Jack Ball would have to be the local hero of the month in Dilston.

Humble heroes are rare, and yet on interviewing Jack and his family, I could not help but appreciate that this was a hero who had adopted his own values and pursued his own mission with the support of family and his school community.

Jack is a quiet, intelligent local lad, whose attention came to me as a Smokesignals courier with his Dad Byron. They have together delivered this newsletter over many years, well prior to my time as editor.

Jack initially gained his opportunities through a special teacher connection, Murat Djakic at Brooks High School when he entered Grade 7 in 2006.

It is so often the case that young people are inspired by one very special teacher who facilitates their growth and scaffolds

their learning, without dominating its outcome.

It's not just about racing designed model cars along a 20 metre race strip. The Challenge is an outstanding model for recognising individual potential in the science and engineering field, and in the development of personal skills. It has 11 criteria that embrace its achievement, including verbal expression, research & development, engineering and speed. Although speed is a special trophy, winning the overall World Championship demands highest achievement overall on the 11 criteria.

With the support of HIT Lab, Jack's team designed a simulated circuit based on the Longford Formula 1 race track, and in a year in which this racetrack celebrated its achievements, the team managed after 4 years, to mount the final step of an international platform in Malaysia for this event.

Jack has been offered a scholarship at The London City University in Engineering; an enticing carrot for his future. At this point, in Year 11 in Launceston College he must focus on his TCE and accessing a potentially exciting future.

Osteoporosis

It's not a bad idea to measure your height each year.

Yes ,we do all start to shrink. Some of this is due to posture, but as we age a condition called osteoporosis or thinning of the bones leads not only to loss of height, but also increased risk of fractures (broken bones) with minimal trauma.

Whilst this condition has in the past been emphasised for post menopausal women (basically those women who have stopped having periods either for age or surgical reasons) it also affects men particularly after the age of 60.

What can you do about it, throughout your life?

You need to ensure adequate calcium in the diet, plenty of exposure to sunlight (vitamin D) and suitable weight bearing exercise to ensure muscle and bone strength.

It's not a bad idea to periodically have your blood levels of vitamin D checked as there are supplements that can be used to boast your vitamin D level.

If you are over 70, have had a minimal trauma fracture, or have chronic health issues, you are entitled under Medicare to have a bone densiometry (a type of x-ray which measures your bone density). If this is significantly lower than the norm for your age group, there are a variety of medications that can slow the progress of the degeneration of your bones.

Local Woodwork Artisan

John Tobin of Windermere Road is a passionate self-taught artisan who specialises in a mixture of 3D carving and inlay wood work.

Originally from Melbourne, he was once a Commonwealth Public Servant, but he gained little job satisfaction working in an office. As a hobby, he enjoyed making furniture for his young son, and was soon getting requests from friends to make creative kids' furniture and was approached to provide work for a gallery.

These days, although he has to work for sale in the Design Centre in Launceston, he prefers to sell to buyers from his home gallery. He is currently working on a commissioned work for a NSW buyer which will take him about 6 weeks to complete.

Each piece he does is unique, allowing the grain of the wood to partly dictate its place in the scene— as clouds or water or feathers of the many birds he loves to portray. His pieces all share the signature of his past Irish family coat of arms, showing 3 stinging nettle leaves. He usually carves any door handles in the shape of a Thylacine.

John came to Windermere in 1983 and has now spent 28 years in this fulltime job creating his masterpieces.

He participated in the very first Tasmanian Craft Fair, and has exhibited on the mainland and in Japan. You can see his work at his home -based gallery and workshop at "Tigarra" 183 Windermere Road.


