The new proposals for the Second Kanamaluka/River Tamar Crossing

We are seeking community feedback on options for a second River Tamar Bridge between the East and West Tamar Highways.

We want to gain a better understanding from the local community, businesses and other key stakeholders about what they would like to see in the second River Tamar Bridge.

Community feedback that we receive during the consultation period will be valuable in informing future planning and designs, and obtaining necessary funding for the new bridge.

Five options have been identified for the bridge, each of which will improve connectivity between the East and West Tamar Highways. They all give people greater choice when travelling around the Greater Launceston area and through the CBD but each has its own pros and cons.

Fully understanding our community's needs will help the Government decide the best location and the most workable connections into the highways.

Community members can view the new crossing options in person until Friday, 18 April 2025 at the West Tamar and Launceston City Council offices. Alternatively, online with an interactive map on the Transport website at www.transport.tas.gov.au/new-tamar-crossing There's been great feedback coming in from the options we recently released, and I'd encourage everyone with an interest to get involved and have your say.

To date, the Tasmanian Government has given a commitment of 20% towards the new crossing. This is contingent on the Federal Government meeting its 80 percent share in keeping with long-standing practice of funding significant regional infrastructure (as with the Bridgewater Bridge).

Further public consultation will be held after necessary investigations, planning and design work for the chosen option have been completed, based on the feedback received.

In keeping with the St Valentine's Day theme of Bees and Beekeeping, I asked David Willard to share his experiences with his new Flow Hive. Here it is – thanks so much for your generous knowledge sharing David.

Musings from a Lazy Beekeeper

Last year I decided to start a beehive at home for what I'd like to think are philosophical reasons but in reality it was probably more for the honey and, possibly, mead! So I purchased a Flow Hive, which is a brilliant Australian device invented by father and son professional beekeepers living in Northern NSW, The Flow Hive has gone on to become a worldwide sensation!

Once assembled I had to source a bee colony, which is called a Nucleus. This is a transportable mini beehive, containing four frames, that comes with a Queen so is fully functioning.

In late November last year I drove to the south of Hobart to pick up my Nucleus and then drove straight back home to introduce them to my empty hive. The four laden frames went in along with three empty frames for them to fill and expand the hive. The hive - or brood box - is the box you see at the bottom of the stack you generally see by the roadside and is where the bees live.

My hive consists of seven inner 'frames' that the bees build their comb on and fill the outer frames with honey, pollen and nectar, which is what they live off. The inner frames are used by the Queen and her retinue of workers as egg laying chambers. Once I was satisfied that all of the brood box frames were fully laden I attached the Flow Hive on top of the brood box and opened it up for honey production.

The bees are now constantly working to fill the cells with nectar and convert it to honey - being so late in the season we may get some honey this year but more likely next year. Our Flow Hive contains seven frames with each frame capable of producing up to 4 kg of honey. When we harvest the honey the only thing that moves are the inner cells of the Flow Hive, which cracks open the wax seal made by the bees and allows the honey to flow down and into a collector channel and then out of a tube and into our containers. There is no interaction or disturbance to the bees and once the cells are reset they go about their business of resealing the cells to start the process over again.

Every day I visit my hive and often sit in the chair I have by it and open the viewing portholes of the Flow Hive to see them at work. They in turn cluster at the window and I'm sure watch me curiously. So, it begs the question - in Beekeeping who keeps who? In closing and going back to my heading - why 'Lazy Beekeeper'? Well, the Bees do all the work!



David's interesting bee facts:

1. Bees are quite short-lived so it's not surprising to see dead bees from time to time, but the hive has its own morticians that remove dead bees.
2. Flowers sing to bees! Bees become positively charged when in flight and plants/flowers are negatively charged - when charged with pollen and nectar, plants give off a sound that bees can hear and so know which flowers to visit. When they visit the flower, pollen jumps from the flower to cover the bee while it harvests the nectar. The signal is then cancelled out for the time being so other bees disregard the harvested flower.
3. When a bee returns from a successful harvest to the hive it does a little 'waggle dance' for its friends, which shows them exactly where to go and find the 'good stuff'.
4. The Queen only ever mates once and if any other Queens are found in the hive, they challenge each other and fight to the death, the victor rules and lays eggs until too old and either leaves or is killed by a new young Queen.

Here we are again with your reminder, when you change your clocks don't forget to check the smoke alarms. Smoke alarms save lives. Protect yourself, those close to you and ensure you have a working smoke alarm.

HOME FIRE SAFETY

As the season starts to change, the temperatures drop and we find ourselves looking towards a few small jobs that need doing as we approach the coldest months.

The TFS advised that drying clothing be no closer than 2M to heat source, and preferably greater. If hanging clothing out overnight to dry, then is it best placed well clear of any heating device, and of course, we recommend that smoke alarms be fitted in the house..

On the topic of drying clothes,

ensure lint filters are kept clear



Are you electric blankets in good condition?? Replace them if you find any damage, and remember never place heavy objects on them!

WOOD HEATERS | CHIMNEYS AND FLUS

As the colder weather sets in, a reminder to everyone to ensure your wood heater flue is cleaned prior to being used this year. The build up of soot and creosote is the major cause of chimney and flue fires, and can in worst case lead to surrounding roofing materials catching fire.

END OF PERMIT PERIOD

By the time this issue is delivered the permit period is likely to have ended. Please keep an eye out for the removal of the permit signs and the notification in the various forms of media. Thankyou to all residents that asked for permits this season and for the registering of burns in general. Please continue to register your burns and it helps us keep a track on fires in our area.

Pine Nut Pioneer Shares Expertise with Hillwood Garden Club

The Hillwood Garden Club recently welcomed Andrew Bailey, who is cultivating a rare treasure in our region – the Italian Stone Pine (Pinus pinea).

Andrew's 500-tree plantation at Winkleigh represents one of only two commercial plantings in Australia. Club members learned that these Mediterranean natives, spread throughout Europe by the Romans over 2,000 years ago, produce the world's most prized culinary pine nuts – distinctly different from the Chinese varieties typically found in Australian supermarkets.

He explained the fascinating three-year growth cycle of the pine cones, which weigh up to 900 grams when mature. Despite being relatively new to Tasmania, his trees are thriving thanks to our favorable rainfall and modern management techniques, though the impact of local wildlife remains to be seen.

The evening also featured the club's regular activities, including the "Flower of the Night" competition (won by a spectacular maroon Hydrangea), a produce sale of seasonal bounty, and a raffle.

The Hillwood Garden Club meets monthly at the Memorial Hall and welcomes visitors and new members. The next meeting on Easter Monday (April 21st) will feature members sharing garden poems.
