important to remember that ANY burn offs that you undertake be registered with the Tasmania Fire Service on Freecall 1800 000 669. This reduces the chance the brigade is called out unnecessarily.

Having said that, as a brigade we would be encouraging you to contact one of the officers listed below for specific advice, and you will find that most times we are more than happy to help you out!

If you are conducting a burn off and a Total Fire Ban is announced, then you MUST extinguish your burn, and following this good advice in doing so...

Wet it...
Turn it over...
Wet it again!

Home Fire Safety...

With all the talk about the coming bushfire season it is worth just a short mention that home fire safety is still an important aspect. As was recently highlighted to us due to a call to a local residence that



had sparks and smoke emanating from the main fuse board. In this case it was as a result of crossed wires but it is also worth noting that the property was rewired relatively recently. If your building has wiring of an older nature then it may well be worth having it checked over by a licenced electrician!




Brigade Open Day

Are you getting all your Mail?



It has come to the attention of this publication that at least one resident in John Lees Drive has had problems with mail delivery since the new house numbering system has come into effect.

Australia Post has issued new numbers to houses in John Lees Drive and will no longer guarantee delivery to mailboxes that are not marked appropriately. It is in your best interests to:

notify regular mailers to your address of your new address;

clearly mark you mail box with the new number and perhaps the previous number (East Tamar Highway).

This will assist Australia Post staff to deliver your mail without delay.

It would also be of great assistance to Australia Post if your mailbox is placed in an a vehicular-accessible position. This assists the delivery staff and lowers the risk of staff endangering themselves and other motorists whilst trying to carry out their task of delivering your mail.

Take a look at the position of your mailbox and adjust it if necessary.

Dilston Walkway



Launceston City Council has contracted Crossroads to construct the new pedestrian/cycle path as a 4th lane in John Lees Drive.

The walkway will be line marked clearly for traffic proceeding north and provide a solid and even surface for pedestrians in this rural residential subdivision. The walkway extends through Dilston and accesses Dilston Road in the north.

Windermere Jetty disappears

The Windermere jetty is no more.

Launceston City Council contracted to have it demolished in late August after surveying residents for future improvements to the Windermere recreation reserve.

Some residents are far from happy, claiming the process was not transparent and that developmental planning processes were overlooked in order to have the jetty removed without formal objections being considered.

It leaves the boat ramp rather bare with sub standard retrieval facilities that are subject to the influence of large tidal flows in the river.

Boat owners have often complained that fisher-folk using the pontoon often compromise the mooring of boats at the pontoon when trailers are being retrieved.



The extreme high tides flood access to the pontoon making retrieval difficult.

Let's hope we can work with Council to

access funding from MAST to have updated retrieval facilities put in place for this area.

Yellow-throated Honeyeater

The Yellow-throated Honeyeater is endemic to Tasmania. It is often observed and probably more frequently heard in the Summer when Eucalypts are flowering. The species breeds from August to January, and lays two to three spotted pinkish eggs in a cup-shaped nest which is often built within a meter of the ground in dense vegetation, or up to 10m in foliage. This makes them particularly vulnerable to cats in well vegetated gardens.

The bird is of a similar size to the New Holland Honeyeater, which is common in the gardens of the Tamar Valley.

Both genders have a prominent yellow trapezoid –shaped throat patch flanked by a black border.

The call is an incessant high-pitched chatter that reminds me of the Bren Gun retort I learned as an army cadet in the 1960's. Seen from behind, both genders are prominently green. with a grey head.

The call is often heard from eucalypts

Listening to bird calls when working in my property is impulsive to me. If I hear a bird call I don't recognise, I will go out of my way to check it out. I don't consider myself a "twitcher", as I have no impulsion to tick off species observed on any given day. I do get very excited in seeing new species or seeing birds that are infrequently observed in the district. Being alert to

individual calls gives me an ear for this.

If you are interested in observing bird

behaviour, my advice would be to get

to know the calls. You will often hear

the bird before you see it, although

this is not always the case.

Most recently, in a trip along the Murray Valley in SA, I spent a few days at The Gluepot Reserve, a Birds Australia property of pristine Mallee habitat out of Wakerie. It was rewarded by a close encounter with a bird I had seen only once before many years ago when I lived in southern NSW. The Painted Honeyeater is usually a shy vagrant bird that follows mallee eucalpyt flowering specifically.

It decided to visit my intrusion to its habitat by landing on a low eucalypt branch as we were walking through open Mallee scrub. I just saw this bird vividly saying "Hullo, what are you doing in my territory?"

A magical moment indeed. I then heard it calling several times when we came back the same way.

Such is the excitement of being attune with nature. The thrills are often when you least expect them and they carve indelible memories in your brain.

Take a little time and listen to the bird calls around you. You will be surprised how many you do know and how quickly you will learn to follow up those you don't.

Modern technology makes its relatively easy.

I use an app on my phone by Pizzey & Knight "Birds of Australia", Digital Edition. It has, as one of many features, recorded calls of most Australian species and their races.





I find it a dimension in my life that I treasure.
