Letter to the Editor

Smoke signals letters to Editor

Letter writers need to include name and street address (only your name and suburb will be printed) and letters must be under 150 words in length. All letters will be considered by the editorial team and may present in edited form when published.

One recent letter to the Editor is from Jon Dodla from Swan Bay and expresses some issues he has noted since moving to the area. Jon raises three main points around:

- Road safety, especially regarding speeding and 'hooning' 1.
- 2. Roadside stalls, and
- 3. Unreasonable noise

Jon's letter is too long to publish here, but regarding his points:

- Most people do the right thing in our local area, but please pass the message on about care on the roads. Now the weather has improved there are more people out walking, as well as cyclists and children. Anecdotally there are stories of near misses, so please be careful.
- Roadside stalls appear in the area from time to time. Please be sure you check with council to make sure it is ok to put a stall up, if there is enough space for cars to stop, and ask the neighbours if they mind. If you stop at a roadside stall, be careful to pull off the road so as not to obstruct traffic.
- The end of year is often a time for celebration, partying, and music. Please remember to check with neighbours if you plan big celebrations. Often you will see people put notices in neighbouring letterboxes advising of an event, sometimes even offering an invite!

All in all, we live in a harmonious community, and it is a great place to live. If you do notice any activities that may be of issue, remember there are correct channels to go through.

OCTOBER

Different birds have distinct needs: fairy-wrens forage on the ground, brown thornbills inhabit mid-level shrubs, and parrots prefer trees. Dense vegetation is essential for many species, providing food, water, shelter, and breeding sites.

Planting Strategies:

Variety

Provide diverse vegetation to cater to various bird species. Fairy-wrens forage on lawns but need dense shrubs or branch piles for predator shelter and nest-building materials. By providing variety you can satisfy every bird's needs.

Large Trees

These act as urban stepping stones, offering rest stops in urban environments. Even non-native trees can be valuable. While a large eucalypt may not be appropriate in a small garden, there are small ones that attract pardalotes and honeyeaters. Other smaller trees, such as wattles, banksias and she-oaks provide excellent habitat and food. Native Plants

Favour local or non-invasive Australian natives. While exotic plants offer shelter and nectar, they often attract only versatile species like New Holland honeyeaters. Native plants support more specialised birds by hosting more native insects, increasing availability of bird food.

Balanced Planting

Avoid overusing "bird-attracting" plants like callistemons and hybrid grevilleas. While they will attract wattlebirds, noisy miners and New Holland honeyeaters, these species will aggressively defend their patch. A seven-gram thornbill doesn't stand much chance against a 200-gram wattlebird or a mob of noisy miners. Ironically, too many nectar-abundant plants can leave small birds completely excluded.

Using fewer of the showy species mixed with shelter-providing shrubs and other kinds of insect-attracting flowers will produce a greater variety of birds in your yard. Smaller flowers, like common heath (Epacris impressa) and winter-flowering common correa (Correa reflexa) will attract smaller eastern spinebills, while wattles, tea trees, prickly box (Bursaria spinosa), daisy bushes and bushpeas are a safe bet for enticing insects.

Dead Branches

If safe, retain some dead branches. Eagles, blackfaced cuckoo-shrikes and dusky woodswallows use these to study their surrounds before they hunt. Robins also need a perch from which they can pounce on small invertebrates below – another good reason to keep woody debris lying around instead of 'tidying up', although don't compromise fire safety strategies.

Fruit and Seeds

Fruit-eating birds, such as silvereyes, will appreciate plants like native currants (Coprosma quadrifida) as well as any fruit in your orchard.

Make sure you don't have any environmental weeds with berries in your garden, such as holly, elder, arum lily or hawthorn, as birds may eat the berries and spread them into local bushland. Native grasses provide seeds for firetails and some parrots such as eastern rosellas, green rosellas, as well as fine foliage for many species to use in their nests, or to nest in.



The joy of seeing and listening to birds at home is surely one of the best reasons to have a garden at all. By choosing local native plants wherever practical planting for a range of species, you can foster birds in your backyard and help populations in your local area.

BEES IN THE GARDEN



Rural gardens are great for bees

It's no secret that bees are attracted to gardens filled with flowers, but a recently published UK study has found that bees can also benefit greatly from gardens in farming communities where agricultural crops certainly provide bees with plenty of pollen and nectar – but it may be a case of feast or famine. Bees were found to do far better when farmland areas also included rural gardens as these help provide a continuous and more reliable supply of nectar, complementing the variable supply from crops.

The research was conducted over several years across UK gardens and farmlands and was combined with citizen science data on bee activity. Although gardens were found to supply approximately 15 per cent of overall nectar for the bees in the study areas, there were seasonal periods where crops provided very little so gardens were picking up the slack. A crucial time was during late summer, after harvesting was largely complete.

It's likely this UK research is equally relevant for our part of the world and that gardening enthusiasts can help our bees by ensuring there are plenty of flowers for them to visit for as much of the year as possible.

"The small but continuous supply of nectar on farmland, resulted in a more continuous supply of food. This can fill crucial hunger gaps experienced by farmland bumblebees, supporting and enhancing their populations. In Britain 90 per cent of farmland is within one kilometre of a garden and therefore positive actions by gardeners could have widespread spillover benefits for pollinators across the country."

From sausages and sandwiches to Churches and charities, volunteering in Tasmania encompasses community members from all walks of life, all with that admiral common goal to do something for others, for no gain for themselves.

An area of volunteering sometimes not fully understood, is that of the volunteering commitment to the Tasmanian community in the provision of emergency services. Be it Volunteer Ambulance Officers, State Emergency Services (SES) members, and Tasmania Fire Service first responders.

These volunteering cohorts provide an essential service across Tasmania, often engaging with people in their most adverse times of need.

The members of Dilston and Hillwood Fire Brigades are no different, giving up their own time to help not only the community members of Dilston, Windermere, Swan Bay, and Hillwood, but also to the wider Tasmanian community, and indeed at times, travelling 'overseas to Australia'!

In addition to responding to around 150 calls per year, the brigades support a range of community events such as Symmons Plains Motorsport, Agfest, and the annual Christmas lolly runs.

However, like so many other volunteer groups that service community in all manner of ways, the uptake of people willing and able to volunteer has been on a noticeable decline.

Our Volunteer run Fire Brigades are not the stations, the grounds, the trucks and the gear, it is the people. Without the people, Dilston and Hillwood brigades, and other brigades and groups would cease to exist. This is clearly not in the best interests of the community.

It is worth noting that neither Dilston nor Hillwood brigades member number are precarious, however there is still a need to bolster the firefighter numbers at both brigade, and to that end the brigades would like to encourage members of the community who think that they might be able to assist, to contact one of the officers in the brigade section of smoke signals to make a time to drop into the station and "find out what we are all about!"



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
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
