A STORMY INTRODUCTION TO SPRING



The first of September signals the end of winter and a welcome beginning to the warmer months ahead. It seems this year however, nature had other things planned!

On August 29 there was power outage in Windermere lasting several hours, a sign of things to come! In the next few days winds certainly picked up, bringing down many trees and cutting power not only to surrounding areas of Dilston/Windermere/Swan Bay and Hillwood, but to much of Tasmania. These were certainly trying times, and local power outages lasted from 24 hours for some to over a week or more for others.

Repairs to the power network seemed to be frustratingly slow. Because of the extent of damage, work had to be prioritised. Lineworkers, electricians and emergency services had to restore infrastructure whilst working in extreme and dangerous conditions. Power was restored to most in a few days. Unfortunately for pockets of residents, difficult access to fallen wires meant some were without power for an extended period.

What really shone through everything was the effort put in by community members to help each other out. As power was gradually restored to some, offers were extended to those less fortunate and included things such as freezer space for food, recharges for mobile devices, portable generators, or even hot showers! Trees had fallen across roadways, and some were quickly cleared by locals if safe to do so. These offers of help continued throughout. The Hillwood News section of this issue has some information on the support offered in that area.

This issue welcomes Anna De La Rue, a recent member to the community, who is also able to offer her services as a marriage celebrant.



Gaunt Flour Mill

Matthias Gaunt is best remembered locally as the creator of Saint Matthias Church at Windermere.

Dr. Gaunt arrived in the colony in 1830 and was granted 2,500 acres on the East Tamar which he named Windermere. The church was built to fulfil a promise to his wife who was still in England.

Dr Gaunt never practiced medicine in Tasmania but he was an enterprising businessman and one of the first in the colony to utilize steam power.

In 1837, he imported a 15 horse power high pressure steam engine, just the second in the colony, and, in partnership with George Coke, set up a steam powered sawmill in Windermere, advertising:

the UNION STEAM SAWING MILLS are now in full work, and that they will execute any orders in native timber, New Zealand pine, or cedar. — Ship's spars as usual. — Veneers.

There was a shortage of flour in Launceston and in 1838, Dr. Gaunt apparently decided that the steam engine might be better used for flour production and advertised for an experienced miller, producing the first flour in July of that year.

The Union Steam Flour Mill at Windermere was very successful and was to remain in production for more than 30 years, run first by Gaunt and later by his sons.

In association with John Raven, whose company distributed the flour from the Union Steam Flour Mill, Gaunt decided to build a steam mill in Launceston. They ordered equipment from England, bought land on what is now The Esplanade and erected a four storey mill building, but no flour was ever produced.

The second flour mill on the East Tamar was at Dilston on Barnard's Creek. Charles Barnard brought out mill equipment with him from England. In 1846 he built a mill on the creek but, although he constructed a large dam, found that the ground was too porous to hold water and the project was abandoned. The stone and brick mill building was converted into the Landfall homestead and is still occupied by the Archer family. The equipment was sold to the Cataract Mill. The stone lined mill race is still visible.

The Burnside Granary, the large brick building opposite the Windermere turnoff is listed in the Australian Heritage Register as the Burnside Flour Mill, but this seems to be an error and there is no evidence of a mill on that site.

The definitive study on Tasmanian flour mills, A Thematic Study of the Tasmanian Flour Milling Industry, by Jill Cassidy and Keith Preston is available to download from QVMAG.

agreed that there were enough to create a fabulous display. Thank you to Evelyn and Jamie for making us feel so welcome.


SEPTEMBER

Beach, which Garden Club has visited a couple of times before.





BEES IN THE GARDEN



Bee Surprised!

Did you know that bees have five eyes?

Three of those act as light receptors, helping the bee keep track of the sun at all times, even during cloudy days. Their two more developed eyes are composed of 6900 facets each, making the bees extremely good at perceiving movement. How good? The human eye can perceive movements separated by 1/50th of a second. Bee eyes can detect movements separated by 1/300th of a second! If a bee watches a movie, it would be a very slow slideshow to it.

Honeybees can recognise and remember human faces.

Their brains make out faces the same way as us — By identifying the shape of parts like eyebrows, ears, nose and put them together to make out the whole face. I've thought that ever since the time I rescued over a dozen bees that were suffering from hypothermia. Maybe they shared their story when they got back to the hive, because I get the feeling every year when the bees are back that they seem to know me.

Bees are exceptional navigators.

Bees have exceptional memory and learning, even though their brain is the size of a sesame seed. They calculate the distance from the hive by using the sun as a guiding point. Their maximum speed is 25 km/h. with their wings beating up to 190 times per second. That's 11,400 times a minute! This speed allows the worker bee to visit fifty to a hundred blossoms in one trip, which can be up to 10 km away from the hive.

The honeymaking process is more than 100 million years old.

The way bees create their honey hadn't changed since when the species first appeared, which was around 100 million years ago. This is the only insect produced food that humans eat. Half kilo of honey = 2 million flowers. If you were to imagine that one bee could make that amount of honey, it would have to travel 145 000 kilometres. That's three times the circumference of Earth. Let's make it easier for them by planting a profusion of bee-friendly flowers, herbs and shrubs in our gardens. **Check out these useful sites:**Photo source: Canva

SEASON 24/25...

...is taking a more lazy start to this time last year, with recent wet weather largely limiting the start of fires. That being said, the vegetation dries out very quickly following a day or so of wind, and both Dilston, Windermere, Swan Bay and Hillwood areas are prone to the prevailing NW winds.

This was demonstrated just recently with an area of vegetation catching alight on Solis Rise, and whilst fire activity was relatively benign, the ground coverings provided enough fuel that continued burning was a given if not for the intervention of the fire brigade.

This brings the conversation to accessibility, and you will note we have reposted the CAN WE FIT graphic. Notable as we still see property access as being a significant issue for some residents if large emergency

service appliances need to make access. More on that below.

CAN WE FIT!

Both brigades would like to ask our respective community members to once again have a check of the entrances to their properties to ensure we (and other emergency services) can easily gain access should the unfortunate need arise. It is worth noting that we don't just respond to fires, but also to other call such as medical emergencies, and to assist Ambulance Tasmania. Our

larger appliances are quite large as shown below, and so your help would be greatly appreciated!!

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PLEASE HELP MY SURVIVAL!

The Green and Gold Frog - Litoria raniformis

This month I have chosen to appeal to locals to aid the survival of a beautiful frog.

The Green and Gold Frog in your Tamar Valley garden is the sign of a healthy ecosystem.

It lives in weedy ponds, dams and streams and is most common in northern Tasmania, with some occurrences in the east and south of the State. We have several small populations locally. Green and Gold frogs are active in the warmer months during both day and night.

They can sometimes be seen basking out of the water on logs or water vegetation.

They have a varied diet of insects, lizards and other small frogs. The number and distribution of these frogs is declining as much of their habitat is disappearing. This may be due to such practices as draining land for other purposes, including agriculture and housing development. Ponds and creeks are being polluted by chemicals such as fertilisers and insecticides which runoff into our waterways aller rain.

Introduced predators to Tasmania, such as the Kookaburra, are having a significant effect on the survival of populations. I can remember watching a Kookaburra consume at least 30 emerging frogs one morning on my dam. Not sure they were all green and gold frogs, but a high proportion at that time were most likely so.

Frog populations are in decline worldwide due largely to loss of habitat.

This frog spends a significant proportion of its life out of water in damp and shaded areas of the garden.

You can help the survival of this great little animal locally in your garden by providing suitable cover in moist and shaded areas. Ponds need to have good vegetation cover on the edges and these frogs enjoy matted vegetation on the surface on which they can bask.

They call at night and during clear sunlit days. Their call is quite distinctive: The mating call of the adult male green and gold frog is described as a long growl of several seconds duration, followed by a series of short grunts: 'cr-a-a-aw-a-awk, cra-a-a-wk, crok, crok'. It is one of the few frogs that call during the day.

HILLWOOD GARDEN CLUB

The Hillwood Dear Garden Club met on 16 September.

The guest speaker was Peter Voller of the West Tamar Landcare Group. The group is tackling cat management with a "guerilla" project in the Greens Beach-Kelso area, to give bandicoots and devils a chance to recover. So far, they have removed over 100 'colony cats' that live completely independently from humans. "We use an Australian-made footplate trap baited with fried chicken wings, and if the cats are feral we euthanise them on the spot. Now we're catching more devils than cats, lots of quolls and bandicoots and seeing more shorebirds." As well as clear environmental and biodiversity benefits, Peter said people benefit by reconnecting with their communities and with nature. "People's lives are impacted by their surroundings and regenerating the environment saves people's lives. Gardens create a beautiful place for your community. There are incredibly talented people in the matrix. So get out, get active and connect with nature." The Garden Club meets on the third Monday of each month. All welcome

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


