HELP KEEP YOUR COMMUNITY SAFE – VOLUNTEERS NEEDED



From sausages and sandwiches to churches and charities, volunteering involves Tasmania community members from all walks of life, all with that admirable common goal to do something for others, for no gain for themselves.

An area of volunteering sometimes not fully understood is the commitment to the Tasmanian community in the provision of emergency services, be it Volunteers Ambulance Officers, State Emergency Services (SES) members, and Tasmania Fire Service first responders.

an essential service across Tasmania, often engaging with people in their most adverse times of need.

The members of Dilston Fire Brigade are no different, giving up their own time to help not only the community members of Dilston, Windermere and Swan Bay, but also to the wider Tasmanian community, and indeed at times, travelling 'overseas to Australia'! Dilston Brigade Chief Raoul Stow is immensely proud of the team at Dilston Brigade for their ongoing commitment to the community at large, responding These volunteering groups provide to around 70 emergency calls a year,

along with the additional activities such as fire coverage for motorsport at Symmons Plains, Agfest, and the annual Christmas Iolly run.

However, Raoul does hold underlying concern that like so many other volunteer groups servicing communities, that the uptake of people willing and able to volunteer has been on a noticeable decline.

"Dilston Fire Brigade is not the station, the grounds, the trucks and the gear, it is the people" he said. "Without the people, Dilston brigade and other brigades and groups would cease to exist". Raoul is aware of areas in the state where that has indeed happened, where a lack of members has resulted in that local brigade closing down.

"...and that is clearly not in the best interests of the community"

He stresses that Dilston brigade is far from this predicament, however he does note that there is still a need to bolster the firefighter numbers at the brigade and would like to encourage members of the community who think that they might be able to assist, to contact one of the officers in the brigade section of Smoke Signals to make a time to drop into the station and "find out what we are all about!"

SNAKES ARE ON THE MOVE

Snake season is with us and all East Tamar residents should know what to do in case of a snake bite. Ian Norton of Reptile Rescue gave a well attended snake information session at the Dilston Hall recently. Ian has developed a QR code which, when scanned with your smartphone, will give you all the information you need in an emergency. This QR code is on the front cover of this Smoke Signals and we will continue to carry it on the cover of the February and April editions.



lan again emphasized that the most important piece of equipment to have with you is a pair of 10-12cm elasticized bandages to tightly bind the affected limb. You do not have to catch or identify the snake – current anti-venoms are effective with all Tasmanian snakes.

Scan the QR code on the cover to access, download and save detailed information on the symptoms and emergency treatment of snake bites.

Dear Smoke Signals editor,

Driving past Sherborn Drive, on our way to our abode at Woodlawn Road, I wondered where that name came from. Other street names in the district seem to have evident connections such as a late Mayor, bird and property names and so on. Sherborne seemed out of place. I asked Katherine, 'who would surely know'. "It has always been Sherborne", well maybe, how long ago is "always?" No other locals, seemed to know either.

It transpired that one only had to look at the older survey charts from before the digital age of property numbers, satellite positioning etc. to discover that the sub-division 'Sherborne' is on a corner of the Parish of Sherborne. So, "always" is from the early 1800s when the first surveys were undertaken. Such was the sense of isolation and distance from S.W. England, from whence came many of the first Anglo invaders, that we have names like Tamar Estuary, towns like Launceston, Exeter, and landscape divisions like Counties of Cornwall and Dorset and Parishes, like Sherborne which, too, is a town in SW England and may well have been the home of one of those early surveyors.

It transpires that the Grammar School has a student exchange program with Sherborne Girls which school caters mainly for boarders, mostly from around the U.K. but also abroad. The student exchange was revived this year after a Covid induced break. Last summer three Grammar girls in the 15-16 yr. age group were selected to represent their school. Sadly one withdrew due to sickness. The remaining two spent last January at the boarding school, a long weekend at home



with their reciprocal exchangee and generally having "the best time in their lives". This summer I believe the school is offering four exchange opportunities.

The picture shows Aelish Platt-Ransom and her Tasmanian host Ava Isabella Farquhar (with a scarf) swinging around the Sherborne Drive sign post. As a day girl Ava hosted Aelish in East Launceston at home with her family this past winter, that being the summer break time for Sherborne Girls. GARDEN CLUB NEWS

OCTOBER – "Stoneacre", Gravelly Beach - Rosemary Verbeeten hosted a most enjoyable afternoon at *"Stoneacre"* - a 1-1/2 acre property which showcases the wonder of our native flora. Garden Club last visited this garden in Gravelly Beach in March 2021. It was really lovely to be able to see the garden in spring, and to see how much it has grown in the last two years.

Garden club members were impressed with its abundance, splendour, diversity and health. Gravelled paths wound their way through gardens of contrasting foliage and splashes of colour, allowing for our close-up inspection. Unusual garden sculptures added surprise and intrigue. Contributing to the biodiversity in this garden are a bog area and frog pond, a section of native grasses, as well as a flower bed of selected plants to attract bees and deter bugs, positioned close to the vegetable garden for maximum effect.

NOVEMBER – Emu Valley Rhododendron Gardens - On a perfect spring day, Garden Club members enjoyed walking the tranquil pathways throughout the natural amphitheatre that is Emu Valley, which gave wonderful views of the landscaped slopes, and spectacular vistas off into the distance.



Rhododendrons of every size and colour displayed their magnificence - together with companion plants laid out by their geographical origin, and in themed environments. Several natural springs feed into the large stepped basin, forming a series of lakes.



Eye-catching bridges allowed for an elevated view so we could more easily 'spot the platypuses'. Gazebos, waterfalls, pergolas, stone walls and marine rope edgings were all features included in the unique design of this 11ha plant museum.

The rich volcanic soil has never been farmed. Among its 24,000 plants we spotted a prized Wollemi pine and the exotic Bhutan fir. Everywhere there was something to admire. We rounded off our tour with a visit to the plant and gift shop. Here we learnt that Wollemi pines are being propagated for future sale - and that a puggle (baby platypus) has been seen in one of the lakes. (Submitted by Elizabeth File). CHURCH NEWS St Matthias' Anglican Church

180 Pear Anniversary Celebrations at St Matthias' Church Windermere.

The weekend of Nov. 25-26th brought celebrations for 100 years of the Coats Patons building in Launceston and 140 years of the Salvation Army, but these were over-shadowed at Windermere by the events acknowledging 180 years since the first service at St Matthias Church Windermere! The church was built in 1843 by Dr Mathias Gaunt, and he would've been very pleased with these celebrations.

A celebratory lunch was held at Grindelwald on Saturday, along with an extensive display of church history, and enjoyed by current parishioners and many descendants of James Goodson, a convict assigned to Dr Gaunt at Windermere. The commemorative service on Sunday was led by Rev Ken Box who is descended from the Hill family of the early congregation, and the sermon was delivered by Rev Bob McKay whose ancestor was William Tatnell, a ticket-of-leave convict who worked at Windermere for Dr Gaunt. A special guest was the Deputy Premier and our local member, Michael Ferguson.

The flute played at the first service in 1843 as accompaniment for singing, was played on Sunday by Aileen Lake, transporting the congregation hauntingly back across the years. The 180 year anniversary cake was cut by long-term parishioner Max Jansson, along with Jack Rosevear whose early ancestors were wardens of the church who used to row across the river to services from their Rosevears Tavern on the West Tamar.

On Sunday evening, the Tasmanian Harp and Violin Duo, and acoustic guitarist Marcus Sturrock, filled the church for a beautiful concert ending the weekend on a high note.



HILLWOOD GARDEN CLUB

The Hillwood Garden Club met on 16 October with the guest Speaker being Kirstin Sever, the Program Coordinator for Tamar NRM. Her main interest is biodiversity, weeds and environmental education. Over the past year she has engaged with Council on how we can best serve the community of George Town. We have a tree programme: a big community planting around the tip to help revegetate the area and screen off the ugliness. She has sourced tree guards and selected trees. She is seeking community input on what trees people would like to see and why? How is the area going to be maintained, avoiding the risk of the trees getting too tall and affecting power lines? She received a grant from the Launceston City Council to establish a tree trail and then set up a digital map of what people want and recognise the reasons why they were planted. The aim is 40% tree cover by 2040 which is very ambitious. Also what trees will George Town and West Tamar Councils plant? The trees we plant will have to be able to withstand the wind and the soil which is pretty awful in this area. The appropriate tree for the appropriate place, understorey and support one another. There are not enough people growing plants. We need to collect native seeds, save and store them, the vitality of the seeds is crucial and then grow them. An updated version of the environmental weeds leaflet will be produced soon. The biggest problem is besom heath which is spread by animals and machinery which has not been sterilised. It is a fire hazard. If you see some, take a photo and send it to us. It came into Australia as seed in a straw broom. Bridal creeper and Spanish heath are also on the increase. What are Councils doing? They tend to slash after the seed has set. Launceston City Council has allowed us to manage Cambridge Street. We log them and then go round with the Council men to identify and eradicate the weeds. I would like to work with G'town Council and do something similar plus choose suitable plants. Tamar NRM will be organising 'Catch it in the Catchment' in October. Recently hundreds of sea spurge plants were cleared on the beach. CSIRO can produce a fungus gel from the plant that can be sprayed on. In general the key is to prevent the weed in the first place and then keep on it. As soon as you disturb the soil, you stimulate weeds; avoid chemicals if possible. Cut the weed at ground level then mulch. Troublesome weeds like onion weed and oxalis, cover with thick cardboard.

At its recent meeting the Club was advised that Irene and I had presented a large Japanese maple, grown by Irene, and I provided the pot. The plant was a gift to the owners of "Marigolds on the Tamar" to replace the one that (amongst other things) had been stolen from outside the café.* Irene, who is a very knowledgeable and expert gardner, spoke about the growing and cultivation of salvias. Salvias are from the Laminacea/mentheae mint and sage family. They include annuals, biennials, herbaceous perennials and shrubs. They include widely used herbs such as sage and

rosemary. Most have square stems. There are no native ones in Australia, most come from Central and South America (Mexico), central Asia and the Mediterranean. Some you can eat such as sage, pineapple sage in tea or cold drinks; use in cooking and many of the flowers are edible. They have a long history of being used for medicinal purposes. In Iran salvia microphylla is eaten for digestion. They are very hardy once established, don't get many pests but do spread so can be grown in pots. Fertilise in Spring and then liquid feed. Cut right back to the base after flowering; you might get a 2nd flowering. In the case of shrubs remove all dead stems and prune back. Honeyeaters and bees love them. They can tolerate dry conditions. Can grow from cuttings or root division and of course from seed. They require good air circulation, especially shrubs, to avoid fungal diseases. Irene had brought a wonderful selection of salvias including: salvia officinalis, s. lanceolata, s. leucantha (Mexican sage), s. involucrata, s. microphylla , s. muirii, s. Africana-lutea

(orange claw flower, native to S. Africa), s. guaranitica and purple
