OUR 250TH EDITION!

In December 1990, we first said hello:

"Hello, this is the first issue of SMOKE SIGNALS which will be published as a community service several times a year. It will contain information about local groups, activities etc. as well as articles of general interest. Full details of Fire Brigade practices and fundraising events will be featured."

The writer was Eric Sandblom, the inaugural editor of Smoke Signals. Early editions carried Fire Brigade news and fund-raising events and East Tamar Garden Club and St Matthias Church were regular contributors. Early advertisers were Lees Orchards, Caltex Mount Direction, the Windermere Corner Store and the Bohemian Restaurant, which was at that time on the corner of the East Tamar Highway and Dilston Road.

In September 1996, the headline read "The last Smoke Signals?" as Eric and Noeline Sandblom were relocating to Victoria. Fortunately Gary Woodfall stepped up as Editor and produced Smoke Signals until October, 2003 when again the headline was "The end of an era approaches" with the announcement that December would be the last issue if a new Editor could not be found. My wife Sue and I had recently moved to Dilston and I put up my hand to keep Smoke Signals going. The timing was unfortunate as in 2004 I was diagnosed with prostate cancer, so the production of Smoke Signals was a bit irregular until Jon Hosford got things back on track when he took over in February, 2008. Concern Over Fire Safety

Following the lack of community interest in the Annual General Meeting of the Dilston/Windermere/Swan Bay Fire Service, I would like to express my concern at the lack of knowledge concerning our fire service. There are now over 300 householders and property owners in the area served by our Brigade.

If you or your neighbours are confronted by a fire, whether house or scrub, or just a simple burn off that gets away, do you know where to get help?

Do you know which 'phone number to call? (Don't ring Newnham or Launceston - we are not in their area and we have to look after ourselves.)

Where is your nearest fire hose and stand-pipe? They are better than a garden hose and are the first line of defence. Would you know how to use them? During most days the wives and

mothers are at home and support could be quite a few vital minutes away. From November last year until 28th

April, 1990 the local volunteers were called out 18 times, they attended:

- 10 bushfires
- 5 illegal bum-offs
- 1 house fire
- 1 structural (jetty)
- 1 accident to supervise leaking petrol danger.

As you can see these volunteers give such a lot to this area, but why should they have to do it all? Many hands can make the work lighter - and just a bit of personal locality knowledge could make a big difference to your family's and neighbour's safety.

If you can't answer any of the above questions the necessary information is available at any of the practice meetings or can be obtained by phoning your local Regional Officer.





The weather was kind to us and it was a stunning autumn day. The trees in the churchyard provided a delightful shaded and sheltered ambiance for our local artisans, honey-related producers and a crop swap. The table of fruit, vegetables, preserves, biscuits etc. groaned under the weight of the locally grown produce for swapping, and there were many beefriendly plants to swap. Visitors took turns to guess the number of lima beans in the jar with several prizes for the closest guesses. There were free tours of the church, and a history table inside the church. Dilston Fire Brigade displayed two of their fire trucks for an up-close view and some wonderful photo opportunities with our fabulous local Fire Brigade, who do a marvellous job.



Stephen, from Wanderer Mead, provided many a happy visitor with tastings of his locally produced mead (Did you know that mead is the first known alcoholic beverage consumed by mankind, AND it is believed to predate wine by nearly three thousand years! For those who didn't know, it is made using honey rather than grapes, as its source of sugar).



Florence, our youngest exhibitor at just nine years old), is a beekeeper who lives in Dilston, and has learnt how to care for her Mum's bees at all stages of the process. Florence provided taste tests of several different honeys on the day, and displayed honeycomb and her pink beekeeper's protective suit.

Malcolm, also a local beekeeper, provided taste tests of his honey and had two (currently uninhabited) beehives to view up close.



The Community art work continued (Reggie watched with interest!) with a "mural" of tiles which were decorated with a harvest theme, by those attending the Harvest Celebration. The mural is taking shape and will eventually be framed and coated in resin to preserve it for the future, as an artistic "snapshot" of Autumn in the East Tamar in 2024.

BEES IN THE GARDEN



WHETHER YOU START EARLY OR LATER IN LIFE BEEKEEPING IS MAGIC.

Our community's youngest beekeeper is now nine years old! Florence Jeffery's interest in beekeeping began when she was just five years old when her mother, Emma, was presented with a beehive by her husband. Inspired by a book about beekeeping, Florence was soon engaged with helping spin the honey extractor, filling the jars with honey from the settling tank after it had been strained, and weighing and calculating the weight and total of the harvest. Provided with a bee suit, Florence progressed to holding the smoker and puffing out the smoke to calm the bees when they inspected the hives and extracted the frames. That was when the family lived on Flinders Island. Last year they moved back to Dilston, bringing their bees on the plane with them! Today they have three hives, and young Florence is now a capable beekeeper with the experience to help with all the steps in the honey process.

Having watched her friends on Flinders have their own veggie stall outside their house, Florence was excited to have a honey stall with the honey she harvested this season. After thumbs up from Launceston Council she and her younger brother Alex had their first honey sales over the fence at home. Having her own stall at our community Harvest Celebration at St Matthias' Church was the end of a perfect summer for Florence.



By contrast, local beekeeper Malcolm Giles, who lives on Los Angelos Road, got into producing honey when he was given a beekeeping kit for his fiftieth birthday. Deciding he was going to take this opportunity seriously Malcom enrolled in a beekeeping course in Hobart. This entailed Malcolm driving to Hobart after he finished work, attending the evening course, and driving home that night. His three evening sessions and one full day session paid off handsomely, and Malcolm is a fully qualified beekeeper and member of Tasmanian Beekeepers Association.

The Black Currawong is a medium-sized bird endemic to Tasmania. It has a heavy, black bill, black body and white tips to the flight-feathers and tail. It has a bright yellow eye. Immature birds are similar but duller in appearance.

In Tasmania, the 'Black-winged' subspecies of the Grey Currawong, S. versicolor, is similar, but can be distinguished from the Black Currawong, by having white in its wings, a different call and a less massive beak. The Forest Raven, Corvus tasmanicus, lacks the white tail markings of the Black Currawong.

In the Autumn, many of these birds leave their home in the highlands and migrate to the milder weather of the Tamar Valley and coastal areas. Their musical call, 'kar-week, week-kar', is often heard of a morning and evening echoing along the valleys.

The Black Currawong is an omnivore, feeding on young birds, lizards, worms, insects and berries. It can be quite bold and has been



known to snatch food from people. Walkers in the highlands need to be careful of leaving packs at open stations for side walks, as these birds are known to manipulate pack zips in search of tasty morsels.

Grape growers in the Tamar Valley are a keen target for these birds which are skilled at getting under netting to share ripe grapes in March and April.

They breed in the highlands high in the canopy of eucalypt forests. Both parents actively feed 2-4 chicks in the early summer months.

REMEMBERING THE BOHEMIAN

One of the first advertisers in Smoke Signals was the Bohemian Restaurant, on the corner of Dilston Road and what was then the East Tamar Highway. Many older residents will have pleasant memories of nights out at what was then our local restaurant.

The building was originally constructed in the 1970s as the Dilston Church of Christ. This congregation was commenced by Gerald Pace in the early 70's, but by the time Smoke Signals was launched in 1990 Simon and Karen Burden had converted the building to the Bohemian Restaurant and the Lion's Head Bar and Bistro.

This lively restaurant and function centre was a feature of the East Tamar, with events like a 60s Rock 'n Roll Party, a fancy dress New Year's Eve and an Australia Day barbeque on the lawns. In 1996 it was the venue for the farewell to Eric and Noeline Sandblom when they moved to Victoria. Eric was the founder and first Editor of Smoke Signals. For more than 10 years it was the venue for local Neighborhood Watch meetings.

Sadly, the Bohemian closed in March, 2000 and, apart from a brief period when the Rostella Restaurant was trading, locals have had to drive further for their dining out. We miss it even more when we look at the ad – a superb four course dinner for \$32!



EAST TAMAR MENS SHED NEWS

There has been a lot of activity at the Men's Shed recently with the preparation for the Market held on March 16th followed by the sausage sizzle when the election was held at the Dilston Hall on the 23rd. The combined events proved quite financially successful and will soon be well spent, as we are finally building our mezzanine floor in the Shed.





With the Support of the Tasmanian Department of Communities and the Federal Government Men's Shed grants program we will be able to increase our work area by storing wood and projects above floor level on the mezzanine floor. Plans have been drawn by ARTAS (generously donated) and the foundations have been dug in the existing Shed floor thanks to Andrew from Swan Bay Excavations who generously donated his time and machine. It has been a long process with planning, building approvals, engineers all done and steel fabrication now underway.

A great team and community effort for which we are very grateful.

Fire Season hits again!

As reported last issue of smoke signals, the early start to the fire season in October 2023, didn't result in any significant activity...that is until just after the February smoke signals was published.

Since then both Hillwood and Dilston Brigades have been extremely busy in support of a wide range of incidents, most notably the very visible fires in Rocherlea and Ravenswood. Both incidents consumed a large number of resources from a wide range of brigades, including those sent from the south to support us in the north.

In addition, both brigades have deployed crews to support a great number other challenging incidents including Waterhouse, St Leonards, Trevallyn, West Tamar, Port Latta, Ouse, Dee and Bronte Lagoons, not forgetting the early season deployments to the East Coast and Flinders Island.

Brigade Chiefs Elaine and Raoul are immensely proud of the efforts their brigade members have been putting in, and thank their members for continuing to heed the call when the pager goes off!

Both brigades always have room for more, so please, if you feel you might be able to lend some of your valuable time, we would love to chat about the rewarding role TFS volunteering play in the Tasmanian community.



SMOKE ALARMS

With the change from daylight saving, it's a good time to check and change your smoke alarm batteries if applicable.

HOME FIRE SAFETY

As the season starts to change, the temperatures drop and we find ourselves looking towards a few small jobs that need doing as we approach he coldest months.

The TFS advised that drying clothing be no closer than 2M to heat source, and preferably greater. If hanging clothing out overnight to dry, then is it best placed well clear of any heating device, and of course, we recommend that smoke alarms be fitted in the house..

On the topic of drying clothes, ensure lint filters are kept clear Are you electric blankets in good condition?? Replace them if you find any damage, and remember never place heavy objects on them!

WOOD HEATERS | CHIMNEYS AND FLUS

As the colder weather sets in, a reminder to everyone to ensure your wood heater flue is cleaned

prior to being used this year. The build up of soot and creosote is the major cause of

e f flue fires, and can in

chimney and flue fires, and can in worst case lead to surrounding roofing materials catching fire.

END OF PERMIT PERIOD

By the time this issue is delivered the permit period is likely to have ended. Please keep an eye out for the removal of the permit signs and the notification in the various forms of media Thankyou to all residents that asked for permits this season and for the registering of burns in general. Please continue to register you burns and it helps us keep a track on fires in our area.

Hillwood's Rock Climbing site has been re-opened! The George Town Council have negotiated a lease agreement with the landowner, and as part of the Wild Tamar Project, this amazing volcanic rock formation is sure to attract international interest once again. The project was made possible by grant funding under the Recovery for Regional Tourism program administered

A soft opening was held on Monday 11th March, when the climbers met at the footy ground to carpool. Steve Postle, (pictured below) Vice president of Rock Climbing Club of Tasmania, was excited about the area re-opening. Steve, who is also vice president of Crag Care of Tas, is interested in the environment side of rock climbing and is keen that all parties look after the area, so these cliffs are available for people in the future.

We were also keen to hear that Gerry Narkowicz, who has recently written a book on the history of rock climbing in Tasmania has been named the Crag Steward of Hillwood.

The Hillwood Rock Climbing Area is arguably the best sport climbing crag in Tasmania. There are over 150 routes of excellent quality, with unrivalled accessibility. The highly featured rock is a change from the vertical

dolerite found elsewhere around northern Tasmania and the cliffs face all directions making it climbable most of the year.

Everyone had an enjoyable weekend, and all admired the Hillwood venue and football club facilities. Thanks to the committee for letting us use the football club.



HILLWOOD GARDEN CLUB

At its meeting in February Gerald and Lou Archer of "Landfall" provided a fascinating overview of the history of the Archer family in Tasmania since the 1820's to the present day. The family hailed from Hertfordshire in England and settled initially in the Longford and Cressy area. "Woolmers" estate was founded in 1817 by Thomas Archer and "Brickendon" was settled in 1824 by William Archer. A lot of the land around "Woolmers" was subsequently sold over the years. Subsequent land holdings included in Bothwell and Quamby, Pipers River, Windermere and Sway Bay. Subsequent properties were the "Landfall" property on the Tamar, bought in 1876, and "Greenhythe". The acquisition of "Landfall" was to be the foundation upon which Frank Archer (1846-1902), and his descendants were to build one of the most extraordinary pastoral empires in Tasmania.

Also in February Anne Green of Green Flower Farm hosted members to a tour of the wonderful farm where she and husband, Tom, grow a wide range of flowers notably for the Harvest Market. A huge amount of hard work with beautiful results. See photo.
