We've Had Enough Thank you!

August and September have been the wettest at Dilston/Windermere for many years. Windermere had 253.7 mm in August according to the records of Pat Hollier, who keeps the records of rainfall for the district. There were a further 110mm in September and just a top-up of 59.8 to October 1-3rd.

In viewing the records from 1929 some interesting statistics appear. The median yearly rainfall is 810mm. The lowest rainfall recorded in a year was 487.7 mm in 1972, and the highest was 1262.9mm in 1956.

The years of 2009- 2011 were above average rainfall and this year is shaping up to meet the median, however long term forecasts are inconclusive.

Statistically, a median is the middle number point, however it gives no indication as to the likely rainfall in any given year.

Apart from the annoyance of not being able to get on the mower when we wanted to, the rain has been highly beneficial to the district. You can look forward to exceptional spring growth as the weather warms up.

There are downsides however, and the rain may well affect the fruit set of your orchard.

The timing of the rain will affect the pollination of plants and in some years it is beneficial and others, not so.

For vineyards, the rainfall has been very timely. Pruning has finished and the new season brings a great moisture level and full dams to drip feed over the summer. The likelihood of major frost is all but over, and unless we get significant rainfall in the warmer weather it could be a great year for wine.



Those who leave on rural blocks as we do need to make sure we drain run off effectively so it does not cause long term consequences such as wash-aways and flooding due to accumulated debris. You will have seen the consequences of that by now, so make sure you plan to make alterations for the next time that we get this kind of event. There is nothing surer than the fact that it will happen again , so let's learn to live with it

Our community would not be so rich without the Windermere Corner Café.

If it is dry cover the bed with a piece of hessian. Inspect from day seven to 10 and remove when you see the first signs of germination break from the soil.

Silver beet & Beetroot

Sow the seed 5 cm apart and thin out to 30 cm with the healthiest plants.

Spring onions . Seed or seedlings will grow well as the weather warms.

Red Odourless onions: will grow well from transplanted seedlings now, to harvest as you need them from January.

Lettuce: Plants successive plantings of seed or seedlings 2 weeks apart.

Spinach: Make sure you choose a **summer** spinach, as incorrect variety will run to seed in the hot weather.

Perpetual is a variety that is reliable in Tasmania over Summer.

Tomatoes

Unless you are prepared to cloche small plants leave tomatoes until the first weekend in November. You will get better growth and a better crop with less disease.

DILSTON FIRE BRIGADE

Tasmania Fire Service

A busy period for the brigade...

Since the last edition of Smoke Signals, Dilston Fire Brigade has been busy with a variety of training exercises as well as a number of incidents.

Just before midnight on the 4th of September, the brigade was paged to assist with a large rubbish and waste fire behind the One Steel recycling plant at Bell Bay. This was a multi brigade effort with units from Dilston, Hillwood, George Town, Bell Bay, Beaconsfield, Rocherlea, Prospect and Pipers Brook attending. At one stage the Heavy Pumper and "Cherry Picker" from Launceston were also called to attend.

We arrived just after 12am and were immediately tasked to provide transfer pumping support to George Town's 3.1 tanker unit and Bell Bay Brigade, who were laying water down on the eastern side of the fire. Shortly there after we were re-tasked to relieve George Town's Medium pumper who were attacking the fire from the western side. We had a large excavator periodically breaking up the heaps to allow water to be put onto the hot spots, and for the next 6 hours we continuously pumped water onto the fire via two 64mm hose lines. . The pump layout of our new(ish) heavy tanker allowed us to maintain the supply to these lines, although it must be said that we were running the pump set flat out!! A testament to the

build quality of the Tasmania Fire Service fabrication division.

Some rough fire ground calculations indicate that in that time frame we pumped about 500,000 litres of water. This type of fire unfortunately does not lend itself well to water conservation as it was imperative to keep the fire from spreading to nearby buildings and exposures, which included the Petroleum storage facility 300m away.

At around 8:30am we, along with the George Town 3.1 crew, had reduced the intensity of the fire. A replacement crew for GT 3.1 arrived and we were relieved by a crew from Beaconsfield where were then supported by crews from Rocherlea.

We returned to our station via the Windermere Store where the ever cheerful Kerry cooked up a storm with Bacon and Egg rolls and coffee's all round. Thanks Kerry!!!

This incident again proved the cohesive nature in the way that multiple brigades attacked an incident, and we were heartened to hear that we our collective efforts prevented the fire from becoming something a lot larger.

Farewell Don Parks

On June 19th 2013, family and friends of the late Donald (Don) Parks of Dilston farewelled a loved Husband and father, adored Poppy, and highly respected businessman.

Born in Leichardt in 1947, Don was raised in Ryde, NSW. At the age of just 14, Don began an apprenticeship in a large local butcher shop. As a young working apprentice, he also began to learn the bass guitar, and later the violin. Later he played the double bass in the highly regarded Ocean City Jazz Band. Don loved music, but it had to "punch along". He particularly enjoyed the Rolling Stones.

Don was exceptional at his trade. So good was his ability to lead staff and manage businesses, he became the General Manager of a large chain of butcher shops in and around Taree, NSW in his twenties. Don and his wife Maureen had successful businesses of their own in Yass, Cootamundra and Goulburn before moving to Tasmania.

Don could see the potential in the properties he bought and in many ways, he was a visionary and pioneer. On their farm at Bookham he noticed that the lay of the land, with its natural creeks and waterways, were unique and could provide a source of unpolluted and independent water supply for Aquaculture. Don, with Maureen's support, carved a trout farm out of the hills where people fished, shared picnics and enjoyed the beautiful gardens.

Despite the hardship that drought and bushfires caused during their time at Bookham, Don still found time to give to the local community through the Lions Club, Rotary Club and through his Athletics. Don himself was a gifted athlete as a young man. His love of Athletics saw him develop the Yass Amateur Athletics Club and he was the volunteer coach for the duration of his time at Yass. He could see the talent in people, when others could not. As just one example, he spotted a young girl who had come for a run with her friend who was training. He spoke to Angela's parents about letting her join the club and he coached her to the junior Olympics in Athens. He himself competed successfully at the World

Veteran Championships when he was in his late 30's.

Twenty years after Maureen and Don holidayed in Tasmania, they fulfilled their dream of moving here. Although the intention was to retire, after only a few short months, Don's entrepreneurial spirit kicked in again and he and Maureen opened the first of what would become seven successful butcher shops around Tasmania. In Tasmania alone, they have employed more than 200 staff and trained 10% of the State's apprentice Butchers.

Don continually sought to create a better future for himself and his family. He walked the road less travelled. He inspired others to do the same; follow their dreams and live with passion. He was happy to create opportunities for others and to support them.

All who knew Don would agree, you wouldn't find a better man. He was hard working, kind, honest and loyal. He valued his family greatly and had a fantastic sense of humour. Don was an inspiration and will be sorely missed by all who were fortunate to have known him.

The 1907 Alice/Togo Disaster

The glorious Easter weekend was nearly over. Seldom had the cruising weather been better. The ship *Alice*, owned by the Salisbury Foundry in Launceston, was sailing up the Tamar. The river was in a virtual calm. It would appear, Mr. McDonald, skipper of the *Alice*, was lulled into complacency by the perfect setting. The family laughed and joked and the children played games below deck. The lights of Launceston glimmered ahead.

Meanwhile, the steamer *Togo* left port at 8:30 p.m., fully loaded, for George Town. Those on the *Alice* and *Togo* were enjoying a warm, balmy late summer evening. The *Togo* cruised rapidly at perhaps thirteen knots. The ship may have been speeding.

Apparently, McDonald, owner and helmsman, became confused with the conflicting lights of the rapidly approaching *Togo* and the city. A warning was shouted by a young man on board. Turning hard to starboard the *Alice* crossed directly in front of the much larger 90 ton *Togo*.

The scream of the warning siren and yells from the passengers were to no avail. She struck amidships off the port bow and the now severed *Alice* began to sink immediately. The bow pointed into the air and in sixty seconds, she slipped into the black Tamar River.

Arthur Pepper, thrown into the water, swam over to the severed stern. He untied the dinghy; it took perhaps three minutes. As he turned to row the dinghy to aid his friends the *Alice* was gone. A few muffled shouts were heard. Six were hauled from the Tamar. One hat was seen floating; a coughing, spluttering person was attached.

Those who were drowned were: Mr. and Mrs. McDonald, sons Willis and Anthony and Nancy Macdonald, Mrs. Frank McDonald, a sister May Pillgrim, Mrs. Campbell and the engineer J. Primsell. Six were saved.

Some days later in the graveyard at Fingal, Tasmania, a service was held and a gravestone erected.

The stone reads:

Wife of Frank McDonald

and of

MABEL EVELYN

Aged 28 years

Daughters of

Thomas L. And Sarah A. Pillgrim

Both drowned in the Togo-Alice' Disaster



The European Goldfinch was introduced to Australia in the 1860's and has successfully spread to farmland areas of Victoria, NSW and Tasmania.

It has a red face, with a black crown and shoulders. The sides of the head are white. The upper parts and flanks are brown, the abdomen and rump are white. The black wings have conspicuous yellow bars and a white trailing edge in flight. The tail is black, tipped with white. Fe-



males are similar to males but have a less red face. Juveniles have a brown head and streaked body plumage.

The Goldfinch particularly enjoys the seeds of scotch thistles. It also eats insects in summer time.

The goldfinch builds a cup shape nest in low bushes and particularly in vineyards, although it is not known to be an eater of grapes.

The eggs (usually 3 or 4) are incubated by the female who seldom leaves the nest. She is fed by the male and she then feeds the young. About 15 days after hatching, the wellfeathered young climb from the nest and make their first flight. They remain dependant on their parents for another 3 -4 weeks.
