NEW STUDY OF TAMAR SEDIMENT



Tamar Mud

The Tamar Action Group was founded by 45 concerned Launcestonians, including many of the city's most prominent businessmen, to drive action on a Tamar River solution, particularly addressing the accumulated mud and extensive rice grass.

They have argued consistently for the feasibility of converting the lower Tamar to a freshwater lake, by constructing a barrage at Point Rapid, near the Batman Bridge.

The lake level, slightly lower than the current high tide mark, would effectively kill the rice grass, which needs saltwater exposure.

However, there was still argument about the effects of the barrage on sediment accumulation – would it fix the mud?

Now TAG has financed and published a new \$50,000 10 year 3D modelling

project into sediment deposit by international marine engineering consultants BMT, which they hope will help to validate the project in the eyes of Government and the public.

The report is long and complex but in summary seems to conclude that in the more "quiescent" lake environment the sediment would be deposited in the deeper channels and over the whole area of both the lake and the remaining estuary, rather than on the banks as tends to occur in a tidal environment.


tends to occur in a tidal environment. For the Lake case the Upper Reaches will become a net exporter of sediment due to the erosion of sediment from the Yacht Basin and Home Reach driven by flood events. The ongoing fluvial supply from the catchment and any sediment mobilised from the Home Reach is predicted to disperse and settle in the relatively deep and wide areas of the lake from Stephenson's Bend to Point Rapid. Sediment settling to the bed from the freshwater of the lake will tend to settle in the deep channels.

The report also indicates that the main area of current community concern, the Lower North Esk, Yacht Basin, Home Reach and North to Freshwater Point will, in the lake environment, experience a reduction in stored sediment over time and benefit from a minimum navigation depth of 3 metres.

TAG acknowledges that the Tamar Lake proposal is just one potential solution for the river, and for years has been advocating for an independent authority to assess the various proposals and act on them.

Now, for the first time, they are planning to move "inside the tent" by putting up five candidates for the coming Launceston City Council elections.

The five candidates, Andrew Lovitt, Owen Tilbury, Bob Salt, Alex Britton and Alan Harris, stress that they are not a party, but simply individual candidates with a common concern for the welfare of the Tamar

In 2018 Windermere church was listed for sale by the Anglican Diocese of Tasmania.

The decision distressed, angered and disillusioned community members and people with links to those interred in the cemetery and columbarium wall.

A packed community meeting expressed overwhelming support for saving the church.

\$45,500 was raised by parishioners and the community; sufficient to fund compensation for historic Anglican Church abuse.

St. Matthias was removed from sale and retained by the Anglican Diocese of Tasmania.

St Matthais is:

- Valued as a place of worship, a peaceful resting place for loved ones and a beautiful place for quiet contemplation.
- Valued as a place where the community comes together to share the important milestones of our lives: weddings, baptisms and funerals.
- Valued as a cultural centre for music, festivals and community gatherings.
- Valued for its heritage and as an iconic Tamar Valley Landmark.

BIRDS OF THE TAMAR By Jon Hosford

Black-faced Cuckoo Shrike



A summer visitor to the Tamar Valley and many other parts of Tasmania, the Black-faced Cuckoo Shrike is so named because of its black face, cuckoo like form and flight and because of its shrike-like bill.

These birds are not cuckoos and do not lay eggs in the nests of other birds, although they have been known to steal nestlings of other species for food.

They generally feed on a variety of large insects amongst the foliage of eucalypts and acacias. Their flight pattern is most distinctive, with long undulating flaps and glides whilst uttering harsh metallic trills.

They build a small nest of twigs and spider web on a forked, horizontal limb at a height of between 6-20 metres in August-February.

The nest is so small that the young nestlings end up sitting on it rather than in it. Both male and female birds share the brooding of the eggs and the feeding of the young.

In the late autumn, the birds and their offspring migrate to southern New Guinea or the Bismarck Archipelago and The

Solomon Islands. You will start to hear them calling locally this month and establishing a territory.

They are reasonably common around the district at this time of the year, increasing in numbers after breeding until migration north occurs in April.

EAST TAMAR MENS SHED NEWS



The Mens Shed has been a hive of activity again with another large project for the Low Head Community Garden underway. Circular seating, more garden beds and "beach huts" storage sheds are being built to add to what is now a very impressive feature at Lagoon Beach. Several smaller requests continue to come in from local community members, which the men are happy to complete if they are within their skill set.

The quest for a local community library book exchange has been realised with two small community library kits provided by the Launceston City Council. The libraries have been assembled and painted and have been placed at the entrance to the Dilston Hall with a steady turnover of books occurring from day one. A larger library is under construction, and the suggestion is that that one of the libraries will be converted into a seed exchange for the keen gardeners in the area. The other can be relocated to a different area in the community.

At the recent AGM and General Meeting, discussion about the loss of the notice board at the café occurred. As the Mens Shed constructed and located these originally, members are keen to assist with a contribution for labour for any group that comes up with a solution to the loss.

Several members living in Riverside have recently left the Shed, due to the opening of their own Mens Shed in their suburb, so we are keen to fill these vacancies. It is important to stress, the East Tamar Mens Shed welcomes men of all ages with some of our members just needing to get out of the house for a chat, play chess, or make useful community contacts and never lift a hammer. However, with the range of skills that the other members possess, and the woodworking and metal machines and tools available it means the Shed can provide a valuable learning experience as social interaction and helping the community.



OUR HISTORY WINDERMERE – WHAT NEARLY WAS..... by Tony Walker

WINDERMERE SITE New Port Area Possible?

WINDERMERE - SCENERY OR SMELTER?

Immediately after the Second World War, the Australian Government under John Curtin, decided that Australia must develop an aluminium industry "from the point of view both of defence and post-war reconstruction".

Decentralisation to the smaller states was also a basic principle of the Curtin Government, which in 1945, came to an agreement with Robert Cosgrove's State Government to contribute £1.5 million each towards establishing an aluminium smelter in Tasmania.

A site was to be selected by the end of the year, but the decision lingered on until 1948, when the Examiner reported:

"Aluminium Industry Site: It seems that at last all doubt about the aluminium industry coming to the Tamar Valley has been removed but apparently there is still some uncertainty as to the actual site of the works. The proposed West Tamar site and the Third Basin power scheme appear to have receded from the picture somewhat, and Windermere, on the East Tamar, has suddenly appeared in the foreground."

The Examiner pointed out to alarmed residents that "the thought that the beauty of Windermere may be ruined by the erection of an aluminium industry is not a pleasant one. But practically every part of Tasmania is beautiful and there is scarcely a spot anywhere on our island where a large secondary industry could be placed without marring some scenic attractions or giving other cause for complaint. We can't have it both ways." In other words, tough luck.

In February, 1948, the Premier announced that Native Point had been selected as the site for the aluminium works, with a rail link to Launceston to be built and a wharf built to accommodate ships from 6,000 to 8,000 tons. It seemed that the Port of Windermere was finally to materialise, although on a different site from the first proposal.

However tests at Native Point revealed a soft substrata not suitable for heavy industry. The choice was then between Windermere (the original wharf site) and Bell Bay.

The Premier favoured Windermere but in March, 1948, the Aluminium Production Commission announced Bell Bay as the site, mainly on the grounds of the superior port facilities.

A second brush with death for the picturesque Windermere we all know and love.

New Port At Windermere And Whither?

AT LONG LAST the site of the aluminium industry to be established as a joint undertaking between the Commonwealth and Tasmanian Governments, has been fixed at Windermere. The decision revives memories of a proposition of some 20 years ago to build a wharf there for the interstate passenger traffic.


AMAZING FACTS ABOUT BEES: AND OUR NATIVE NANNY BEE

Did you know that honeybees understand the concept of zero? Perhaps this explains why I've noticed bees checking out the exact spot where I have recently removed an enormous Abelia x grandiflora. It was a big favourite with the bees and now they're going "where the heck has it gone?" Bees can also add and subtract numbers. Another surprise is that they are more effective than sniffer dogs in detecting land mines.

Bees are being trained to do unexpected things. For example bumblebees can be taught to play soccer! Research shows that they remember good and bad experiences. This suggests that they have a form of consciousness. In fact, a recent study has found that insects, not just honeybees, may be able to feel fear, anger and empathy. So think before you swat is the best advice.

NANNY BEE

One of our native bee species is particularly unique. Formerly having a solitary life, it has evolved in a truly remarkable way. Two females now co-habit with one female reproducing, and the second female, forgoing that natural instinct, is the forager and support system for the nest.

SMOKE DECTECTORS

With the change to daylight savings, it is a good time to check your smoke alarms for correct operation. Most have a test feature, and it is also good practice for batteries to be replaced for those smoke detectors that use the common 9V battery.

...and here's a good tip for those of you installing 10year lithium batteries detectors, put the installation date on the back cover so you know when it should be replaced.

As always both brigades are more than happy to offer support and assistance to our communities with advice and installation!

CAN WE FIT!

Both brigades would like to ask our respective community members to have a check of the entrances to their properties to ensure we (and other emergency services) can easily gain access should the

unfortunate need arise. It is worth noting that we don't just respond to fires, but also to other call such as medical emergencies, and to assist Ambulance Tasmania. Our larger appliances are quite large as shown below, and so your help would be greatly appreciated!!

Property preparedness

The current La Niña is looking relatively short and weak, likely to peak in late spring or early summer. However it will bring us

higher rain totals over the next couple of months, it is envisaged that there will still be substantial fires in the landscape after Christmas. Preparing your property now but removing vegetation from around your buildings may well assist you and the fire service should the worst happen. The wetter than average pre Christmas period cannot be taken for granted, There will be more on this in the December edition of Smoke Signals!


Prepare your home - create a defendable space

Your home is more likely to survive a bushfire if you have prepared it properly. The most important job is to create a defendable space, an area around your home where you have modified the vegetation and removed most flammable material to reduce the fire's radiant heat intensity. Flames and radiant heat from an approaching bushfire will be reduced, so sparks and embers will have less fuel to ignite when they land, and any spot fires will be easier to put out.

A defendable space makes it much easier to defend your home. And if you choose not to stay, a defendable space will help firefighters protect your home, or may even protect your home if firefighters cannot reach it.

A defendable space includes two 'zones':

- An inner zone where flammable materials are minimised.
- An outer zone where a low level of flammable material is permitted.
 In the inner zone, flammable materials on, under and around your home should be moved away from the house. Use the guide below to work out the distance you need to apply.


