## **COMMUNITY CONCERN AT WINDERMERE**

A number of residents have expressed concern about developments at the Windermere Cafe since the property changed hands. We publish here a letter from a reader regarding the recent removal of a noticeboard on the corner which was used both for the Cafe and for community information. The new owners of the property have responded but would provide nothing for publication.



#### Dear Editor

Some unfortunate Community news;

The Community blackboard on the side of the road near the corner of Windermere Road and John Lees Drive has been removed, apparently by the new landlords of the Windermere Cafe.

Unfortunate; because they are now residents of the community and may not have known of the significance of our Community Notice Board before taking it upon themselves to remove it.

The community notice/blackboard was gifted to the Community over 7 years ago, for the cafe use of displaying The Open Hours or cafe specials such as Seafood, Mothers, Father's Day sittings, TGIF nights etc. It has been continually used for community notifications, especially Alerts to watch out for thieves in the area, often around Christmas time, Lost Animals, Fire warnings, Happy birthdays/anniversaries to some special people, everyone is special in our community. Events like Harvest Festival at St Matthias Church, Markets held at Dilston Hall. The cafe is the hub of our community as is Hillwood cafe, notices are shared on these notice boards for our wider communities.

The notice board is a vital link to the community and visitors, tourists when stopping by from the highway to the cafe. Not everyone in our community is on Facebook, this is the reason I chose to write to the editor of Smoke Signals. Those that are on Facebook can see how upset the Community is over the Notice board being removed. In taking this action the owners are harming the cafe's business, because hours cannot be displayed, the removal also makes it look like the cafe has been permanently closed.

To our Smoke Signal readers, please support our Windermere cafe in keeping it open. Open from Thursday to Sunday, 9am - 3pm come along and join the Scrabble Group on a Thursday, stay for a roast lunch. The Sunday roast often includes Yorkshire puddings, very popular so best to book. Of course there is a good range of home style meals to choose from, cakes and deserts. Fleur can cater for your special occasions too, even a high tea or early evening group celebrations.

#### Dear Editor,

"Further to continued email correspondence, I was invited to meet with Mr Michael Stretton, CEO, Launceston City Council. I attended a meeting on Wednesday 13th July together with Anne Layton-Bennett and Berrice Miller, both of Swan Bay.

Mr Stretton updated us on the recommendations to Council as discussed at the Council meeting on 5th May.

Amendments to signs at Swan Bay have been undertaken and we should see other signs erected by September. There appears to be some confusion between the road signs residents deem necessary, and those Council see fit, and we stressed that it was important that Roads Manager Nick Browne consults with residents first.

Unfortunately, Mr Browne was unable to attend the meeting, and his perspective would have been useful.

We also asked to see the plans for proposed road work at the Windermere Café/shop intersection, and that the 100km/hr speed limit in the cafe area needs to be discussed and reviewed should a bus stop be installed opposite the shop.

We stressed the need for roadside maintenance, and that it's unacceptable to wait another six months for verges to be slashed. In some areas weeds are already out of control. We reiterated the need for the verges to be properly graded.

Apparently consultation has started in some areas about speed limits, (Sanwae Drive) but we asked that consultation opportunities be extended to all residents in the area as those along Los Angelos Road already are, and will continue to be, further impacted by any speed limit decisions.

We were told Tasmania Police has been informed about drivers not adhering to speed limits and hoon behaviour and that we should have seen some Police presence in the area. None of us were aware of being advised about this. Please let me know if you do notice any Police patrols in the area.

As a complete aside, I broached the subject of a Barbeque being installed at Dilston Hall by the Council for use by our community. The subject was raised in conversation recently with Amy Luttrell from our local Playgroup. Mr Stretton is following this up with the Assets Manager to see if it is a possibility as the hall remains a Council asset.

I will keep you updated on any progress but please feel free to contact me if you wish to raise any road safety matters in our area.

#### Dear Editor

The following is the letter I wrote concerning the road safety issues in our area, and that was printed recently in The Examiner. Publication coincided with the meeting Carolyn Gutteridge, Berrice Miller and myself had with Council's general manager, Michael Stretton, to further discuss road safety concerns, and the recommendations prepared by Council that followed Carolyn's presentation at a Council meeting, on our community's behalf. It has been encouraging to see at least some of the points raised with Mr Stretton have now been addressed. Possibly this was a result of persistence on the part of members of our community, and the reports logged on an app that Cllr Harris made, and which he strongly urged us all to download and use.

The 'Snap Send Solve' app is available for anyone to report issues such as potholes, fallen branches, weeds, damaged or defaced road signs etc. Once logged the report cannot be ignored – and so far as examples of potholes Cllr Harris 'snapped and sent' along sections of Los Angelos Road – that's certainly been the case. I'm aware Carolyn has also written a short report following the meeting with Mr Stretton, but if we want to ensure the roads in our area are safe for all those using them, drivers and pedestrians alike, then please consider adding your voice to those urging Council to act. With so many more people living here, and larger and heavier vehicles using them, our roads can not longer be considered either safe or fit for purpose.

"Local councillors frequently receive a bad rap for often seeming to do very little, so this is a shout out to Launceston Councillors Alan Harris and Tim Walker for taking the time to meet with several Swan Bay and Windermere residents recently. They were responding to a detailed presentation compiled by some in the community, which became a Council meeting agenda item, and wanted to hear more about concerns involving the area's increasing and potentially serious road safety issues. Some of these featured in an Examiner article in May. Cllrs Harris and Walker wanted to witness the problems for themselves. As a direct result there has finally been action on the installation of a streetlight at a new and potentially dangerous intersection, and some much needed, and overdue, repairs have been carried out filling in potholes along certain sections. Many thanks to both for ensuring these issues were finally fixed. It's unlikely I'm alone in looking forward to learning the Council will now be addressing the other concerns raised in our community's presentation."

## **BIRDS OF THE TAMAR By Jon Hosford**

## Morepork Ninox leucopsis

The Morepork (Ninox leucopsis), also called the Tasmanian spotted owl, is a small brown owl found throughout Tasmania. Its name is derived from its two-tone call. The bird has many common names including mopoke and boobook-most of these are onomatopoeic as they emulate the bird's distinctive two-pitched call. The Moreporks is a nocturnal hunter and is often heard calling on still nights or in the early hours of the morning, retiring at dawn to roost in secluded spots in the foliage of trees. The more pork feeds on insects and small invertebrates, by pouncing on them from the cover of the trees.

On a wet night, moreporks can be lured to pounce on mice crossing a road in the lights of a car. They often come to grief this way. They have dark brown plumage with prominent pale spots, and golden-yellow eye.

Morepork is now considered a different species to the Southern Boobook of mainland Australia, having yellow eyes as distinct from the Southern Boobook which has green eye colouring. Naturally, the water separating mainland Australia and Tasmania over a long period of time has allowed the two species to develop behaviourally different patterns so that they would be unlikely to interbreed.

Young moreporks do not attain adult plumage properly until their third or fourth year.

The tips of juvenile's feathers are white and fluffy, remnants of the nestlings' down. These are worn away over time, persisting longest on the head. The feathers of the head, neck, and underparts are fluffier overall. Their plumage is a darker and more greyish brown overall than that of adults.

The Morepork is widespread in Tasmania and on King Island and other islands of Bass Strait.

It occurs in most habitats with trees, in Tasmania predominantly eucalypt forests and in areas that have mature trees with hollows.

Moreporks hunt a variety of animals – mainly large invertebrates including beetles, moths and caterpillars, spiders, grasshoppers, They also take almost any suitably sized prey, particularly small birds, rats, and mice. They can find suitable food in pine forests as well as native forest.



# OUR HISTORY WINDERMERE – WHAT NEARLY WAS..... by Tony Walker

We know Windermere today as a sleepy village and one of the prettiest spots on the Tamar, but it has had two narrow escapes from disaster over the last 100 years.

As early as 1903, with exports to England increasing, there was seen to be a need for a deepwater port on the Tamar that would provide a direct shipping link between Launceston and England.

The tidal nature of the estuary made it difficult for large steamers to access Kings Wharf, but safe navigation was feasible from the heads to Windermere, with a minimum depth of 24 feet all the way, even at low tide.

It was suggested that the Port of Windermere be created to service Launceston and to ship out fruit, timber coal and other produce of the north.

It would require a rail link to the north east line at Invermay and it was estimated that a 10 mile rail link and wharf could be constructed for less than £30,000.

It was argued that a rail link would be easier and cheaper on the East Tamar than the West, where Rosevears had been suggested as an alternative port site.

In 1910, the Launceston Harbour League was formed to advance the scheme and the following year the Marine Board approached the Government to finance the rail link.

The project seems to have lapsed until the 1920s when a private consortium, the Industries and Products Corporation of Tasmania, was formed to promote the Port of Windermere.

They proposed to build a privately owned wharf at Windermere as an interstate terminal.

At first the Marine Board smiled on the project and the wharf was approved in 1927. The piles were delivered to the site, but that's as far as it ever got, with the Marine Board apparently having second thoughts, concerned about the potential loss of revenue to a private operator.

There was also considerable public resistance to moving the main port site from Launceston. The deadlock was never resolved and some wit changed the company's sign at the wharf site from Windermere to Wondermore.

Windermere was to have an even more narrow escape just after the Second World War, when the Commonwealth Government decided that Australia needed its own aluminium smelter and it should be built in Tasmania.

A number of sites were considered, with the options eventually narrowed down to Bell Bay or Windermere.

In February, 1948, the Premier, Mr Brooker, announced that a site in Windermere had been chosen and construction would be starting soon.

## **BEES IN THE GARDEN**





BEES ARE LIKE THE CANARY IN THE COAL MINE - THEY ARE THE INDICATORS OF THE HEALTH OF THIS PLANET.

Tasmania needs to be especially vigilant, now that Varroa Mite has been found in various sites around NSW.

Bees are so important for us. Besides pollination, honeybee products - honey, pollen, royal jelly, propolis and venom - can actually help us all stay healthy and strong. All of these products support the immune system.

These products can be gathered by small scale beekeepers and ethically-minded, large scale producers, without further adding to the pressure on honeybees. How can we play our part?

- 1) Plant flowers, shrubs and trees, that help feed the bees pollen (their protein) and nectar (their carbohydrate). There are numerous bee favourites. Some of the easy ones to grow include lavender, rosemary, salvias, banksia, bottle brush and tea tree. And, please be considerate.
- 2) DO NOT use toxic chemicals in your garden! There are non-toxic options.
- 3) Buy raw honey from your local beekeeper.
- 4) Buy organic produce where possible.



- 5) Leave water in your garden (with pebbles or sticks so bees don't drown) bees can drink up to a litre of water per hive per day.
- 6) Remember to remain calm around bees they can sense your fear (by reading your pheromones). Swatting and shooing bees away can aggravate them causing them to think you're a threat.

#### **Brigade News**

Both Hillwood and Dilston Brigades have recently completed their annual winter competencies in Breathing Apparatus, including consolidation of new member's skill recently acquired.

These are essentially to safe operation and wearing of this critical equipment as it provides our members with the best possible protection.

Recent investment by the Tasmania Fire Service in new generation PPC (as seen over) recognises the importance placed on firefighters to ensure they stay safe.

Fun Fact: our structural Jacket and Pants have a flashover rating of 1200 degrees, meaning that the material an sustain exposure to that level of heat for a short period of time. Lets all agree however that we plan never to be in that place!!!!

Recruitment opportunities still exist in both brigades so don't hesitate to contact us for more information.

#### **Heat Packs**

We have placed a small flyer over leaf to bring attention to

the use of heat packs (sometimes knows as heat wheats) during these colder months.

Incorrect heating of these packs has lead to them catching fire, and in an unfortunate small number of cases, the results have been fatal.

Please follow the manufacturer instructions, and never leave these packs unattended in the microwave whilst heating them up.



### **Road Safety**

Recent serious accidents on Tasmanian Roads that have unfortunately had fatal outcomes, has prompted us to reach out to our respective communities, asking you all to please take extra care on our roads at this time of the year.

Our Tasmania Police colleagues in Crash Investigation Services report that in 97% of accidents resulting in a fatality, the causative factors were down to human elements, NOT the condition of the road. The message is drive within the posted limits, and more importantly, drive to the conditions.

We would just like to add that this includes driving past our appliances when we are showing our red and blue lights.

From 1 August 2022, there will be two major changes to the 40kph rule introduced in 2019:

The first change is that this road rule will also apply when you see yellow lights in front of you. Motorists will also be required to safely slow down to 40km/h when passing a stationary or slow-moving roadside assistance vehicle with flashing yellow lights.

The second change is to make sure everyone can comply safely on high-speed roads (over 80km/h). On roads over 80km/h, you must slow down to pass a stationary or slow-moving emergency service or roadside assistance vehicle with flashing lights (red, blue, magenta or yellow) or a siren unless it is not safe to do so. If it is unsafe to slow to 40km/h, drivers must slow down as safely as they can.

Take care when slowing and avoid braking suddenly.



## **Home Fire Safety FACT SHEET**





## Heat packs

Wheat filled heat packs can help with pain, but they also have the potential to cause burns and catch fire. Ensure the wheat pack you purchase comes with instructions and follow them carefully.



Tasmania Fire Service Firefighters have responded to numerous house fires that have occurred due to wheat bags overheating in microwave ovens or wheat bags being used to warm bedding

## What you need to know

- . Ensure the wheat bag you purchase comes with instructions and follow them carefully, especially when heating. Ensure the timer on the microwave oven is correctly set when heating your wheat bag. Accidentally setting 30 minutes instead of 3 minutes is easy to do and has caused fatal fires.
- Only use wheat bags for body aches and pains. Wheat bags can ignite, and are not designed for warming beds.
- Regularly check your wheat beg for signs of wear and tear or scorching. With age the wheat dries out and can catch fire.
- If your wheat bag begins to smoulder or catches fire ring Triple Zera immediately.

#### Remember

- Don't overheat a wheat bag by placing in the microwave longer than specified by the manufacturer.
- . Don't leave the wheat bag unsupervised in the microwave
- Don't let anyone, particularly children or the elderly sleep with a wheat bag.
- warm your bed up, as it may sportaneously ignite.
- . Don't reheat the wheat bag before it has properly cooled.


A lot of work has been done to update our Constitution.

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
