Change of Face For The Tamar

A change of face to the Rosevears Hotel has progressed to plan and should be completed by the end of November according to a spokesperson for owner /developer Allan Virieux.

The estimated \$6million development will transform the hotel into a prime tourist venue on the Tamar with planned accommodation for up to 50 people.


Stage 1 of the development, an extension glasshouse dining area and beer garden together with a corporate boardroom/entertainment space with a balcony and hidden temperature controlled cellar, was completed in 2015.

Stage 2 of the development is under construction at present. It comprises 26 eco-friendly accommodation units featuring views of the Tamar River at Windermere.

A planned 3rd stage of the development will be the future construction of a 40 berth marina for public/private use.

This facility will complement the plans for improvement to boat launching facilities on the East Tamar at Windermere.

It is potentially a positive improvement to facilities for recreational use of the river, and to visitors in the district generally. Development plans for the marina are being negotiated with the West Tamar Council and will be submitted to MAST in the near future. The development should provide much more reliable mooring and shelter from the frequent strong winds on the Tamar.

Gardening Notes & News

Daffodils: "The World's Most Popular & Powerful Flower" by Evelyn-Lilly Tuba

If you don't agree with this now, you will after reading Aug's Garden Club news and Helen O'Neill's magnificently illustrated book: 'Daffodil: Biography of a Flower' by Harper Collins Publishing (2016).

In Aug Garden Club was held at Green Acres, our property at Swan Bay. Being the last month of winter it often rains, so to be on the safe side, Jamie and I decided to set up for luncheon inside.. I decorated tables with freshly cut daffodils bringing the colour of the sun and fragrance of Spring into our home. As daffodils are central to our garden, we decided to dedicate the meeting to our property's late 1st owner Geoffrey Luck and his Daffodils.

Many locals will recall Geoff & Margaret Luck. They built our home as their dream home and one of the things that 1st attracted us, was a photo of the house looking resplendent complete with sways of golden daffodils in bloom. Daffodils were the Luck's signature flower and they planted 100s and 100s, if not 1000s of bulbs, which have since multiplied to 100s of 1000s in the gardens of homes they owned. As far as Green Acres is concerned. their love created a spectacular, annually, rejuvenating, living, legacy, enjoyed by us, our guests and all who pass Green Acres from May to Septem-

In fact, Geoff used to sell bulbs here, and evidence of this former commercial activity still exists in Jamie's now 'man cave', where there is a large cool room he used to chill/store bulbs. At the back of the property, behind the hedges, there was a row of hot houses, where Geoff also grew freesia flowers.

Over the past 6 years, Jamie and I have slowly learnt more about daffodils. Like many former mainlanders, we've embraced Tasmania's 4 season climate and the opportunity it affords to enjoy beautiful bulbs. We've both always liked daffodils; who doesn't admire their bright colours? It wasn't however until I recently read Helen O'Neill's latest book 'Daffodil' that my former daffodil admiration blossomed into a wild, passionate daffodil love affair.

Daffodil is a visual feast as well as literally being an Encyclopedia on Daffodils. It's well researched and beautifully illustrated. highly recommend it not only to gardeners, but also to lovers of art, poetry and science, as O'Neill shows just how this remarkable flower has touched all of these areas. It's often said, 'you had to be there', but for those who were away in sun, hard at work, unwell or simply unable to join us for any other reason, I'll attempt to recreate some of the day's floral learning by outlining my Top 12 Daffodil facts as sourced from O'Neill's book:



District History ... More on the founders of our community...... Research by John Coulson


After he retired as pilot and harbour master George Coulson was granted a licence to retail wines and spirits at the Friends Arms, River Tamar. This two story building still stands on Dilston Road.


In 1837 George advertised his wharf as available for shipping stock and offered adjustment on his land as a more effective alternative to driving them overland to George Town. In 1838 The Coulsons were visited by Lady Franklin. This is an extract from private correspondence of the Franklins Mrs Coulson thanking us for the honour done her, and begging Sir John's aid in the building of a new house which they contemplated living in after letting the Inn to a tenant.

It seems the plea was successful and it is likely the first house was built at Thorpe as a result. In 1839 George Coulson advertised the Friends Arms as available to let. It appears that offer was taken up by a Charles Coward and George Coulson moved to Thorpe and Dilston Lodge was advertised to be to let or purchase. However George was not particularly interested in farming so he leased



the property to his son, William Pattern Coulson who took a keen interest in agriculture. One problem faced at Thorpe was the constant flooding of the property from Nelson Creek which flowed through it. It is not reported in any newspaper but it is understood that convicts were employed to divert Nelson Creek out to the Tamar just beside Dilston Lodge.





Ironically the flooding continued because lack of water flow through the area caused the outlet, now known as Coulson's Creek, to silt up.

By 1846, river travel was the most popular with Coulson's Wharf at Dilston a designated stop as this ad testifies:.

"Gypsy" will leave the Wharf for George Town. on Saturday next, the 31st instant, at eight o'clock, AM, returning the following Monday at two o'clock PM., a.m. During the month of October, the 'GIPSY' will proceed to George Town every Saturday, and return with rates as shown above.

Those prices might appear cheap but, put in the context of wages at the time, river travel on the Tamar was not a proposition for anyone. That 4s fare would be all a painter would earn for a full day's work.

IT'S A FACT: BOOK LOVERS LIVE LONGER. IT'S LIKE GYM WORKOUT FOR THE MIND.

A new study has revealed that those who read for at least 30 minutes every day are more likely to enjoy a longer life.

Based on a U.S. study of 3,635 people aged 50 or older, those who spent time buried in a book survived almost two years longer on average than those who didn't.

The findings, reported by a team from Yale University's School of Public Health, showed that the more people read, the more likely they were to live longer, and just 3.5 hours a week was enough to make a difference. This new study ties into existing research that supports the idea that reading really can help keep the mind active and healthy.

The Harvard researchers suggest that the slow, immersive process of digging deep into a book creates a "cognitive engagement" effect – stimulating and strengthening the language-processing regions in the brain.

The researchers also suggest that reading fiction could increase feelings of empathy strengthening our connections with the people and the world around us, and contributing to a more engaged, happier, and therefore longer life.

Interestingly, the study found that because book reading is more engaging it was much more likely to increase a person's lifespan than reading newspapers or magazines.

Next step for the researchers will be to look at whether there are any noticeable differences between reading fiction and non-fiction, and whether using e-books and audiobooks is as beneficial as reading traditional paper novels.

The findings add to existing evidence that suggests how good reading can be for you. A study conducted in 2003 found that regular reading keeps the brain active and could help keep dementia at bay, while another study in 2009 showed that reading also reduces stress levels.

While more research will be needed before we can conclude that it's our love of books that actually promotes longer life, there's definitely no harm in starting that novel you've been meaning to get around to. So pick up a book today.

LOCAL BRAIN FOOD A BONUS FOR LONGEVITY. COME AND CHECK IT OUT.

We're talking, of course, about the long-term benefits of being a member of our local book group. Windermere, Dilston and Swan Bay booklovers having been enjoying one another's stimulating company once a month for the last thirty years, while keeping their minds active. Currently meetings are held on the second Wednesday of every month at members' homes, commencing at 7.30pm.

To celebrate our 30th anniversary in October we are inviting booklovers who are interested in joining our Book Club to join us for a special get-together on Wednesday October 12 at 7.30 pm. Couples are welcome. Indeed, in the early years of our book group quite a number of men were frequent attendees.

While fiction is often a regular choice, the book we will be discussing at this October meeting will be *The Water Dreamers* by historian and popular broadcaster, Michael Cathcart, in which he explores the ways in which Australian life has been fundamentally shaped by water -- or rather by the lack of it.

In the 19th century, European Australians came to equate our continent's dry interior with 'emptiness' and 'silence', and also with the notion of aridity in both a material and metaphorical sense.

The Water Dreamers is a haunting and thought provoking history of a dry land that refuses to yield to the fevered imagination of its colonizers.

Cathcart suggests that from Federation onwards, spirited nationalists such as Alfred Deakin sought to change this earlier ambivalent relationship to the land by overcoming it -- and that they attempted to do this through water. Irrigation became a symbol of this new belief.

Michael Cathcart argues that today Australia is witnessing the emergence of a new nationalism shaped by environmental consciousness and global responsibility.
