The last issue of Smoke Signals featured the farewell and thank you event for Tony Walker, previous and long-time editor of our community newsletter. Handing over the role to our new volunteer editor Peter, provides a good opportunity to give more recent residents to the area some background, both to the newsletter and to inaugural editor, Eric Sandblom, whose idea it was to start it in the first place.

Eric and his wife Noeline lived in Windermere well over thirty years ago. They built a house and established a lovely garden — that reportedly included a cow that Noeline could occasionally be spotted chasing around the paddock. Even when they left the area they continued to maintain close links with friends they'd made here, and they always remained on the mailing list to receive Smoke Signals so they could keep in touch.

Although Eric died in 2010, and Noeline more recently in November 2022, in accordance with their wishes, our community has now been gifted with a painting by Launceston-born and award-winning artist Paul Becker. It was presented to them when they moved interstate during the mid-1990s, but they wanted it to be returned, to benefit the community where they'd enjoyed so many happy years hosting book club and garden club meetings, and where they'd made several lifelong friends.

It's probably no surprise to learn the genesis of Smoke Signals was to support our volunteer fire brigade. Following the 1967 bushfires, long-time resident Mike Adams was among those who responded to a government initiative to see volunteer fire brigades established in Tasmania's rural areas not easily serviced by professional brigades. Mike was soon appointed Captain of the fledgling Dilston Volunteer Fire Brigade, and he set about creating the well-run and resourced Brigade that we are fortunate to have now. That it was so well resourced was in large part due to the many community fundraising events that were held to purchase much of the specialist equipment that Mike felt was needed, such as pumps, hoses, gloves, and breathing apparatus.

But it was Eric Sandblom who suggested creating a newsletter to promote and support the Brigade. His health precluded him from being a firefighter, so a newsletter was his way of contributing, and his computer skills - at a time when PCs were still relatively uncommon - were significant in reporting and supporting the Brigade's activities. He called the newsletter Smoke Signals, and the first four-page folded A5 copy landed in Dilston, Windermere and Swan Bay letterboxes in December 1990, just in time for Christmas.

Mike recalls those early days:

"As fundraising continued, community support grew. Ladies' luncheons started, poetry evenings in Dilston Hall were held. We had Trivial Pursuit, Music Halls, pea straw sales, art displays and garage sales, a billy cart race, auctions, and a fancy dress ball. Fund raising became a regular feature of the Brigade's activities and its financial matters were reported regularly in Smoke Signals," he said.

By the fifth or sixth issue Eric was including reports about the activities of garden club, St Matthias Church, and the local scouts, brownies and CWA groups in the newsletter, as well as some 'mini advertisements' that promoted the skills and services of local tradespeople and businesses. These helped offset Smoke Signals' printing expenses – all of which Eric and Noeline undertook to pay for. Back then there were far fewer properties in the area than there are today but even so the cost of producing, printing and collating the newsletter wouldn't have been insignificant.

Those early issues helped inform new and existing residents about the various opportunities on offer and included contact details for the local playgroup, walking group, book group, sewing circle and garden club – several of which both Eric and Noeline had either helped establish, or were part of. Far from being a relatively isolated semi-rural region, *Dilswanawind*, as we were collectively dubbed, became the vibrant and close-knit community we are today thanks in large part to the Sandbloms - and our Smoke Signals community newsletter.

Little wonder then, that when Eric and Noeline moved to the big island in 1996, the community wanted to recognise their generosity and commitment with the gift of a painting depicting a Launceston street scene to remind them of their years in Tasmania.

But how best to honour those wishes? After canvassing the thoughts of some in the community who remember the Sandbloms, a decision was made to sell the painting at auction, and use the money towards purchasing a cardiac defibrillator able to be accessed by any member of the community who may need it. Since these items are priced at well over \$1000 current Smoke Signals editor, Peter Mulholland, has undertaken to apply for a community grant on our behalf for the same purpose. So depending on the success of both sale and grant application, we may end up with two defibrillators.

No Free Feeds Please





Most of us have chosen to live where we live as we treasure a rural environment. We live in an area that, until a few years ago, was considered rural. With increasing development by the year we are rapidly becoming a main suburb of Launceston.

We are fortunate to have a larger area than most to garden, and with which to appreciate our birds.

Last edition I wrote about creating an encouraging environment for birds.

Common bronzewing

A garden that provides natural food for birds such as one with native grasses to provide seed, mulch to encourage insects and small-flowering locally native shrubs to feed honeyeaters is much better for our whole bird community than one that feeds only a few potentially problem birds. Whether you feed birds or not, please create great spaces for them which include habitat and water.

Part of the enjoyment of living in a regional area with garden space is creating a habitat for our native animals in the backyard.

But while birdbaths and frog ponds provide a useful service for native species, a bird feeder full of seed does not.

In welcoming cockatoos, rosellas or kookaburras to your house for hand or station feeding, you are serving up a diet of junk food and reducing their ability to forage for food. You also encourage introduced species that are here because our urbanised habits provide them a ready source of survival to breed disproportionately.



Enjoying the Bird Bath

When you feed native animals, you're giving them the wildlife equivalent of junk food.

Instead of eating a wide range of natural foods, they depend on processed seeds, bread and other foods that are not part of their natural diet. This can make them very sick.

Animals that expect to be fed by people can become aggressive, harassing people for food when they are hungry.

My position has always been that it is better to create a natural environment to attract them by choosing appropriate food or shelter in a natural way.

The Birds Australia website gives some good advice on when and how, if you feel you must, feed native birds.

"YOU SHOULD AVOID FEEDING BIRDS THE FOLLOWING.

MINCE: This might seem like a treat but it lacks important nutrients that carnivorous birds would normally obtain from their natural diet of insects and the fur and bones of small mammals.


Huge problems can arise if the adult birds raise their young on this diet, as the juvenile birds can suffer from brittle bones due to insufficient calcium. Mince can also stick to the beaks of birds like Kookaburras and Tawny Frogmouths, leading to bacterial infection.

If you feed other meat to birds, add an insectivore supplement to it. (Wombaroo Insectivore mix)

HONEY/WATER MIXES: These do not provide the complex sugars that a bird would get from the nectar of a flower." Birds Australia 2025

As this edition is being put together we are seeing significant fire activity in the south of the state at Margate, and on the West Coast, with multiple fires starting as a result of dry lightening strikes.

Both Dilston and Hillwood Brigades have been kept on our toes with a number of incidents including a spate of vehicle fires on the East Tamar Highway. Most (not all) as a result of the vehicles being abandoned after use that was not intended for by their owners.

We have also been assisting with fire incidents to the north and south, with troublesome fires albeit small, at Bell Bay and the northern suburbs of Launceston.

As the hot weather drew out we entered a heat wave period with dramatically increased fire danger which has led to a suspension of fire permits. We thank the communities for working with us on this as both brigades have also supplied crews to pre deployed strike teams in the northern

midlands...just in case!

It is worth noting that unlike the past, TFS brigades travel well outside our local communities to assist other Tasmanian Communities in need. Have truck...will travel so we say!! Have no fear however, during these time we have alternative arrangements in place to ensure coverage is maintained locally.

With 2025 well underway now, both brigades are back into their fortnightly training sessions, with a new focus on a number of new members! We look forward to them progressing in their development to become valued additions to our volunteer family!

OUR HISTORY

DILSTON - "LAUNCESTON'S PLAYGROUND"



The Friends Arms

It seems strange to us now that Dilston, a commuter suburb just 10 minutes from Launceston by super highway, was once a popular destination for day trippers, keen to escape the bustling metropolis of Launceston. Visitors came by road and by river, landing at the jetty below the Tamar Hotel.

In 1866, Mr. W.J. Harris, licensee of the York Hotel, was offering "Afternoon Excursion TO DILSTON AND BACK, FARE, only 3s.

Mr. W. J Harris, YORK HOTEL, WILL, on and after the 16th instant, run a conveyance to the above place every Sunday afternoon, leaving the York Hotel at two o'clock sharp, and the Tamar Hotel at six p.m., employing a very handsome break carrying eight inside and two outside passengers."

The Tamar Hotel, originally the Friend's Arms and founded in 1836, was the focal point for Dilston visitors. In 1857 it was taken over by Mr. James Long, who advertised

"THE TAMAR HOTEL (late Coulson's) On the banks of the East Tamar.

JAMES LONG having opened the above beautifully situated hotel, distant ten miles from Launceston, on the main line of road to George Town, notifies to the public that he has now on sale Wines, Spirits, and malt liquors of very superior quality.

The situation of the above house renders it most convenient for parties requiring accommodation from home, where they can receive every comfort which civility and attention can produce.

The steamers call daily to land and take up passengers."

By 1866, the Tamar Family Hotel, was in the hands of Mr. Feltham Bold Watson who had previously had the Queen's Arms Hotel in Longford. He was advertising:

"The Tamar Family Hotel is now open for the accommodation of travellers, replete with every comfort.

Invalids requiring change of air, and to be near their medical adviser, will find this hotel, from its picturesque situation and salubrity of climate, not to be surpassed in the island.

Pleasure parties provided for at the shortest notice. Every assistance rendered to sportsmen.

The hotel is nine miles from town; road first-rate to the door. Charges moderate, combined with civility and good attendance. Good Stabling. HORSES KEPT FOR HIRE."

Watson was instrumental in initiating the East Tamar Regatta at Dilston, which brought large crowds to "Launceston's favourite picnic spot".

The hotel traded until 1891 and the building had various uses before the recent refurbishment by Nick and Fiona Jones.

A face painter, a children's entertainer making balloon animals, a BBQ, Fire bridage and SES, and of course, SANTA, all helped to make a family friendly event.


















